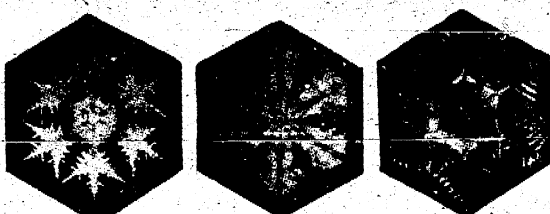

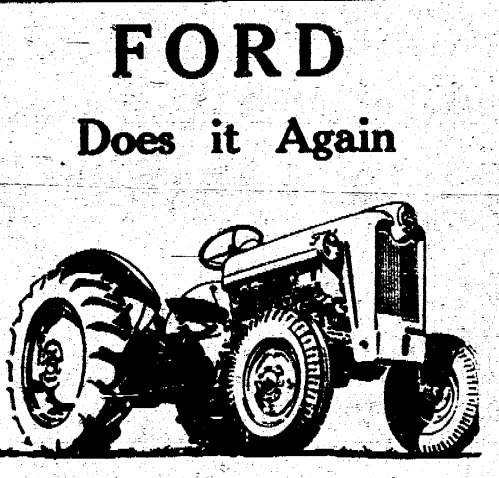

be made on the fair.

Following is the letter which
was sent to the "Fair Commis-
sion" committee by the Manches-
ter Parent-Teacher Association.

"At present, community fairs
are being held in Saline, Milan,
Livonia and Chelsea. The Manches-
ter County 4-H Show being held
at the Pleasantside site in
Ann Arbor.

"The County Fairgrounds
have been sold to the City of
Ann Arbor and the under-
standing that a site would be
provided on which facilities for
future agricultural and horti-

cultural events could be devel-
oped by rural interests.

"The committee wants as
many as possible of our Manches-
ter Merchants' Association after meet-
ing with Mr. Hollis C. Ayres, secretary and
chairman, membership chairman."

"The question has been rais-
ing as to whether Washtenaw
County should try to develop a
county wide fair, which would
take the place of community
fairs and county shows, or
should they continue under the
present arrangement of com-
munity fairs and County 4-H
Shows.

"Continuing under the latter
plan means that a joint effort
would be worked out with the
City, to provide facilities on
the fairgrounds. A lot of work
and considerable progress has
been made along this line.

"The members agreed the theme
of the event should stress the ac-
tivities of small-town shopping
where customers can get practically
anything to be found in big-city
shops, without the attendant line-
ups and crowds.

"The program will seek to attrac-
territory into Manchester to learn
of these advantages and to im-
press on Manchesterites the wis-
dom of patronizing their hometown
business—other pastures are
NOT greener.

"Where in your opinion
would be a satisfactory site if
you do not agree with the pres-
ent proposed site?

"How do you propose to finance
the project?"

"The meeting on Jan. 15 is
important, as action must be
taken. The committee solicits
your response and views on
this problem."

Michigan Health Department Submits Year-End Summary

Michigan's public health program shows encouraging signs of progress and promises even greater accomplishments to come in the years ahead, according to Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner.

Michigan's population passed the seven million mark in 1954 and continues to grow more rapidly than in any other state in the North Central region of the United States. Population of the state is expected to reach eight million by 1960.

In 1954 the birth rate broke all previous records with 27 babies being born for every thousand persons in the state. The total number of births for the year in Michigan is estimated at 192,000, about 10,000 more than in 1953. October set an all-time monthly record with 17,400 registered births, followed closely by the 17,130 births recorded in August.

through the end of the year the number of new tuberculosis cases in Michigan for 1954 should be around 5,300, compared to 5,643 reported in 1953.

Deaths for 1954 remained fairly constant at nine per thousand. Maternal deaths maintained the low rate of 5 per thousand live births.
