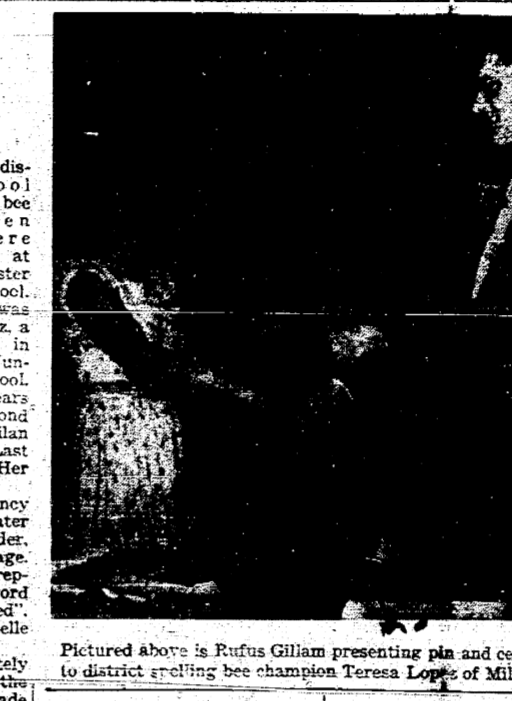

**Renew 4-H Public Speaking Program For 5th Year**  
The 4-H Public Speaking Program, in which thousands of boys and girls throughout the nation have learned how to speak convincingly, has been renewed by the State Extension Service for 1954.

This is the fifth consecutive year that the Pure Oil Company has provided the awards in this program.

County and state awards are offered by the donor in 26 states. County-wide public speaking trials will be arranged by Extension agents and the outstanding boy and girl in each county will receive a gold-filled medal of honor.

The next contest is a national watch for the high ranking boy and a set of silverware for the top ranking girl.

**Whooping Cough Is On The Increase**  
Whooping cough is on the increase in Michigan. Dr. Albert E. Hixler, state health commissioner, reports, in advising vaccination for all children under 5 years of age.

The commissioner said that 66 cases of whooping cough had been reported in the past week, and 1,090 cases had been reported so far this year. This is almost triple the 399 cases reported in the same period last year and more than double the 491 cases reported in the same period in 1952.

Whooping cough, which often has serious complications, particularly in babies, can be prevented by immunization, which the state health department recommends, should be started when the baby is three months old. A booster dose is advised at 2 to 3 years of age.

**Michigan Holstein Becomes Highest Butterfat Producer**

1478.4 lbs. in 1 Year Is Second Highest Record in History of U. S. Official Production Testing.

Influenced perhaps by the world famous mass production techniques of nearby Detroit industry, Edna Dale Durlin, 54-year-old registered Holstein owned by Jack R. Bodd of Belleville, Michigan, has become the highest living butterfat producer in the nation.

Her production record of 1478.4 lbs. butterfat and 23,195 lbs. milk in 365 days places her second only to the late Carnation Homestead Dairy Madoep whose 1512 lbs. record consisted in 1953 standards.

In many ways, her residence in Michigan is appropriate, for Michigan will be host to Holstein breeders from all across the nation the first week in June at the 59th Annual Convention of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America in Grand Rapids, Michigan is also the home of the all-time champion milk producer, Green Meadow Livy Park, owned by Mrs. Green of Elsie. Her record of 42,808 lbs. milk was completed in 1951 and has never been topped.

At 8 years, 3 months, Anna first joined the exclusive ranks of cows producing over 1000 lbs. butterfat in one year with 10784 lbs. fat and 25,790 lbs. milk. Her next record of 12 years 8 months resulted in 10837 lbs. fat and 27,397 lbs. milk in 365 days.

Eight different supervisors were employed in the conduct of her latest test which was supervised by Michigan State College in cooperation with the Michigan Friesian Association of America.

Anna is classified "Excellent" for body conformation, the highest classification a cow can receive. She was bred at the famed Durlin farms near Elliott City, Maryland.

As Anna's record was made under both Herd Improvement and Advanced Management rules, she is the top producer among cows on Herd Improvement Registry.

She is automatically the highest producer in Michigan for the year and among Holsteins is the 36th highest cow to produce 10,000 lbs. milk or more in a year and the 48th and top cow on three-time-a-day milking, a rough idea of Anna's production may be gained from the fact she provided the equivalent of 35 lbs. of butter enough to provide 35 families with a pound a week for the year. Her milk supply would provide a half-pint glass of milk per meal three times daily for 50 children.

Her production is about equal to six and one-half average U. S. cows.

Among dairymen, not the least of her honors is the fact she has completed three lactations above 1000 lbs. of butterfat in succession, producing 86,394 lbs. milk and 3,644.1 lbs. butterfat since she was 8 years, 3 months old.

**Farm Equipment Production Increases**

CHICAGO (AP)—There's been some pick up in employment at the farm equipment manufacturing plants now that spring is here, but they still are employing fewer than a year ago.

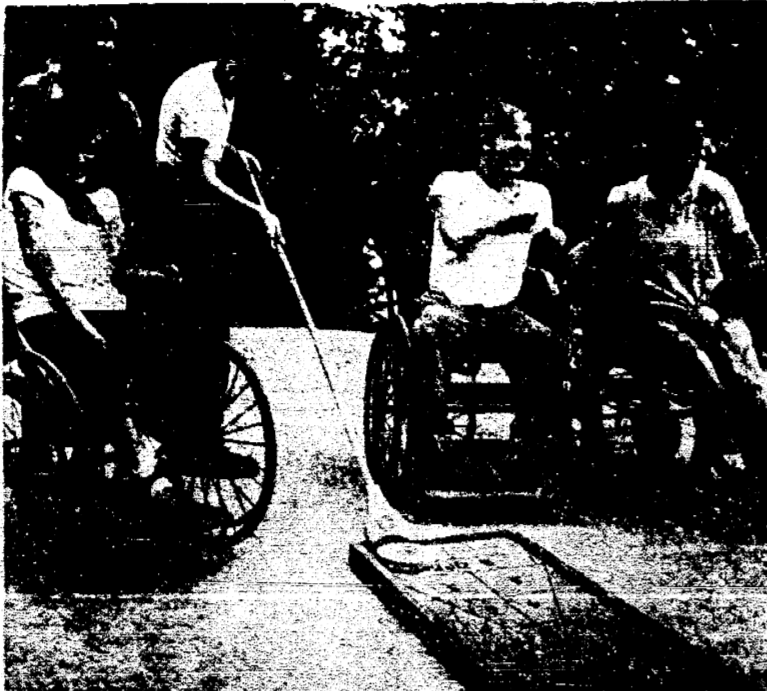
International Harvester Co., biggest manufacturer, today reported a slow upward trend in employment since last December, which was just about the low point, and a spokesman said the company was more optimistic about prospects.

Harvester employment was down to 42,888 in its manufacturing plants last December. The last official count on March 1, disclosed employment had climbed back to 54,115. The company estimates it's now above 55,000. A year ago Harvester's employment was 60,000.

Alva W. Phelps, chairman of Oliver Corp., recently told stockholders at the annual meeting that employment at the company's plants has not been expanded because of stockholders' demands for dividends.

A spokesman for the J. I. Case Co. of Racine, Wis., said employment there had reached the bottom point around the end of last year and now is on the upswing.

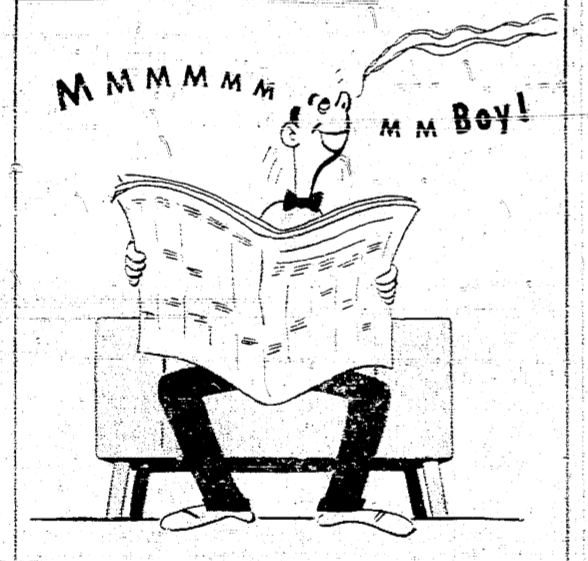

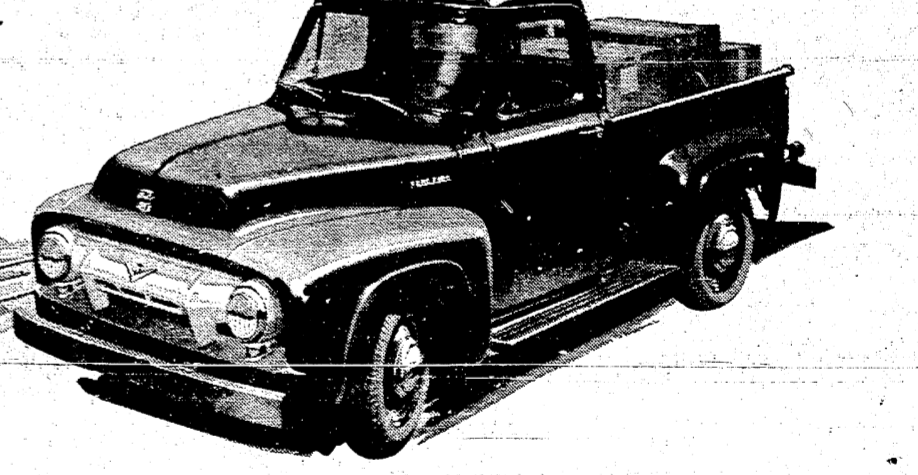
