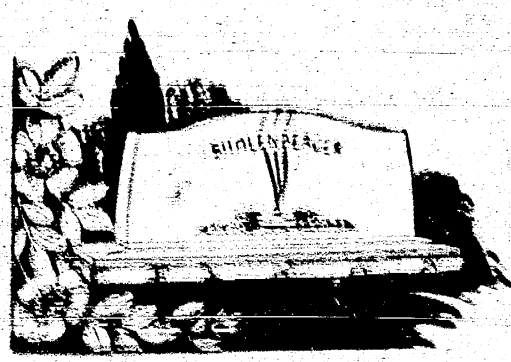

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Death Toll On Michigan Highways Is Appalling

With the worst highway death toll on record for the month of June, previous estimates that Michigan is heading towards a fatality toll of more than 2,000 this year continue to be borne out, according to the State Police monthly report.

There were 164 persons killed in June, an increase of 25, or 18 per cent, over the same month last year. Likewise this was the fourth consecutive month in which more persons lost their lives than in the same month of 1954.

Injuries totaled 5,381, a gain of 40, or 1.4 per cent, while there were 12,328 accidents, an increase of 18 per cent over the same period a year ago. 25,533 drivers, 10,500 per cent, and 9,125 accidents, a gain of 100 per cent.

Motorists traveled the first five months of the year—1954—1,372,270,000 miles, an increase of 10.5 per cent over the same period in 1953. The death rate of 8.8 per 100 million miles of travel was up two per cent.

In 1954, 2,500 community agencies, including hospitals and homes for the aged, received health and welfare services from Red Cross Volunteer Service Groups.

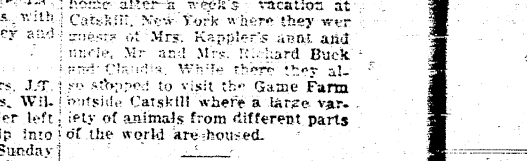

Cattle Prices To Remain Stable

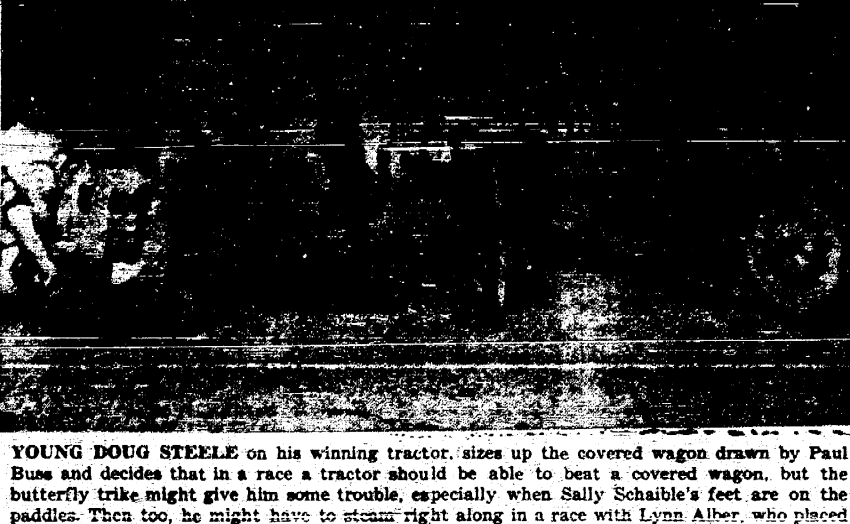

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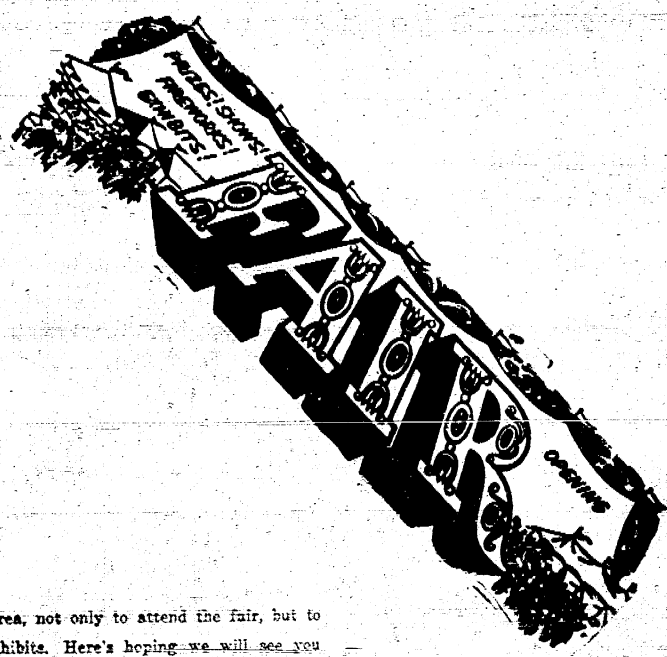
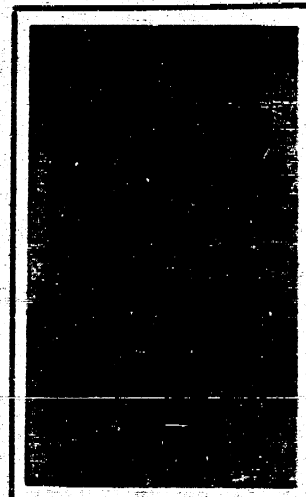
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A Community Message From The "Fair" President

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Broiler Market Prices Are Unstable; Big Supply

The fact that each person in the United States is eating more broilers is not a good sign unless expansion in broiler growing is commensurate with that demand. This is the opinion of H. E. Larriere, farm economist at Michigan State University.

Larriere says that increased consumption does not necessarily mean increased demand. If production is more and there is no increase in demand, prices are lowered to move the increased number of broilers.

In explaining some of the changes in demand for broilers and fryers, Larriere says prices are usually lower the last three months of the year in spite of smaller supplies. Competition due to seasonal market of farm chickens (old hens and cokers) and turkeys causes demand to shift to broiler and fryer rather than to roast or bake.

Since relative demand and available supplies both affect prices, Larriere says prices may not occur when demand is strongest. Larriere says prices can overcome even a good demand. For this reason, broiler growers will want to keep an eye on the trend of chick placements and relative demand at various times of the year.

In planning a year's production, Larriere advises growers wanting to raise three lots of birds to be ready to sell during March, June and September. For those wanting to raise four lots, Larriere suggests being ready to sell in January, April, July and late September. Growers should still watch for the closing of the Court House on Saturdays until all offices are sold in the new building and a policy can be adopted.

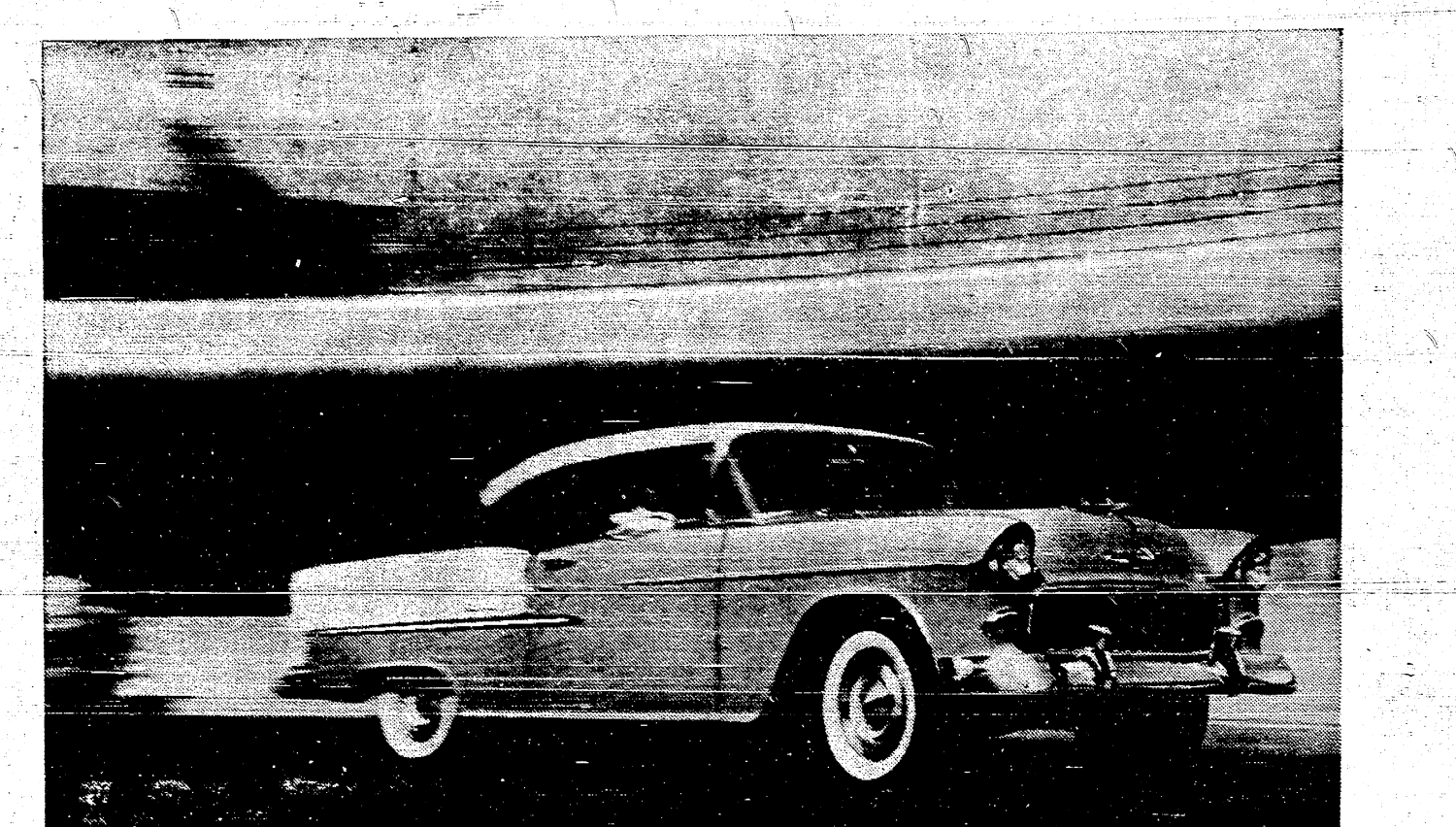

Use Grit In Poultry Feeding

Well planned poultry feeding programs should include grit along with the regular rations. Grit, if used properly, will yield returns far above its actual cost, according to Philip J. Schabille, poultry nutritionist at Michigan State University.

Grit acts as a crushing and grinding material to improve the digestibility and efficiency of utilization. You get greater benefits from the use of grit when whole grains are fed than when the mash is ground.

Schabille lists three classes of grit: hard or soft, soluble or insoluble and calcareous or non-calcareous. Calcareous grit can serve two purposes—grinding feed and supplying calcium. Soft has a short life as grinding material but can supply calcium if it's calcareous.

Use of the calcareous type may be the best with the laying flock. But it may not be so desirable for brooding or broiler chicks as the most of the mashes contain the needed calcium.

Use the size of grit suited to the digestive tract of the bird. Some poultrymen have used local supplies of river gravel and pebbles for hard insoluble grit with good results.

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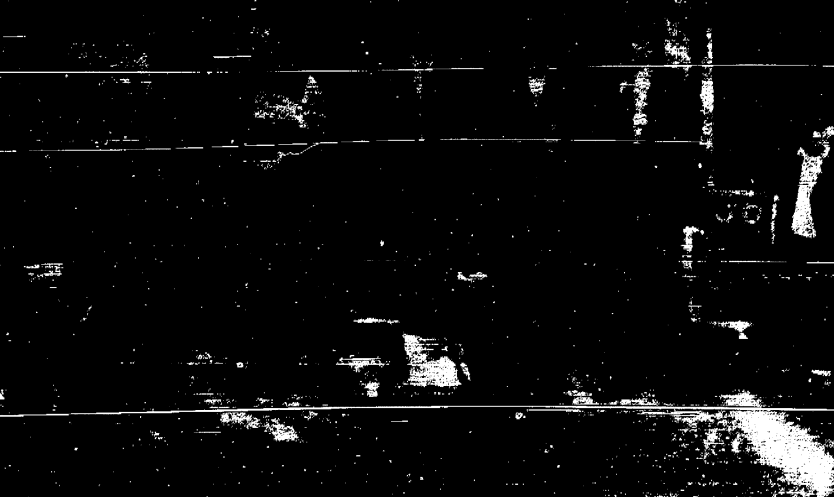

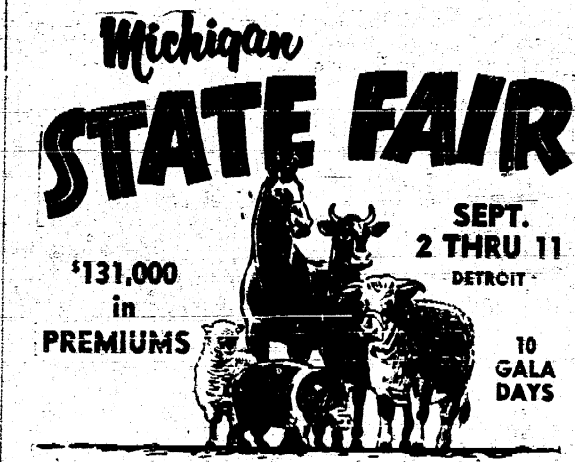
