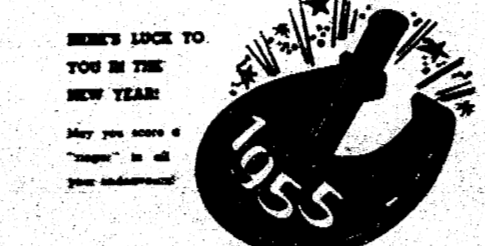

In the Dec. 1 announcement of a U.S.-Chinese Nationalist mutual security treaty, the Pescadore Islands, 30 miles west of Formosa, were specified along with Formosa as protected. But as for other islands, the announcement said only that "other territories under the jurisdiction of the parties" could be included "by agreement." In the absence of any such agreement, this country would not be committed under the treaty to help keep Chiang in control of islands other than the Pescadores. That the 30 miles northwest of Formosa but near the mainland and of Yushan, 30 miles still further north.
