Couple Injured in Flaming Truck Crash

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Riedel, 124 Torrey Street, Manchester, were injured Wednesday when their automobile collided with a truck and, burned at the intersection of M-92 and US-12.

They were rushed to St. Joseph Hospital, Ann Arbor, where Mr. Riedel's condition was listed as serious. The Riedels were thrown clear of their car which burst into flames after being hurled 150 feet by the impact.

The Riedel car had been destroyed by fire before the Chelsea Fire Department was able to reach the accident scene.

Washtenaw County Deputy Sheriff George Doe, who investigated the crash, said the Riedels were driving north on M-92 and crossing US-12, they collided with the large semi-truck driven by William C. Buck. The truck was registered in the name of Levine Wastepaper Co., Kalamazoo.

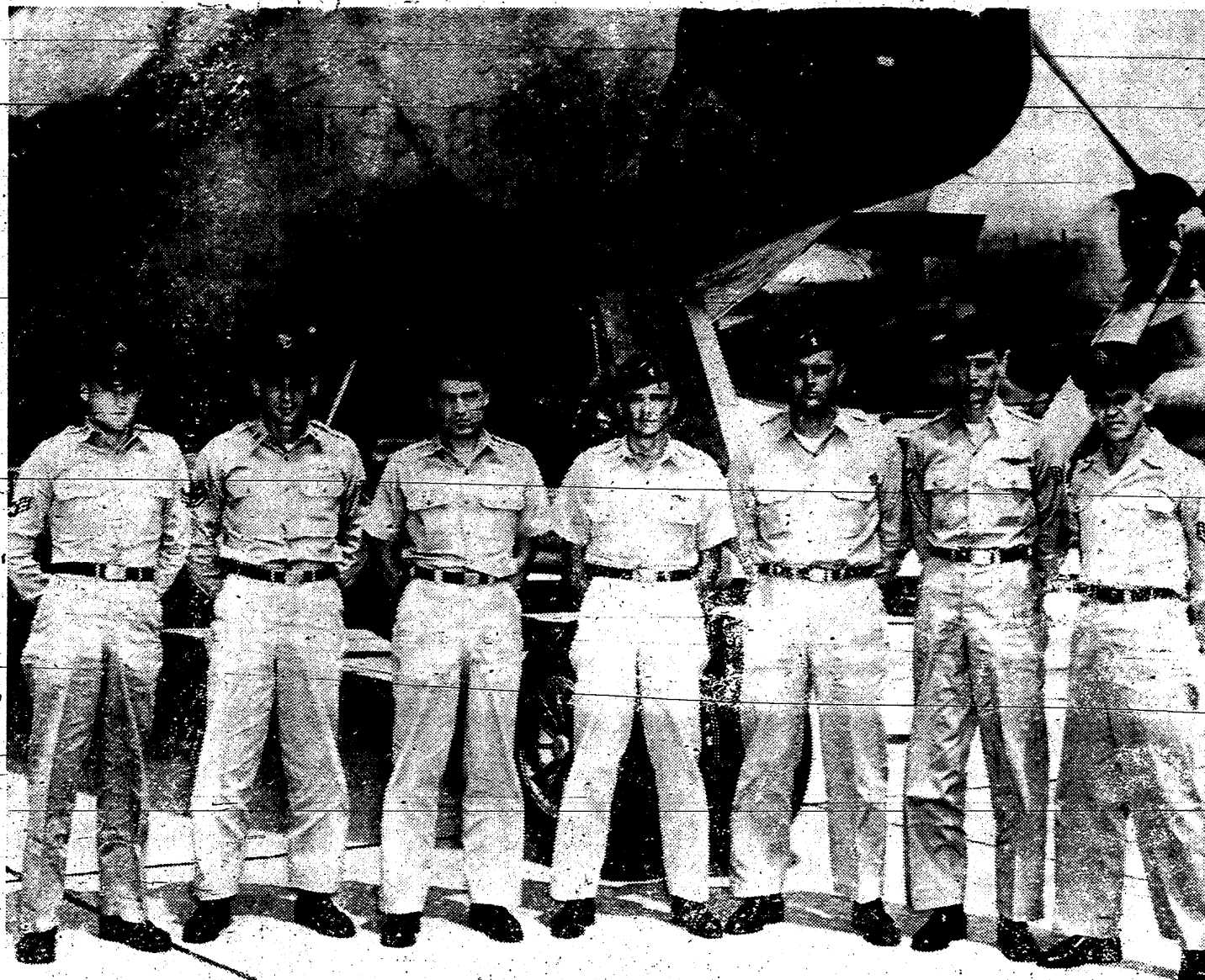
The reunion next year will be the second Sunday in July at Carr Park.

376 ARS Crew Named Crew Of Month Of May

The ability to bring an aircraft through without mishap after an engine failure and with limited navigation brought 1st Lt. Forrest F. Cathey's crew the honor of being nominated crew of the month of the 376th Bomb Wing.

Cathy's crew was nominated after their success of bringing a KC-97 into Goose Bay, Labrador, after an engine failure while orbiting at the rendezvous point, awaiting the passing of the B-47 of the 301st Bomb Wing.

While awaiting the approach of the B-47s, one of the engines failed without notification. After determining that the fuel they carried would not be needed by the passing B-47s they dumped their load to allow them to keep flying speed on three engines.

Only limited navigation facilities were available and due to bad weather conditions they were unable to communicate with Goose Bay. This was the first flight over the great ice cap for this crew and also the first engine failure since they had become combat ready. Good crew coordination and crew discipline during this emergency saved a potentially dangerous situation appear routine, according to a report from the Barkley to communicate with Goose Louisiana.

1st Lt. Cathey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Cathey of Manchester. Other members of the crew are: 2nd Lt. James Hall, pilot; T-Sgt. Everett Clinger, flight engineer; A 1c Mark Cotter, assistant boom operator.

Two Board Members Re-Elected at Meeting

The bleachers at the high school auditorium were filled to capacity at the annual school meeting at which some 117 persons cast votes to elect two school district officers whose terms had expired.

Luther Klager was unanimously re-elected to succeed himself and Laurin Leeson was re-elected to the board by a wide majority.

In a letter addressed to the school board, Dr. H. P. Eames wrote "with much regret but because of health I find it necessary to resign from the school board." His unexpired two years on the board will be filled by Dan Boutell who received a large majority of the 117 votes cast.

At the meeting of the school board which followed the annual meeting Mr. Klager was re-elected president; Laurin Leeson re-elected secretary and Dan Boutell was elected treasurer.

Tellers at the annual election were James Tomphey, Stanton Koesch, Ross Knorr, Herbert Jacob, Albert Sutton and Erwin Buss.

The school board's recommendation that the salary for each board member for the coming year be \$100 per year was approved, was adopted. It was also noted that Mr. Ray Kerr has been hired to make monthly reconciliation statements and annual audit of books.

It was noted that the school year be 90 months in starting up the year's activities, president Klager said that "it has been a busy year with many decisions to be met. On all major decisions a planning committee was called in to help. I am still thinking which was a cross section opinion of the district."

Klager noted that 11 farms have annexed since the meeting a year ago—the final decision to erect a high school on the Davis site of

13 acres was made—the school board also bought the Schwab property.

During the year the voters of Manchester and surrounding area voted in favor of a \$165,000 bond issue. Mr. Klager noted that all rural schools are being checked by the attorney for schools' legal interest. Those buildings and sites that will not be used as schools, will be advertised for sale according to school law and in case of disposition former board members of the district in question will be called in and a vote taken in the district pertaining to sale.

The report of the secretary, Laurin Leeson was approved.

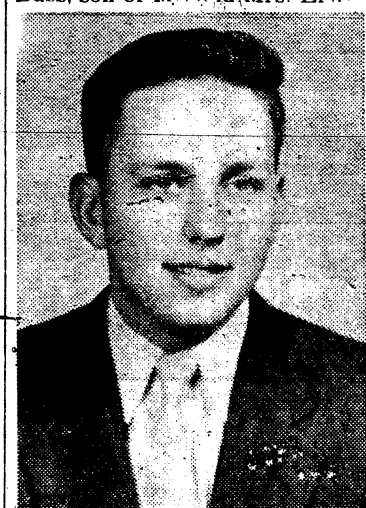
In giving his report, Supt. of Schools Fred Atkinson said that "patience and understanding on the part of the faculty and the parent's went far to help in the operating of the 6 rural schools and the local school." He mentioned that shorthand has been added to the subjects offered and that three teachers complete the staff of the school system and that, with few exceptions, the vacancies have been filled. A complete list of the teachers and personnel will be given at a later date along with subjects now available to the students.

It is expected that group will be broken next week for the new school for which contracts totaling \$411,000 have been let.

As the school board begins another busy year it might be well to note that Luther Klager and Walter Schied are beginning their 14th year. Laurin Leeson his 7th, Laurel Breitenwischer his second and new on the board is Dan Boutell, who has served as chairman of the school planning committee for the past year, and to whom the job of treasurer will not be unfamiliar.
