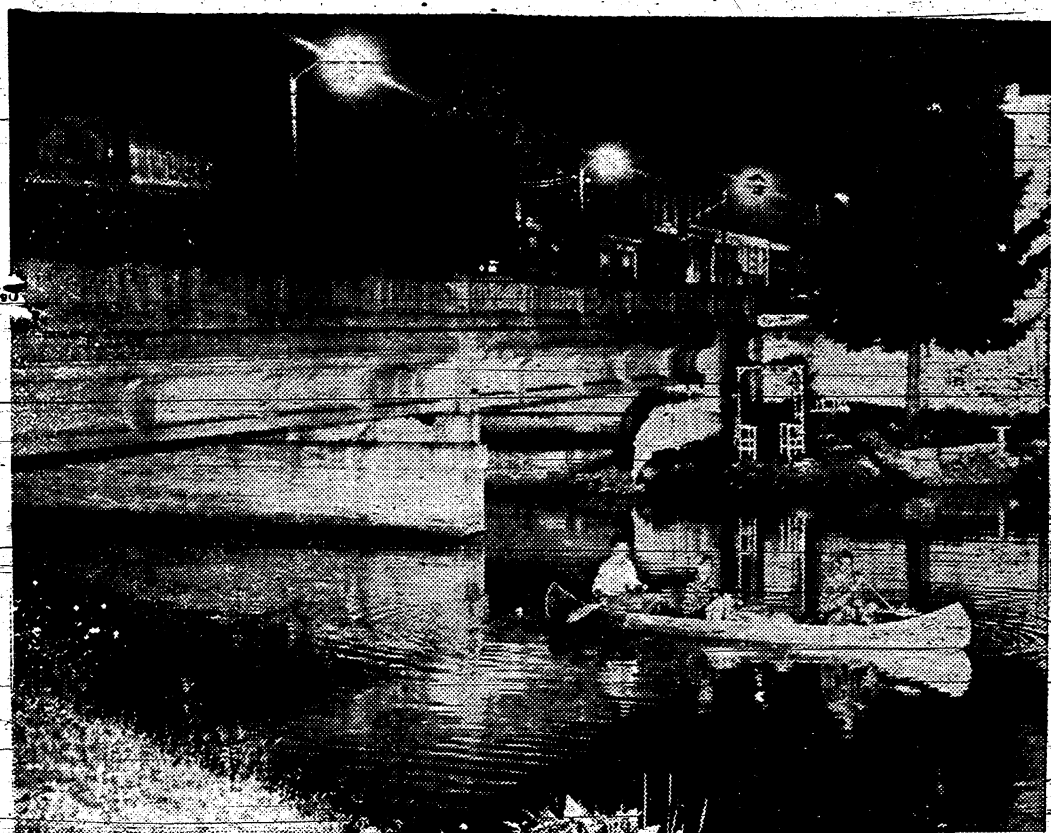

CANOEING DOWN THE RIVER

Last week we mentioned in the local paper that Citizen Patriot reporter Garrett Cope and scouts Mike Kerwin and Pete Sampson started a canoe trip down the Raisin intending to follow the course of the river to Monroe where the Raisin empties into Lake Erie.

Through the courtesy of the Jackson Citizen Patriot they have sent us the pictures of their trip which are of interest to Manchester readers. Their first stop was at Manchester where they bedded down in Memorial Park.

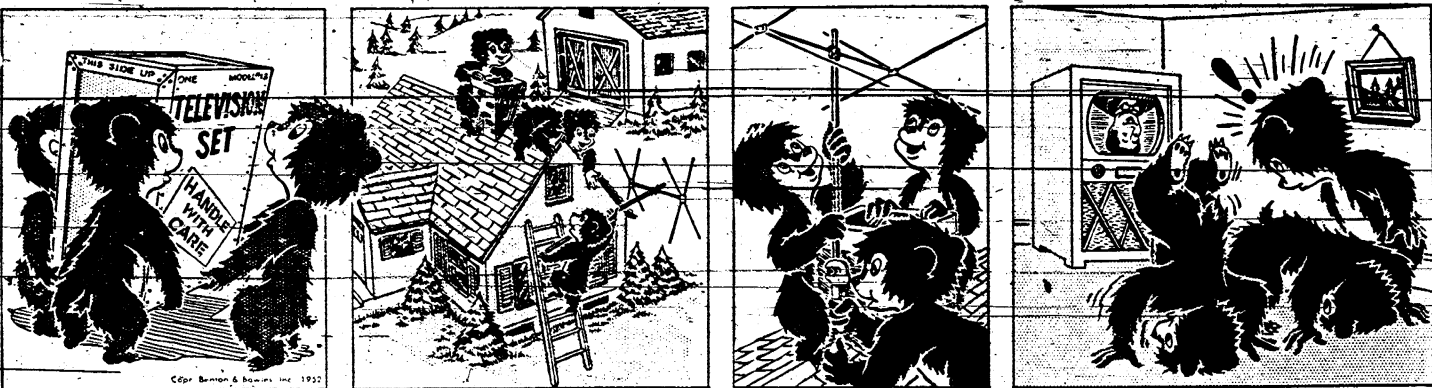

It was shortly after this picture was taken that Cope injured his foot while scrambling down the river bank to rejoin the Scouts.



Cope reads one of his accounts of the trip in his bed at his home. He broke a bone in his right foot, causing termination of the trip. Treated at the Tecumseh hospital he was removed to Foote hospital at Jackson where the bone was set and foot placed in a cast. The picture was taken later at his home. The trio agree that the Raisin River is not navigable—especially when the water is low. The river is very winding in spots and has bars of heavy gravel from Clinton to Tecumseh and is much dirtier near Tecumseh where the boys started the trip at Norvell.

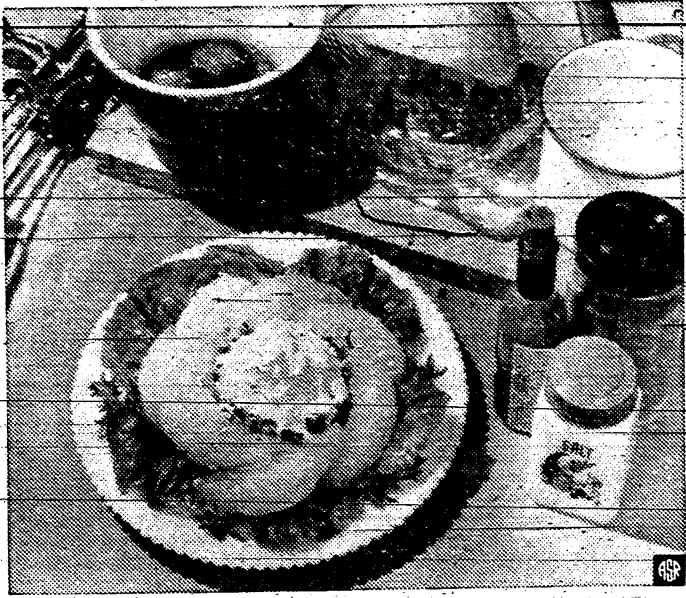

- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon Tabasco
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup catchup
- 1 peeled clove garlic (optional)

Blend 1/2 cup of the grapefruit juice and cornstarch. Cook over low heat stirring constantly, until thickened and clear. Remove from heat; add remaining 1/2 cup grapefruit juice. Measure into small mixing bowl remaining ingredients; add cornstarch mixture and beat with rotary beater until smooth. Store covered in refrigerator. Shake before using. YIELD: 1 1/4 cups.

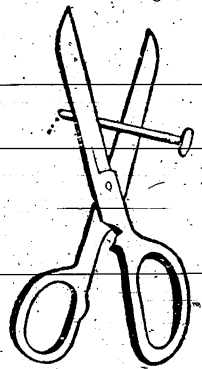

How to Sharpen Shears

A SIMPLE method of sharpening an old pair of scissors is illustrated. Turn a penny into a wall, as shown. Draw the jaws of the scissors their full length over the nail, as though you were cutting it. A mod-

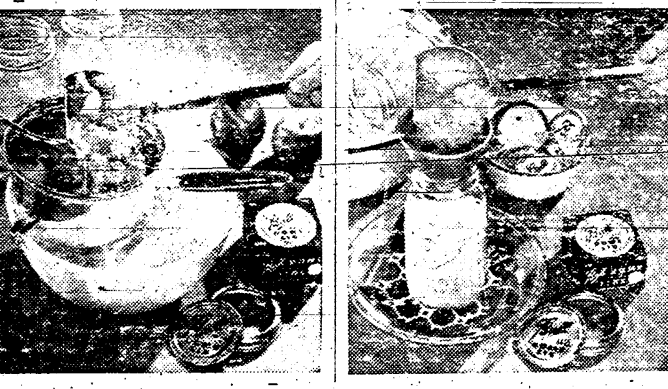


erate, even pressure is required during the several strokes needed to put an edge on the blades. Cutting into a piece of sandpaper or emery paper is another commonly used method of sharpening a shears.

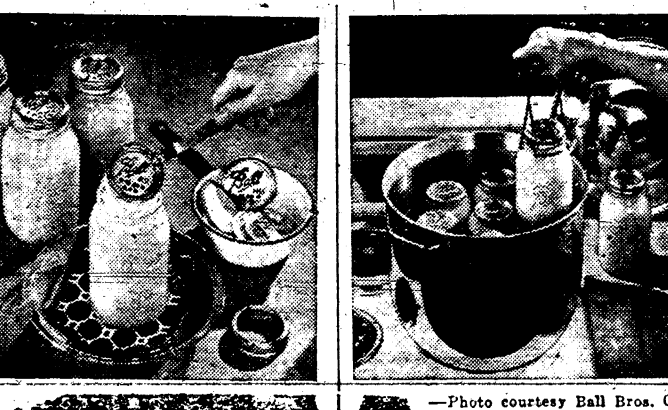

1. Wash, rinse, drain, good cooking apples. Cut-out blossom and stem ends. Cut in chunks. Cook until soft in just enough water to prevent sticking. Put through food mill, colander or strainer. Sweeten to taste; reheat to boiling.

2. Stand hot Ball Mason Jar or cloth. Fill with hot sauce to within one-half inch of jar top. Funnel helps keep jar clean. Stir sauce with fork to get out air bubbles. Wipe jar top and threads with clean wet cloth.



3. Put wet Ball Dome Lid on jar with fingers or tongs. Screw metal band tightly enough to press sealing compound against jar top. Be sure band screws down evenly. Do not force band as tight as it will turn.

4. Stand jars of hot sauce on rack in canner of hot, not boiling, water, which covers jars. Put lid on canner. Bring rapidly to boil. Process pints and quarts 15 minutes. Remove jars; let stand apart to cool.

Follow manufacturer's directions for examining jars and caps when preparing to can. Ten or twelve hours after sealing, remove band and test seal by pressing Dome to see if it is down or stays down when pressed. Leave bands off.

Can Green Beans at the Peak of Their Growing Season

Always Process Them in a Steam Pressure Cooker

Green beans provide a nutritious green vegetable dish enjoyable the year around. The best time to can them is at the peak of their growing season. They should be tender, meaty and crisp. Wash the beans, string them if necessary, and break or cut into one or two-inch pieces. Cover with water and boil for five minutes. Pack loosely into hot Ball Mason Jars and add a teaspoon of salt to each quart. Cover with the water in which they were cooked or with fresh boiling water. As with all low-acid vegetables, it is most important to process beans in a steam pressure cooker. If they are just right for canning, as described above, process quarts 30 minutes and pints 20 minutes. If they are near the "shell out" stage, process them 15 to 20 minutes longer. Using loose gloves with padded

A Bride's Boast



By Frances Barton
The smart young bride of today can quickly earn fame as a hostess by designing her own homemade jam and jelly corner. Her time investment is small. In fact, with the short-boil method of jelly making, fifteen minutes after her fruit is prepared, she can place the finished jars on her shelf.
No one should gamble with fresh fruit, sugar, and other jelly making ingredients. Why do it when it's so easy to follow scientific instructions which insure luscious jellies and jams, with all the color and flavor of the ripe fresh fruits? Here is a tested recipe which will lead straight to success with America's favorite berry, the strawberry.

STRAWBERRY JAM
Yield: about 10 medium glasses
4 cups prepared fruit
7 cups sugar
1/2 bottle fruit pectin
To prepare the fruit. Crush thoroughly about 2 quarts fully ripe strawberries. Add 1/4 cup lemon juice. Measure 4 cups into a very large saucepan.
To make the jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly into glasses. Cover jam at once with 1/8 inch hot paraffin.
