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**Speed Exacts Biggest Toll**  
 "Slow down and live longer. Drive too fast and die that much sooner."  
 That's the message of Sergeant Claude Bartell, commanding officer of the Clinton Post of the Michigan State Police, in pointing out that June, July and August are the months when speed, the No. 1 public enemy on the highway, takes its greatest toll.  
 Michigan law enforcement agencies are now cooperating in a state-wide campaign to

make motorists more speed-conscious.  
 "Last year 45 per cent of the fatal accidents were for speeding or driving too fast for conditions," Sergeant Bartell said. "Safety appeals are meant for all. If drivers will gear their speed to existing conditions, such as traffic and weather, it will definitely cut down the number of fatalities."  
 In 1953 there were more than 1900 persons killed and nearly 58,000 injured in 184,000 accidents in Michigan. This was an increase over 1952 of nine per cent in deaths, 18 per cent in injuries and 15 per cent in accidents.  
 Ran-off-roadway accidents, the type most commonly attributed to driving too fast for conditions, accounted for 435 of the deaths.  
 Motor vehicle travel in Michigan during the summer months will jump from the daily average of 71,000,000 miles to 80 million.  
 "This means greater exposure to accidents," Sergeant Bartell said. "The state law does not require that speeds be no greater than conditions justify. In other words, be sensible and use good judgement at the wheel. Avoid that accident. It's possible."

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
**Ford's Brooklyn Work To Change**  
 Manufacturing operations at the Brooklyn Ford plant will be moved to the recently expanded Ypsilanti Parts and Equipment Division and the Brooklyn site will be enlarged for new production work, a Ford Motor Co. spokesman announced today.  
 Employees of the Brooklyn

plant were informed today of the operations transfer by Walter H. Simpson, Ypsilanti plant manager.  
 Simpson said that some 210 Brooklyn employees will be offered an opportunity to transfer to Ypsilanti during the change-over period, and those moving will retain their company seniority.  
 The new operations planned for Brooklyn will require only about 100 employees, but future product developments may increase this figure, Simpson said. He added the over-all result should be increased employment in the Ypsilanti and Brooklyn areas.  
 Construction of a 9,600 sq. ft. addition to the present 14,000 sq. ft. Brooklyn plant is slated to begin early in July. Initial production at the enlarged facilities is planned for late 1954.  
 Transfer of machinery will start about July 1. The Brooklyn plant, which went into operation in 1939, now produces starter and spotlight switches and distributors.  
 Field cured hay loses nearly twice as much dry matter, and more than twice as much protein, as hay put up as grass silage, a three-year study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture showed.
