America's average number of polio cases in the past four years has more than tripled the previously-accepted "normal" toll, it disclosed today by Mrs. Richard Sinn, Washtenaw county campaign director for the 1952 March of Dimes.

She noted that in the first ten years of the March Dimes experience, beginning in 1938, the average early polio case total on the other hand, that average ranged from ten to twelve thousand. From 1948 through 1951 on the other hand, that average surpassed 30,000 new cases.

"In addition to this" Mrs. Sinn said, "tens of thousands of v.ctims from previous years remained on the rolls needing continued financial help. There were 45,000 of them during 1951. 
