At the time this paper went to press Eisenhower had a popılar vote of 25,809,287 against Stevenson's 20,981,728, and was leading in electoral votes with 442 in 39 states against Stevenson's 89 electoral votes in nine

It became apparent that Eisenhower would win in a landslide at 12:00 last night, and shortly before 2 P. M. this morning, Stevenson conceded the victory.

Although he very much wanted to get overseas during World Wai years. I. Eisenhower never got outside the United States. Instead, he was put in command of a tank training school - an unusual assignment since the school had no tanks.

Following the war, he settled down to the monotony of peace time army life.

Eisenhower had many varied tours of duty but none of them colorful, at least from his view point. He spent two and a half years in the Panama Canal zone with Brig. Gen. "Fox" Connor, He met 'such men as the flambovant George S. Patton. The thing that was to lift him out of monotonous anonymity was his assignment, in February, 1933, as assistant to the then chief of staff. Gen. Douglas MacArthur. When MacArthur went to the Philippines as special ad-
