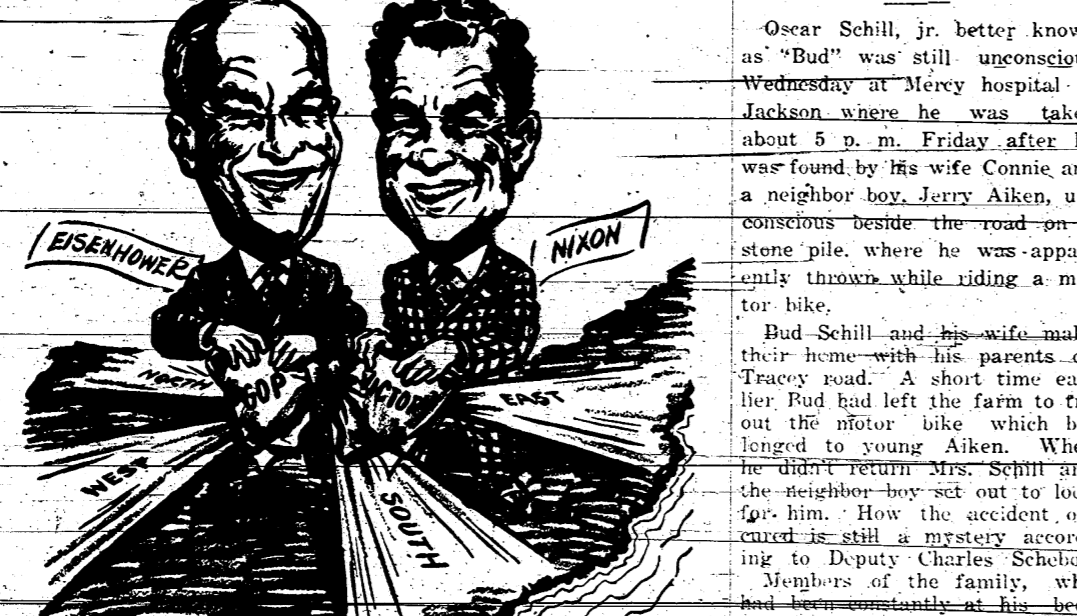
## Open House To Honor Miss Nellie Ackerson

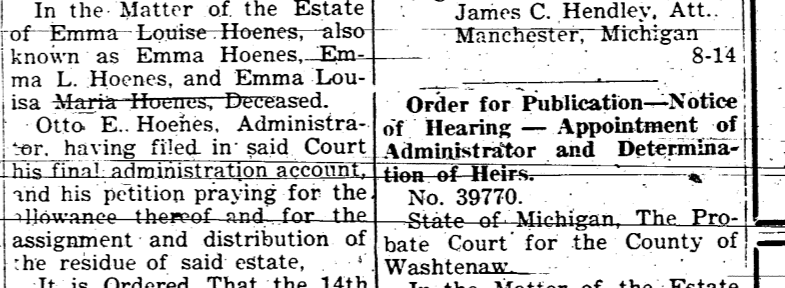

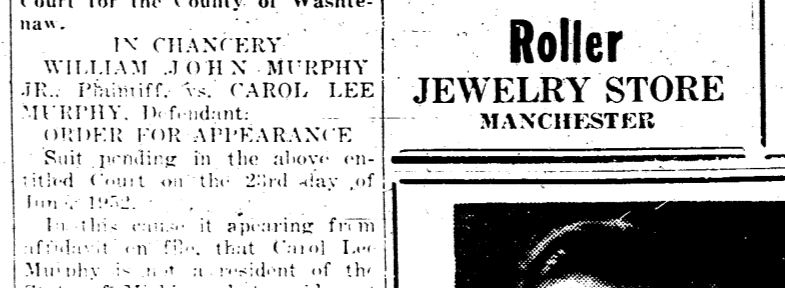

### Dairy Farmers Economic Problems



Dairy farms are the first line of the nation's defense. With government authorities asking for greater production as costs keep rising, dairy farms face a serious economic "squeeze." In the interest of national welfare the spotlight of public attention should be turned on the economic problems of the milk producer.

"Dairy farmers operate on a small margin always," says Owen Richards, general manager of the American Dairy Association, "and milk production involves great risk and large investment. It involves greater hazards than most other businesses. Dairying faces the ordinary economic risks and uncertainties of the market and it is also subject to the natural calamities of drought, hail, floods, or disastrous snows. Come drought or blight-water cows must be milked daily and the milk marketed. The milk factory can't be switched off like an industrial plant or the fresh milk put in storage warehouses.

"Costs of milk production have

increased but the price of milk to the consumer is less than the 'all foods' averages. The price of labor has gone up. Expensive new machinery must be purchased if the milk supply is to be increased. The milk farmer is stretching the ends of his rope to make them meet.

"As costs of milk production have kept going up many farmers have sold cows or turned to beef raising which requires less care. Farmers are paying up to \$325 for average milk cows, and more for mixed dairy feed. If milk prices had increased as much as wages in most sections milk would cost a lot more per quart.

"Milk is vital to the national defense, health, wealth and security. If the dairy farmer is to be kept in business, his increased costs must be balanced by increased returns, just as in any other business. And if the nation needs an increased milk supply serious attention must be given to the economic situation of the dairy farmer."

### The People's Choice?

"An American Presidential Convention is like nothing else in the civilized world," wrote one British observer. He went on to assert that while the American method of nominating a President seems fantastic to the uninitiated, it nevertheless produces candidates with a wide popular following, and in time of crisis often produces great men. He disagreed with an earlier visitor, Lord Bryce, who observed our electoral system and titled his chapter "Why Great Men Are Not Chosen Presidents."

Even to Americans, accustomed since childhood to the unique nature of an election year, the origin and organization of a national political Convention may be somewhat mysterious. How did we arrive at this method of choosing Presidential candidates? Nominating Conventions were not in the plans of the Founding Fathers, who abhorred political parties in any case. It was their idea that wise men from each state would put their heads together and choose the best man for the job. This plan was followed for a time or two, but by 1800 political parties were flourishing and the electoral college was becoming a figurehead.

In the early days nominations were made by a caucus of party members in Congress. It was the clamor against the undemocratic nature of this procedure that led to the invention of Nominating Conventions, which would allow more voters to take a hand. The first national Convention to nominate a President was held by a minor party, the Anti-Masons, in 1831. The major parties followed suit, and by the 1840's the convention system was firmly established.

In practice, the Convention turned out to be subject to abuses, and was not the miracle of democratic procedure in practice that it had been in theory. Around 1912 when enthusiasm for reform was great, it was widely thought that the Convention had seen its day and would shortly be replaced by the direct primary. Forty years later the prediction is still unfulfilled.

Nevertheless every four years the Convention comes in for a good deal of criticism, principally on the basis that it is unrepresentative and boss-controlled. The whole proceeding takes on an undemocratic air when the newspapers can report that this or that political figure controls so many delegates, and could swing the nomination to a particular candidate if he saw fit. There are those who believe that nomination by direct primary would be more democratic and less subject to machine control.

On the other hand, the Convention has its defenders, who think that it is theoretically sound and if it were more carefully regulated could do a good job of nominating a President. In theory it is a representative body chosen by party members. Its supporters argue that the Convention helps to promote party unity by getting leaders together for deliberation. They also believe that since the primary purpose of the party leaders is to win, they must necessarily reflect the popular will in their choice. One bill now before the Congress would provide for a combination of preference primaries in each state plus the national Convention.

### Farm Labor Situation Serious



"The farm labor situation throughout the country is becoming more acute and serious," according to C. R. Schoby, President of the American Dairy Association. Mr. Schoby, an Iowa dairy farmer, says growing shortages of dairy farm workers and the heavy investment a dairy farm demands today leads him to wonder if the question "how much does a quart of milk cost" may turn into "where can we get a quart of milk?"

"Census figures show," Mr. Schoby declared, "that there were about 1,920,000 fewer people working on U. S. farms in 1950 than in 1940.

"The decline of farm workers was caused largely by the decrease in the number of farm operators and family workers who are members of the operator's family, resulting from the decrease in the number of farms. There were approximately 500,000 fewer hired workers on farms in 1950 than in 1940. Expenditures for hired labor were 271 per cent greater than in 1939.

"The number of farms in the United States in 1950 was 405,000 less than in 1945 and 713,000 less than in 1940. The average size of farms increased from 174.0 acres in 1940 to 194.8 acres in 1945 and 210.5 acres in 1950. The percentage of farms operated by tenants declined from 38.7 in 1940 to 31.7 in 1945 and to 26.7 in 1950.

"Displacement of about 8,500,000 American farm workers by 1970 as a result of labor-saving devices 'revolutionary in impact' is forecast in a recent study made public by a Senate committee."

Mr. Schoby said that dairy farmers are using all possible mechanical devices to help them carry on their 365 day a year job of milk production.

"Mass production of milk on the dairy farm is not sufficient to take up the loss of labor," he added, "and overcome gradual disappearance of the family type farm. During the five years from 1945 to 1950 there was a decline of 124,000 in farms of from 100 to 219 acres."

Newly elected delegates to the Washtenaw Democratic County Convention will meet Wednesday, August 13, to perform their first official duties in the Democratic County Convention, to be held at the Washtenaw County Court House at 8:00 p. m.

County delegates at the convention will elect 15 delegates and 15 alternates to the Democratic State Convention, to be held August 16 in Lansing. Democratic candidates for the offices of Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General and Attorney General will be nominated at the State Convention.

Washtenaw county voters will elect delegates to the county convention for the first time elect delegates to the county conventions from candidates they themselves have nominated. Both the Democratic and Republican parties have nominated their candidates for county delegates by petition instead of by the antiquated nomination by precinct caucuses. In the Democratic party, however, as in the Republican party, some voting precincts in the county have failed to nominate a complete slate of delegates. Voters in these precincts may write in the names of their choices, as may, of course, the voters in areas which have a sufficient number of candidates.

J. Henry Owens, Washtenaw County Democratic Chairman, cautions that State election law requires that not only must the name be written in, but also an X must be placed before the name in order to make it a legally cast vote.

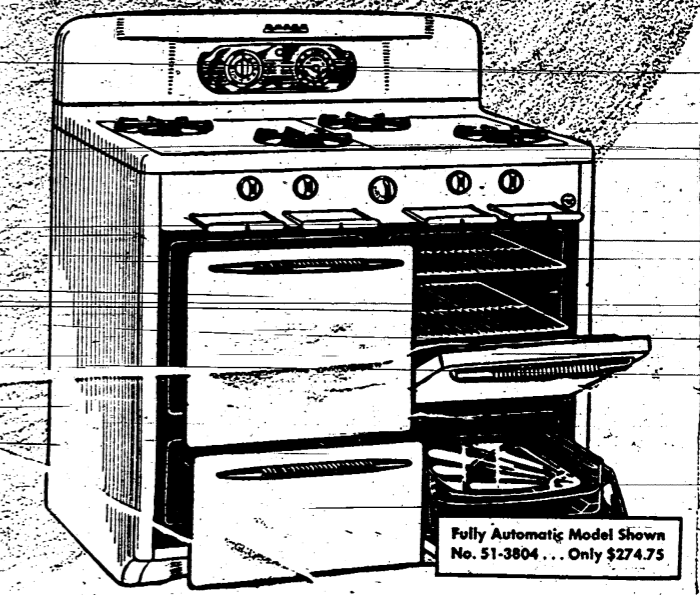


