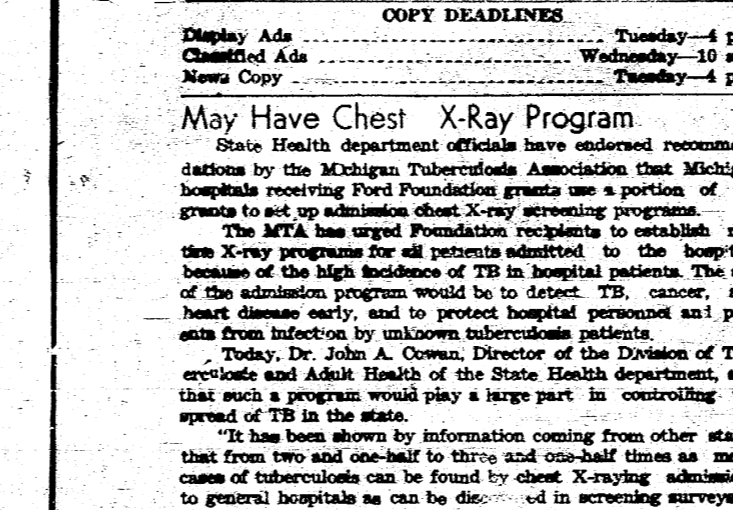

Ann Arbor Firm To Produce For Duncan Hines

Starting February 1, Automatic Controls Corporation of Ann Arbor will produce seven products for Duncan Hines Industries of Ithaca, New York. This was revealed today by the firm's president, Hugh C. Carver, Jr. He said this famed gourmet had given these products his personal endorsement.

Employers Seek College Grads To Fill Jobs

An apparent increase in employer demand for well trained college and university graduates probably is a direct reflection of the nation's robust economic health.

From many quarters—business, educational and technical fields—comes the complaint that not enough engineers or teachers or other specialists are available to fill current needs. The shortage of graduate engineers and teachers appear particularly great.

Whatever the reasons, prospective employers interviewed Michigan State University students at a recently concluded fall term.

The number of placement interviews with students by business industry and education during the 1955-56 fall term was 26 per cent greater than during the same term a year ago, according to Jack Brelvin, M.S.U. Placement Bureau director.

The bureau arranged 276 interview schedules for 222 representatives of business, industry and education. A total of 1,511 students were interviewed, 26 per cent more than in the prior fall term.

Brelvin, using estimates from employers, listed the following amounts as average monthly starting salaries in major fields for students with bachelor degrees:

Engineering, \$26; business and public service, \$26; communication arts, \$20; education, \$20; engineering, \$26; home economics, \$30; science and arts, \$30; veterinary medicine, \$40.

Atomic Research Aids Fertilizer Effectiveness

Tests with radioactive isotopes at Michigan State University have shown the way to improve liquid fertilizers.

Horticulturist F. G. Teubner said his experiments showed that other combinations of liquid fertilizers can be absorbed by plants quicker than those now in use. The radioactive material used with the fertilizers, made it easy to measure how fast they were absorbed.

Plants with large leaf areas are able to absorb large amounts of fertilizer quicker than if plant food were applied to the soil.

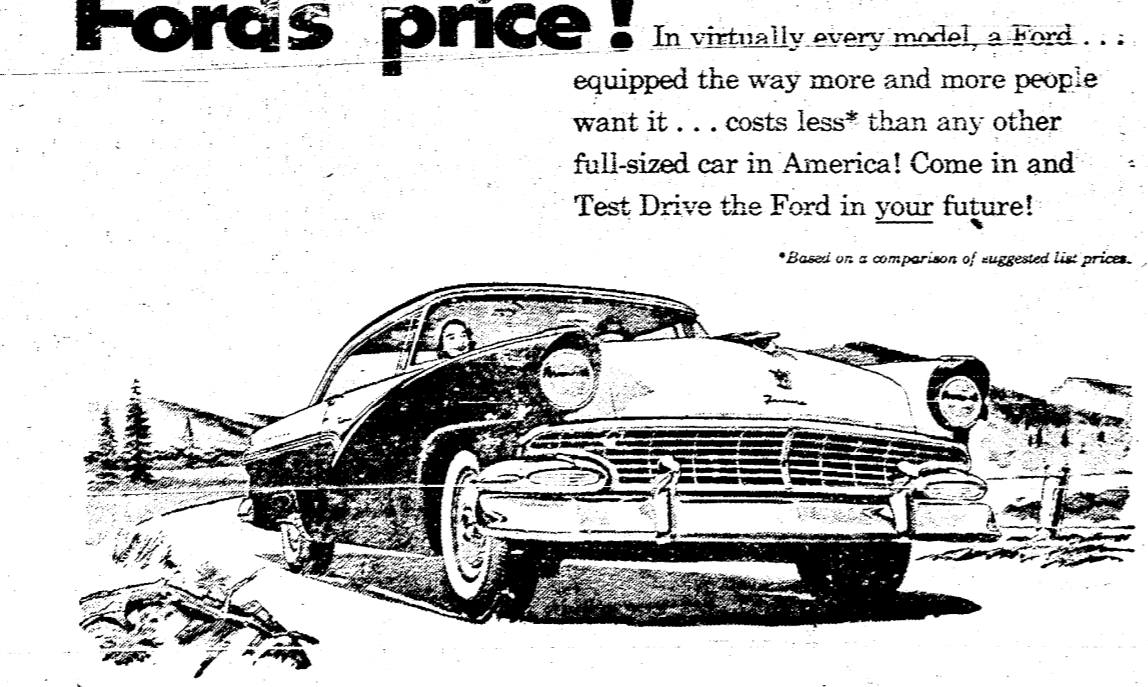

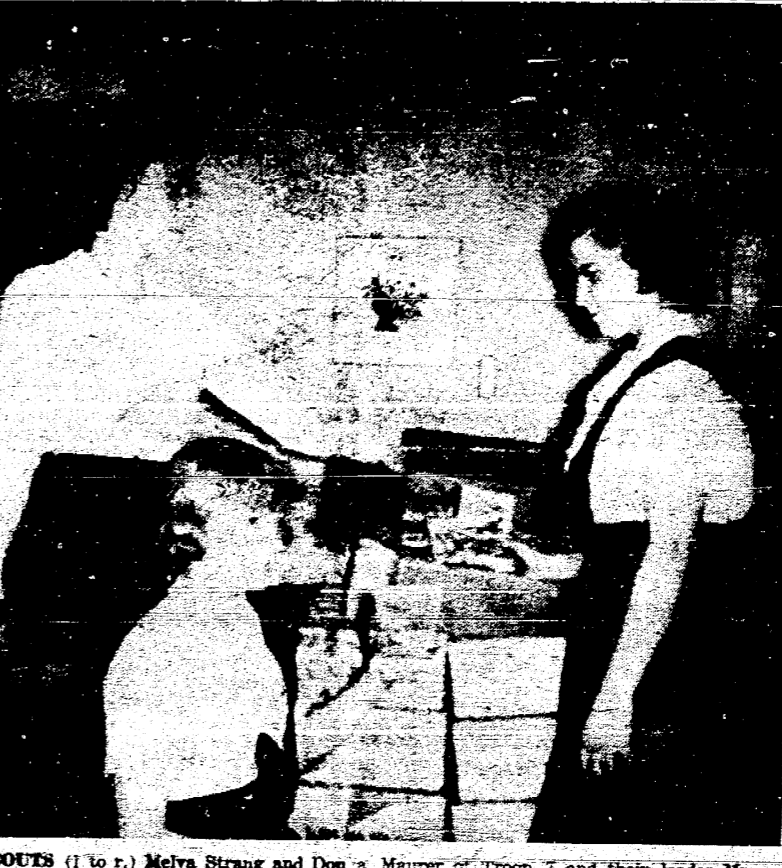

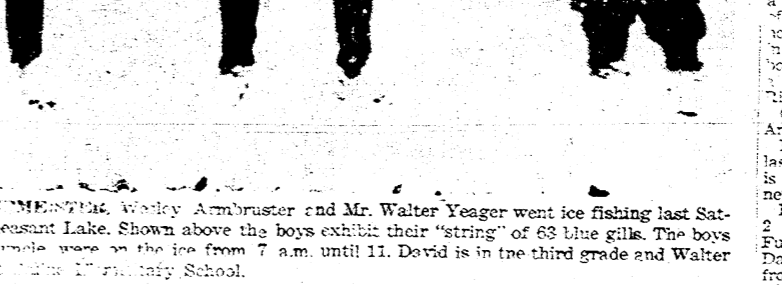
