## Manchester Girls Win 21-18 Over Dexter

Last Friday Manchester lost their first league game of the season to Dexter thus putting Dexter back in the thick of the League of the Lakes basketball chase. The final score was 44-36. After an even first period which ended with the score deadlocked at 10 points each, Dexter broke away from Manchester to achieve a 24-16 lead at the half. A brief Manchester flurry was smothered in the third period as the Dutchman felt the loss of regular starter Jerry Fennell, who was home suffering from influenza and Tom Snyder who is out for the season with a dislocated shoulder.

Dale Krull paced the Dexter attack with 14 points while Ken Gregory and Fred Cunningham added 10 each. For Manchester Duane Troitz had 11 and Bill Aiken seven.

In second-team play, Dexter smashed a 67-34 victory, but Manchester's girls furnished the surprise of the evening with a 21-19 triumph over the Dexter Minervas who hadn't been defeated through four straight seasons and part of a fifth.

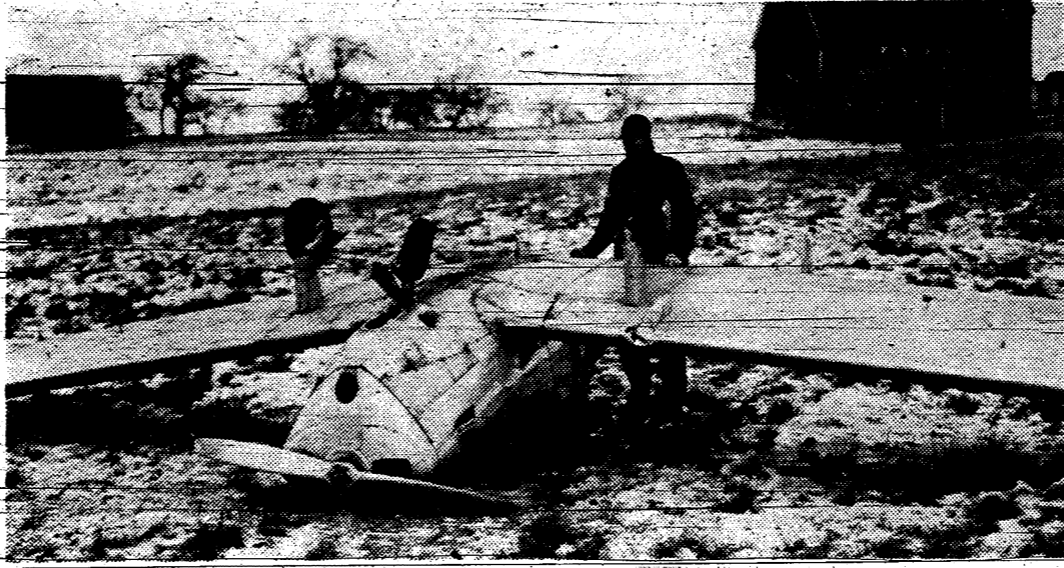

## Mental Health Class Starts at Jackson

Introduction to Mental Health, a University of Michigan extension course opening in Jackson on Wednesday evening, Feb. 6, has proved of value to the layman as well as to teachers, nurses, and personnel people when it has been offered in other communities. It may be elected without regard to credit, though qualified students may earn two hours of graduate extension credit.

The class, which is being given with the cooperation of the Adult Education Center of the Jackson Public Schools, will meet at 7:30 p. m. on Wednesday in Room 215 of the Center. Dr. J. N. P. Struthers, of the staff of the Ypsilanti State Hospital, is to be the instructor. The course will deal with the mind as it relates to abnormal behavior and to those conditions that become social problems. Treatment, social and public health relations and prevention are also considered.

## Enterprise Editor Attends Annual Press Conferences

### MSC Scene Of Meetings

Several of our friends here have been inquiring about the 84th anniversary convention of the Michigan Press Association which was held at the Kellogg Center on the Michigan State College campus last Friday and Saturday. Others have heard about it in the papers.

Because we enjoyed it so much our publisher has agreed that it would be in line to tell our readers something about the convention instead of our usual personal line stating that we had merely attended some particular meeting or convention of the press. First, we'd like to thank the publisher who made it possible for the editors of the Milan Leader, Saline Observer and Enterprise to attend the convention. We agreed that it was most interesting whether we were like Lucile DeRyke of the Leader who grew up in the newspaper business and knew most of the newspaper people personally—a brand new editor like Al Coley of the Saline Observer, who was attending for the first time, or like your editor who enjoys each press meeting more than the last.

Making up the party were publisher, Fred Giesel and his wife, the editors and our advertising manager, France Raine and his bride, who have just returned from California.

After the president's luncheon, Arthur H. Motley, president of Parade Publication, Inc., gave a most interesting talk. He has the reputation of being one of the three best business speakers in the country today, and certainly lived up to that reputation.

At the business meeting Saturday, Kenneth R. West, managing editor of The State Journal, was named to head a committee of Michigan newspaper editors in an attack on news barriers throughout the state aiming at public elected state board of agriculture and the state board of regents. Members of Mr. West's committee will probe censorship of public records and public information. Included on the committee is Ralph Byers, editor of the Ann Arbor News.

Editors decided to aim their blows at the state board of regents and the state board of agriculture, governing bodies respectively of the University of Michigan and Michigan State College. It was pointed out during discussion that meetings of the boards usually are not open to the public or the press and that proceedings of the meetings, usually censored, are available only from the schools' public relations department.

Another not of interest was that Michigan daily and weekly newspaper editors voted nearly 3 to 1 for General Eisenhower over Senator Taft in a Presidential preference "straw vote" conducted by the State Journal on Saturday.

State Treasurer D. Hale Brake delivered a blistering attack on the "Little Hoover" commission staff proposals to give the governor more power. The elective state officials gave

Brake their speaking time at the M. P. A. press conference but said he did not necessarily speak for them. Brake attacked what he said was the "Little Hoover" staff's proposal for strong centralization of state government in the hands of the governor.

"The whole argument," Brake said, "for high centralization pre-supposes at the head a top-flight executive and if, instead, we pre-suppose at the head of government a mediocre ability or a spoils-man, or a puppet operated by stronger forces from behind the scenes, then the whole argument for centralization falls flat on its face."

Loren B. Miller, research director of the "Little Hoover" commission, told the M. P. A. the staff's studies came to the "inescapable conclusion" that Michigan's government is a hodge-podge—a Chinese puzzle, stemming from fear of the executive.

He proposed giving the governor wide powers to appoint all state officials. "Miller," Brake said, "has read too darn many books. I have known too darn many governors." Brake noted that since he had been in public office he had known seven governors. In attempting to give our readers some idea of what the convention was like we have attempted to bring out some of the interesting ideas, which we think might interest you—regardless of political opinions you might have. As always, we like to get back to the idea of reporting the news as we see it without slanting it.

There were publishers' round tables for weekly and daily newspapers, newspaper analysis clinic and weekly newspaper management (and in this we hope to find many ways in which we can better serve our readers.)

But it wasn't all work. No doubt many of you have read that ten Michigan Festival Queens were presented at an afternoon tea and again Saturday evening following the "All Michigan Dinner" which, by the way, was some dinner—a feature of which provided a whole broiled "Chicken of Tomorrow" to each guest—along with all the trimmings. Dinner featured music by the Nate Fry trio, gardenias for the ladies, balloons, hats and what have you. After the dinner Dr. Franz Polgar, mind reader and hypnotist, presented his famous mental miracles. He is acclaimed by Saturday Evening Post as "America's Greatest One-Man Show."

Your editor didn't return home with the rest on Saturday night but stayed to spend Sunday with the J. Kenneys at Lansing. Many remember Mrs. Kenney, the former Betty Eckhardt, English and commercial teacher here, who wished to be remembered to her many friends.

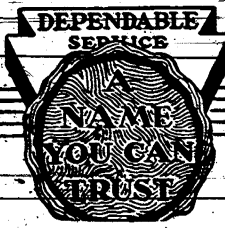

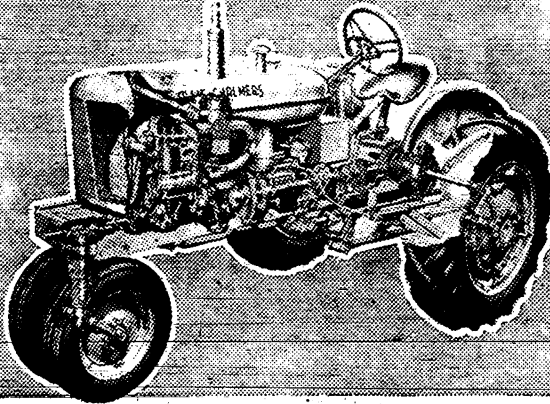
