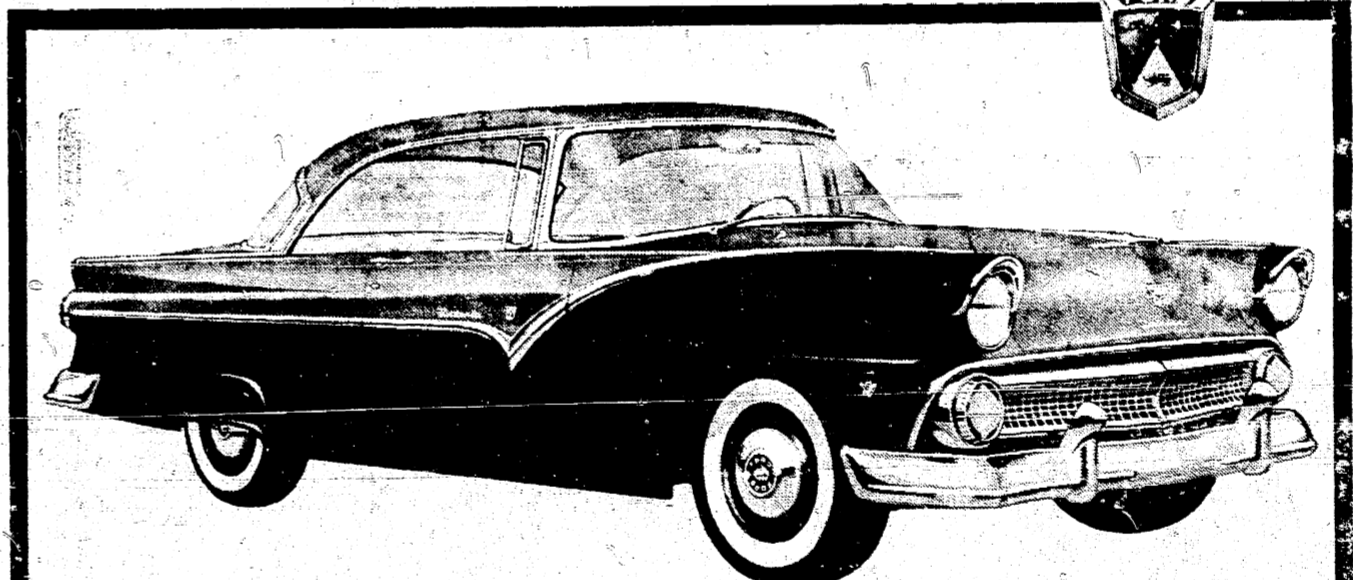

FIXIN' UP TIPS
For the Home

Christmas Cookie Bin

HERB'S Christmas cookie bin which keeps the various kinds on separate sliding trays, quickly accessible and unbroken from mass piling. Make it a foot wide, 12 inches deep and 14 to 16 inches high, depending on available space.

Slides should be dressed lumber, white pine or poplar. Slides for the trays may be cut with a table saw, spacing the 1/2" slots about 2 1/2" apart. To form the rest of the

cookie bin, and of screw Masonite 1/2" tempered plywood to the top, bottom and back. The slides are made of the same material, long wearing material, which does not retain odors and is easily kept clean.

At the front of each slide attach a piece of half-inch wood, on edge, with screws. Have each "lip" extend to the extreme on either side and fit snugly against the bottom of the slide immediately above. This provides a practically air-tight cover for each slide. Attach a pull to each. Attach a similar piece of wood to the opposite end of each slide to prevent cookies from spilling out.

To assure a first-rate joint where the top and back meet, place a length of wood one inch square inside and fasten the Tempered Plywood to it.

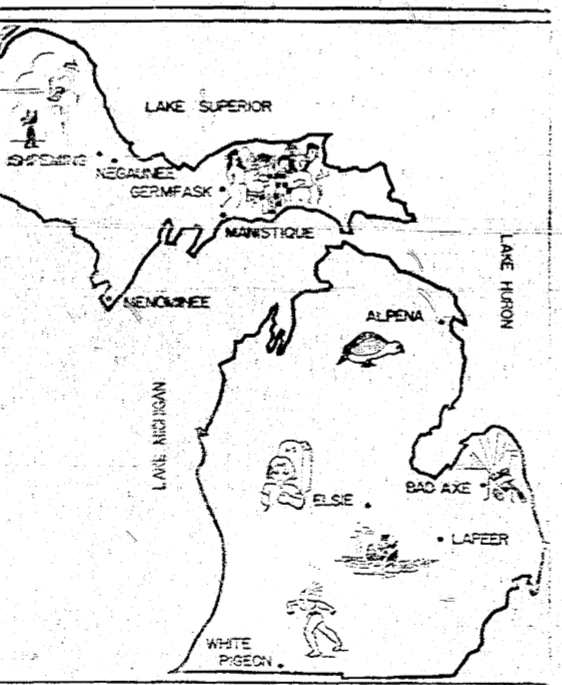
WELSH RABBIT

1 teaspoon dry mustard

7 Million To Have Colds

Do you have a cold? Well, partner, you've got company. In Michigan there are an estimated seven million people who will "catch" at least one cold this winter, the Michigan Department of Health says.

And Michigan residents average about 2 1/2 colds per person per year, the Health Department points out. About one person in four has four colds a year.

The common cold, the Health Department continues, is the most expensive disease we have. From 50 to 60 per cent of all absenteeism from work is due to colds and the estimated cost of the common cold runs around two billion dollars a year for the nation.

Actually, the Health Department points out, there are three waves of colds during the winter. The first wave in Michigan is generally in October when we first start heating our homes and offices.

The second wave arrives around Christmas and is probably due to the bringing together of family groups from all over the country for the holidays. And the third wave is in March when the weather is very uncertain.

The Health Department says that there are actually two types of colds. One that starts in the nose and develops rather quickly and another that starts in the throat and develops more slowly. Fall colds, the Health Department continues, are more of the sneezy, runny-nose type while winter colds are associated with sore throats.

To avoid colds the Health Department says it's very important to dress according to the weather and to avoid getting wet or chilled. Since both conditions seem to encourage lower resistance to "development of any infection including the cold virus."

There is no medicine that will cure a cold, the Health Department emphasizes, and the simplest and probably best way to treat a cold is to go to bed immediately. This accomplishes three things, the Health Department concludes. It helps you to rest and prevents you from spreading the cold to others. And if the cold persists see a physician.

Government Gives Wool Support

Michigan sheepmen will get a total of about 82 cents a pound for wool shorn after Jan. 1st, that's counting the government payment.

Arthur Mauch, a Michigan State agricultural economist, explains the payment operation this way: Sheepmen will receive a direct payment from the government after they sell wool on the open market.

The government payment will be approximately the difference between the U. S. average price and the 62 cents a pound. Mauch points out that the 62 cents is 106 per cent of the Sept. 15 wool parity price. The subsidy to each sheep raiser, for the 1955 clip probably will not be known until 1956, he indicates.

And the total amount of money available for the payments is limited to 70 per cent of the tariff receipts on wool imports. Mauch advises farmers to keep accurate receipts of the wool they sell in order to get the government payment.

"One nice thing about money—the color never clashes with any outfit you're wearing," Bill Lawrence.
