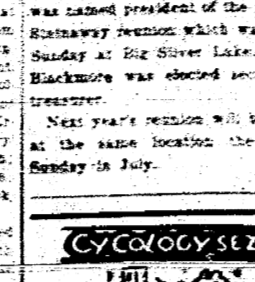

Facts About Aging Persons Gathered By U-M Division

ANN ARBOR—Most of the 462,000 Michiganans 65 years of age and over live in the southern half of the Lower Peninsula; forty per cent of them dwell in the counties of Wayne, Kent, Oakland and Genesee. There are among facts gathered by the division of Gerontology at the University of Michigan in compiling information concerning the problems of aging. Population figures from the 1950 U.S. Census were used. Actually every county in the state showed an increase in persons 65 and older from 1940 to 1950, as might be expected. However, this ranged from just over five per cent in Kalamazoo to 110 per cent in Roscommon.

However, it's the proportion of the population in that age group that is most important. Proportions are smallest in the industrial counties of Macomb, Oakland, Midland, Wayne and Genesee and largest in the counties of Lake, Washtenaw, Kalamazoo, Ingham and Grand Traverse. The state has the lowest proportion with just under five per cent, and the highest with 14 per cent.

The U-M division also found that the proportion of these older persons receiving 24 or more hours of care for the aged in Michigan is higher than for counties in the northern part of the state.

This and other information concerning Michigan's aging population is being made available in a series of pamphlets and various problems concerning persons 65 and over. A complete list of these pamphlets is available in the Gerontology division of the University of Michigan.

Michigan Bell Seeks Rate Increase

The Public Service Commission has evidence before it of increased expense and investment, together with declining earnings, for Michigan Bell Telephone Company in the latter's efforts to obtain a rate increase.

At a hearing before the Commission, Michigan Bell presented testimony showing its investment is up about \$30,000,000, that the company's recent wage settlement had increased operating expense over \$2,000,000 a year, and that earnings are down \$1,700,000 a year—all since the last year ending Sept. 30 which the Commission used in denying the company's original rate request last May.

Keynoting the company's request, Jack H. Shuler, its general attorney, said, "Telephone rates are simply not adequate to cover 1954 costs and provide an adequate return on a greatly expanded investment. We are proud of the job we have done and are doing. But we need the help of this Commission to provide the strength and the muscle for the job ahead."

The rehearing is scheduled to continue at a later, indefinite date. Lawyers opposing the company's request have asked that the scope of the hearing be broadened to include the reasonableness of present rates.

Postal Rate Hike Forces New Price

Rising costs have made it necessary for the Post Office Department to increase mailing rates for weekly newspapers like this paper of yours.

Mailing rates have more than doubled in the past two years. It is difficult to keep with the advance, your weekly newspaper has been forced to add less than a cent a week to the mailing subscription cost.

Effective September first, the small subscription price will be \$3.00 per year within the state of Michigan and \$3.50 outside of the state. These rates include postage paid delivery anywhere in the United States, its Possessions or Canada.

Until September first, subscriptions may be renewed at the old rate for price not regardless of when they expire, until a future date. It may be extended one year for \$2.50 within Michigan and \$3.00 outside the state.

100 Years of History Observed at Irish Hills

One hundred years of history in the heart of the already historic Irish Hills of Michigan was marked Sunday, August 15 by St. Joseph's Catholic church of the Irish Hills.

All of the present church edifices and its famed Way of the Cross have not been there a century but the church structure and a portion of the tower have. The old church, with its names of pioneer settlers in the region, has not changed. Giving added meaning to the celebration will be descendants of the God-follower pioneer people who built the church.

Located on U.S. 12, near Iron Lake and not far from Wampers, Ann Arbor, Kelly, Evans, and Wood lakes, the site of St. Joseph's was a site of the great St. Joseph's mission. Permanent white settlement in the Irish Hills began in a article when survey and work on the Chicago Road was begun in 1825, and ended as a flood of immigration surged along La Plaisance Road (present M-50) from Monroe to Jackson, coming across later from Buffalo to Monroe and then by wagon and cart to or through Cambridge Junction.

The Irish who have made the hills their own, were not the first settlers. They had, about that time, other and more pressing problems, little things like getting enough to eat to keep alive on the hills. Though a family has been here since the 1820's.

Once settled in the new land, they made it as much an integral part of their lives as had been their old country. Catholicism's pioneering in the Irish Hills is tied in with Monroe, where there was a group of devoted and energetic Redemptorist Fathers. One of these Fr. Agostino Saultiers, was one of the first. If not the first, to say Mass in the Irish Hills area. In the new church, built by John Lambert who constructed so many of the one-room schoolhouses in the district, the first Mass was said by Fr. Edward Van Lanuwe during the Civil War. Shortly after, Bishop LaFevre came from Detroit to administer Confirmation.

In 1825 the little church which had served so long, was enlarged, by Monsignor Joseph V. Pfeiffer, former pastor at Manchester at the time that Irish Hills church was one of St. Mary's Missions. The old church was not discarded but, instead, was incorporated in the new building. Walls and tower were built higher, and a new transept and sacristy constructed.

In 1923, St. Joseph's famed outdoor Way of the Cross was begun with Mass. After the leading motivating force.

Today this Way of the Cross, tracing as it does Christ's journey from Pilate's judgment Seat to Calvary, is a focal point for thousands of visitors yearly. Now a parish church, a new pastor will be occupied by Fr. Henry Hengstfeldt.
