

Requires Posting

A regulation requiring approximately 10,000 restaurants and other eating establishments in eastern Michigan to post dollars-andcents ceiling prices for their meals and principal food items and beverages was issued by the OPS, Philip A. Hart, Detroit district director said recently.

The regulation freezes restaurant prices at the level shown on menus or charged during the week of February 3-9, 1952.

Those frozen prices, with permissable adjustments by operators who have been charging pric es lower than permitted under the present restaurant regulation (CPR11), will be the dollars-andcents ceilings which restaurants

The regulation became effective April 7, 1952. OPS District Offices are now sending out the posters. They must be displayed not later than April 25, 1952, by restaurants in a place where they will be easily visible to customers.

The posters, carrying the official OPS insignia, have spaces for 40 principal food and non-alcoholic beverage items customarily served by eating places. If an establishment also serves alcoholic beverages, a poster with spaces for listing ceiling prices for 20 items must be displayed. For most eating places the new

regulation will replace CPR11 which has permitted restaurants to adjust their own menu prices so long as they gave the same percentage of food per dollar of sales over a four-month accounting period as they did before Korea. In issuing the regulations, the OPS emphasized that the general level of food prices is now fairly well established and the monthly Wholesale Food Price Index is ued by the Bureau of Labor Statistics has not risen during the past several months.

As a result, he said, the principal effect of the new-regulation will be to stabilize restaurant pric-

es and enable eating places to charge prices which reflect their

nre-Korea margin. "We are now making arrangement," Mr. Hart said, "to set up a series of meetings in key areas in our district. Business analysts from the Detroit district office price department will counsel with restaurant and tavern proprietors at these meetings, explain the new regulation in detail and assist those businesses affected as much

as possible. "The new regulation is being mailed to all those establishments which have filed their ceiling pri-ces under CPR11 with the Detroit district office."

Farmers Are Reminded Of Michigan Seed Law

Farmers are reminded that any agricultural seeds offered for sale must be tested for purity and germination and carry a tag or label showing purity and germination is required by law.

The only exemption to the requirements of the law is the movement of home grown seeds between farms.

Agricultural seeds advertised for sale or sold through public auction sales are not exempt from the provisions of the law and must be tested for both purity and germination and carry the legally required tag.

Any person in doubt should write the Seeds Division of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, Lansing 13, Michigan. for information.

Farmers in this locality have been—anxiously_watching_the spread of anthrax, a livestockkill<u>i</u>ng disease in two nearby counties of Lenawee and Hillsale while state agricultural of ficials worked to pin down the source of the infection. They said that further outbreaks may be expected due to contaminated bone meal feed, but insisted that there is no reason for panic in Michigan's livestock in

Dr. Lee Davisson, state vet erinarian, formerly of Manchester recommended that all farmers stop using feeds containing bone meal or tankage until the source of the disease can be established definitely and the Linfections brought under control.

Pencillin is used by veterinarians to treat the disease. Strict quarantines are placed on sick animals and on the farms. State officials believe that the type of anthrax which has broken out in the state is not highly ontagious.

Dr. F. S. Leeder of the state nealth department said Friday in Lansing that there is little danger to humans from the dis-

"Our primary concern is for the safety of farmers, veterinarians, rendering house workers and others who might come in direct contact with the inected animals,' he said. Penicillin is almost 100 per cent ef fective in treating the disease

in human beings, he added. Two state officials, Dr. Dav sson and William C. Geagley, state agriculture department chemist, differ as to the source of the disease, although their superior, Director Charles-Figy of the agriculture department, said in Lansing it is likely that the disease came from bone meal feed imported from Pakistan or Belgium or both.

Source In Feed.

Dr. Davisson said he person ally stumbled onto the first cases of anthrax and located the source of contamination in a certain brand of feed. He refused to name the brand, how

Geagley declared that his aboratory has been unable to gather enough data to prove the feed is the source of the disease

The dispute leaves farm leaders here with the impression that the source of the disease has not been pinspointed, although they agree that imported bone meal probably is the

The bone meal is brought to America in ships which use it for ballast. Bone meal produced in America is steamed at a temperature which controls the anthrax spores.

Until the curent outbreak, anthrax has been unknown in Michigan. In the South it is controlled by vaccination. It has been prevalent for years in Europe and Asiatic countries where the vaccine was first developed and is generally used.
