State Fair Salutes Michigan Dairy Industry

The importance of the dairy industry of Michigan will be told in a special \$12,000 exhibit at the 1954 Michigan State Fair, Sept. 3 through 12.

One of the objects of the exhibit will be to show the versatility of milk products. For instance, there will be several hundred kinds of cheese on display and an attractive counter of ice creams in unusual molded forms.

The various steps of the dairy industry, from the cow to the bottle of milk on the doorstep will be depicted along with rather astounding facts about the industry.

Michigan, with 654,000 dairy cows ranks 5th in the Nation in total milk production, 7th in the amount of milk bottled, 6th in increased milk production, and 6th in butter and ice cream.

Income from dairy products is the largest source of farm income in Michigan. This is in spite of the fact that the average cow sells



3 to 4 tons of hay, 1 to 1 ton of grain and pasture from 1 to 2 acres in a year's time.

It takes 8.7 quarts of milk to make a pound of butter, 4.48 quarts for a pound of cheese, 2.61 quarts for a pound of whole milk powder. The average Michigan cow gives 3,000 quarts of milk annually.

These and many other facts will be learned by the 160,000 expected visitors to the State Fair, which is saluting the Dairy Industry of Michigan this year.

Substitute Clerk-Carriers positions at the Manchester post office require civil service examinations for permanent appointments according to J. A. Connor, Director of the Seventh U. S. Civil Service Region.

The starting pay is \$1,615.10 an hour with opportunity for advancement. Additional compensation is provided for night work and for authorized overtime. Competition in this examination is restricted to residents of Manchester and persons now employed in the Manchester post office, who are between the ages of 18 and 50 years. These age limits are waived for veterans or individuals holding temporary or indefinite appointments should they be considered for permanent appointments.

The duties of these positions require examination and applicants must be physically fit to perform the duties of the position. A written test is required of all applicants.

9 Individual Farms Annex To Local School System

The meeting was called after specific property owners had petitioned to be annexed to the Manchester school system. Their petition was recognized and approved at the special meeting.

These farms, now a part of the local school system, include those of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Kerr, Mr. and Mrs. George W. Miller, John B. Fahy and Mr. and Mrs. James J. Fahy, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schaffer, Allan and Margaret Rutter, Dorothy, Dolby, Lawrence J. Gunn, Maurice Martin and Frank W. Minor.

This is the first time that individual farms in the English school district have petitioned and been annexed to the local schools. According to Supt. Fred Atkinson, this latest group of farms will avail themselves of the privileges of having school buses stop and pick up students commuting to and from school.

He has asked that parents of children of school age contact him so that school bus schedules can be arranged for the best possible transportation program.

Some Oil Wells Plugged; Others Are Being Drilled

Oil activity in the immediate area of Clinton ceased with the announcement of Big Rapids Driller William C. Taggart that he had plugged all of his wells in the area including the single producer.

The wells had been under tests for some months and most had long been considered probably dry holes but Taggart had said more tests would probably be forthcoming.

The only producing oil well, located on the Charles H. Curtis farm just north of Clinton on the Manchester-Clinton Rd., failed to respond to efforts to cut off the increasing amount of water about two months ago. The well is now dry but reportedly produced a considerable amount of oil, according to observers.

In Salem Township area, the oil picture was considerably brighter. The most well on the Charles Nerretter farm on Chubb Rd. between Sevon and Eight Mile Rds is flowing strongly and producing high grade oil. Clinton Co. has been busy hauling away tank-trucks of oil which is flowing freely with an average sometimes reaching 300 barrels in 24 hours. At present plans are underway to lay a pipe from the well to the farm house. The new drilling will take place south of the house at a spot only half a mile from the Nerretter farm and near the Elmer Hasb farm. Last spring the drilling went down about 200 feet and feet before abandoning it.
