



"COURT HOUSE FACTS"

The best evidence we can give to the taxpayers of Washtenaw County of the cost to them of the proposed new County Building is to quote from a letter received by us from the firm of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone—the special legal counsel employed by our Board of Supervisors to handle details of the financing proposals. We quote as follows:

Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone

July 2, 1952

... In order to give taxpayers of Washtenaw County an idea of the cost to them of the County Building under this plan, including the safeguards itemized, we submit the following, based upon a constant county equalized valuation of \$234,000,000 and a bond interest rate of 2% per annum. It must be remembered that valuations may increase, or decrease, and the interest rate may be higher or lower, depending on conditions, which would require an adjustment

(a) A rate of one and one-quarter mills on each dollar of asses valuation, as equalized, will be levied for 3 years commencing in 1953. In dollars this amounts to \$1.25 on each \$1,000 of valuation but it may be slightly more or less in various areas of the county to individual taxpayers because of the process of equalization.

(b) A rate of slightly under 1 mill on each dollar of assessed valua tion, as equalized, will be levied for the remaining 15 years, commencing in 1956. In dollars this amounts to under \$1.00 on each \$1,000 of valuation as equalized.

If valuations in Washtenaw County increase as they have in the past few years, and tax collections remain constant, the rates could be substantially reduced below those listed above after the bond reserve is established







Bedding the herd on sawdust will also mean savings in liquid manure. Such an investment, that will endure for possibly 75 years, should not be made until the taxpayers have an opportunity to select their preference

We do not desire to remove the County seat from the City of Ann Arbor. Ann Arbor can annex the Washtenaw Avenue site if it sincerely wishes to cooperate with the people of this County. Such action would remove all legal questions as to the location of the County seat.

We urge all the taxpayers to examine the site proposed for the Court House on Washtenaw Avenue in the grove at the west end of the County Farm property and decide for themselves where they want their money to be spent. We do not try to dictate that either of the two locations be selected but demand that the entire County be allowed to choose the site that they prefer. The statement that the present site is the only legal location is a smoke screen

that every thinking voter can see through. The present center of population and future plans of growth in the County clearly show that the Washtenaw Avenue site is the only proper location or any investment of this size in a new Court House.

respected by everyone in the County. Their study and decision shows the center of population to be near the Washtenaw site and is shifting east. The proposed three-story building and the two story concrete parking lot covering the entire block can only result in a factory type structure with a

great increase in car traffic in an already over-congested traffic area. Since the property belongs to all the people of the County, there is a question whether parking at the building can be denied to anyone and there is a possibility that the lot will be absorbed by downtown office workers leaving no space for the outsider with business at the Court House.

Parking at the Washtenaw Avenue site would be ample for all time without a large investment in ramps and concrete elevated space.

On every side today there is a complaint about the high tax burden in Federal, State, and local governments, We believe that a better located, more practical and beautiful Court House can be built on the Washtenaw Avenue site at a saving of between ½ and one million dollars. The present site is appraised at \$375,000. If this is sold, it will help to pay for a new building.

It has been said that this bond issue will cost \$5.00 for three years and \$4.00 for fifteen years on a home of \$4,000 assessment. Actually on the 1952 basis, the rate in Ann Arbor will be \$5.76 and all other districts will be still
