LABOR DAY SAVINGS

John A. Hannah has been president of Michigan State University since July 1, 1951, when he became the twelfth president of the university from which he had graduated in 1924.

Immediately after graduation from Michigan State University, Mr. Hannah became a member of the Michigan State University faculty as an extension specialist in poultry husbandry. Subsequently, he achieved international recognition in that field, and has maintained an active interest in poultry raising. He was a member of the United States delegation to the World Poultry Congress in London, Rome and Copenhagen.

Upon completion of his work as Assistant Secretary of Defense, Dr. Hannah was awarded the Medal of Freedom (July 21, 1954). In January, 1954, he accepted an additional important responsibility as Chairman of the United States Section of the Permanent Joint Board on Defense, Canada. In this assignment, he heads a five-man American section of a ten-man agency charged with the responsibility for planning for the defense of the American continent.

Dr. Hannah is a member of the Board of the American National Education Committee, an advisory board to the federal government administration in Washington. Dr. Hannah is a member of the Board of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company and the Board of the Detroit Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago. He is also a member of the Board of Government of the American National Red Cross.

Dr. Hannah is a member of the St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Lansing of the Diocese of the Midwest. His fraternal affiliations include Phi Kappa Phi, Sigma Delta Chi, and Phi Kappa Phi. He is a member of the Country Club of Lansing, the Detroit Club, the Detroit Athletic Club, the University Club of Detroit and the Cosmos Club of Washington.

He left the field of extension work in 1955 to begin a career in educational administration, being appointed as secretary of the State Board of Agriculture, the governing board of Michigan State, and secretary of the university as well. In that capacity, he was instrumental in launching a program of expansion of the physical plant of the university, much of it financed with borrowed funds repaid from the earnings of the structures. In the intervening years, buildings costing a total of \$33,000,000 have been added to the facilities at Michigan State. Of the total cost, \$33,000,000 has been supplied by banks and insurance companies on bonds secured by dormitories and other structures producing an income. \$25,000,000 by State appropriations, and the remainder by gifts and grants. Notable structures include a series of dormitories for men and women, the Kellogg Center for Continuing Education, student union, auditorium, field house, classroom and laboratory buildings, and a general library.

Outstanding achievements of his administration as President include the establishment of the Basic College, a pioneering venture in general education, the establishment of a College of Education, which now trains more teachers than any college or university in the Middle West; the establishment of the Michigan State University Press; the organization of the College of Pastors and Public Ministers; the establishment of the College of Communication; the institution of an outstanding program of student counseling and guidance; and the participation in the Western Conference. The time of President Hannah's administration has coincided with the period of greatest growth of Michigan State University. Enrollment in the university has never exceeded 7,000, since the war, the total has been as high as 16,250. The President is particularly proud of the fact that Michigan young people have all places represented 90 per cent or more of the total enrollment.

Dr. Hannah served as a member of the Advisory Committee on Higher Education of the Council of State Governments, and currently is a member of the Commission on Agricultural Services to Frontier Areas, a joint committee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Association of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities. Dr. Hannah is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Institute of International Education; and he is one of the 3 outstanding leaders in business.

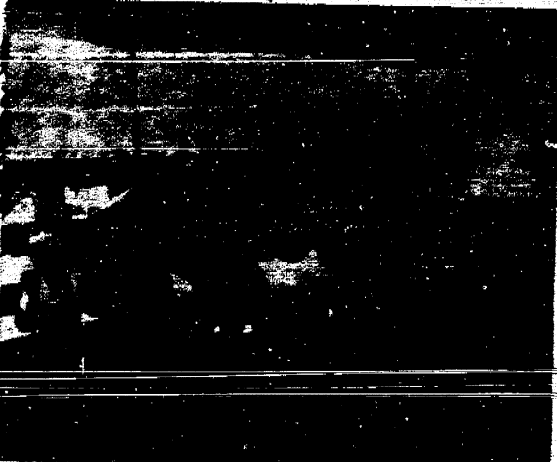

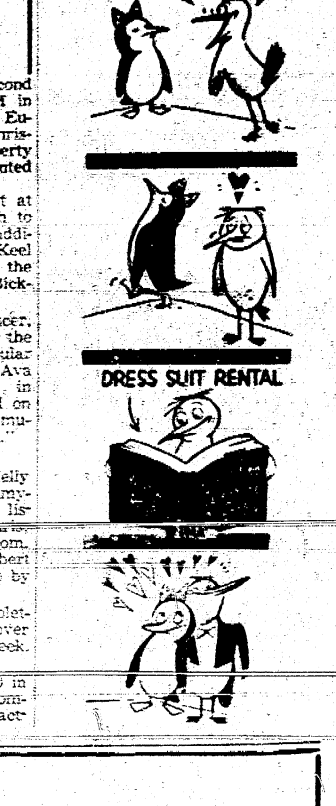

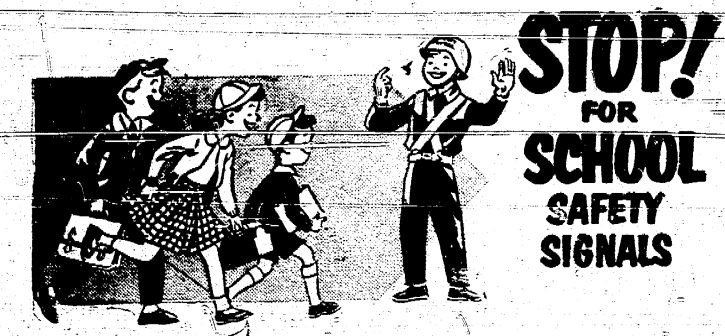
