### Village Receives **Fourth Quarter** Gas Tax Rebate

Vouchers for distribution, of \$22,209,237.35 collected in weight and gas taxes for the fourth quarter of the calendar year 1951 have been prepared by the State Highway Department and sent to the Auditor General's office for payment, in accordance with the provisions of Act 51, Public Acts of Charles M. Ziegler said today.
