Last year, when we had no facilities, we took 12 children to other counties for detention - expensive in time and money. We put 19 children under 17 years of age in the County Juli, which is illegal and also unwise if we want to prevent further delinquency. In addition, 103 children could not be cared for because we had no home for them.

The facilities of other counties are now closed to us. They have had an increase in need and must use them for their own cases.

The present tentative plans for a juvenile home. If the voters approve on November 2, contemplate exection of a one-story home. like structure where 4 children could be cared for under the supervision of foster parents who will have quarters in the building. More children could be provided for cocasionally if necessary but at present it is thought a home of this size will be sufficient, inasmuch as it is amilcipated that each child's stay will be for a very few days.
