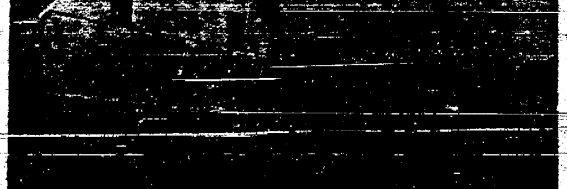

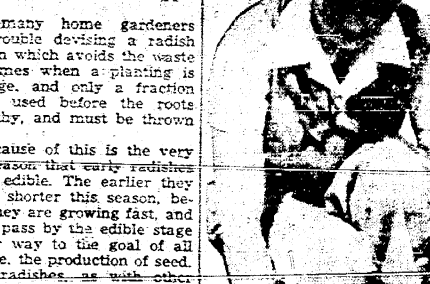

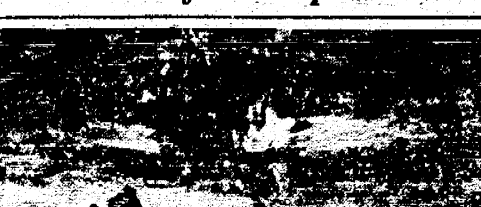

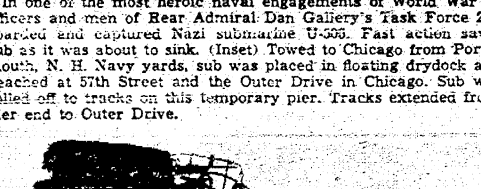

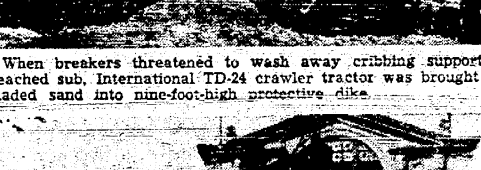
Last Cruise for a Captured Sub

Proposed Saline Hospital Will Serve Area Needs

It is essential that people realize that the proposed new hospital which will serve Manchester as well as all communities in the area, the Campagn Executive Committee stated today.

Facilities will be open to all Doctors of Medicine in Manchester, Milan, Saline, Clinton and Ann Arbor who become members of the hospital staff.

Other important facts about the hospital program, which is of importance to all patients and will be able to take care of most of the hospital needs of people living in southern Washtenaw county and the adjoining area.

The hospital will be operated by the Saline Community Hospital Association, of which anyone making a qualifying contribution.

In order to raise \$175,000 from this relatively small population, it is essential that everyone realize the importance of giving proportionately to others. All pledges are on a 3 year basis. This means that a qualifying contribution.

On the basis of pledges received to date, there is an indication that the importance of giving is realized in as much as this is a one-time appeal covering many years of hospital service. Many are pledging on the basis of \$2.00 a week or \$300 over three years, and still others on the basis of \$400 per week or a total of \$600.

In addition several pledges have been received for \$1,000 and memorials from \$2100 upward. In the public drive in order to have a successful campaign it will be necessary to receive pledges with smaller incomes \$150 pledges based on budgetary giving of \$1.00 per week over a three year period. It is also hoped that many in the smaller income group will be making possible a life membership for both husband and wife. In other words, the campaign is based on the principle of everyone accepting his fair and proportionate share of responsibility in making possible this urgently needed new modern hospital.

A special feature of the campaign is Group Memorial Plan. In order to give recognition to churches and to farm and community organizations, memorials in the proposed hospital are possible without the church or organization giving any of their own funds.

When a member of an organization makes a pledge which he wishes credited to a group memorial in the name of an organization of which he is a member he designates this organization by writing its name on his pledge card. All solicitation for the individual and group memorials is made by regular members of the campaign organization.

Antibiotics in Industry

Millions of lives have been saved by antibiotics, but these earth-mold drugs may also be put to such diverse uses as keeping food fresh longer, prolonging the life of leather, and revolutionizing the textile industry.

Such antibiotics as penicillin, streptomycin, polymycin and bacitracin are finding startlingly broad applications. By serving as efficiency experts, for example, they may help raise our standard of living. Experiments show the antibiotics make silkworms produce silk more quickly and speed an ant-honey output of bees.

Some antibiotics are proving successful in reducing the mildew on surface coatings, and making shoes and carpets wear longer. Others are being produced more cheaply, because animals raised on an antibiotic-supplemented diet grow faster and healthier and are ready for market sooner.

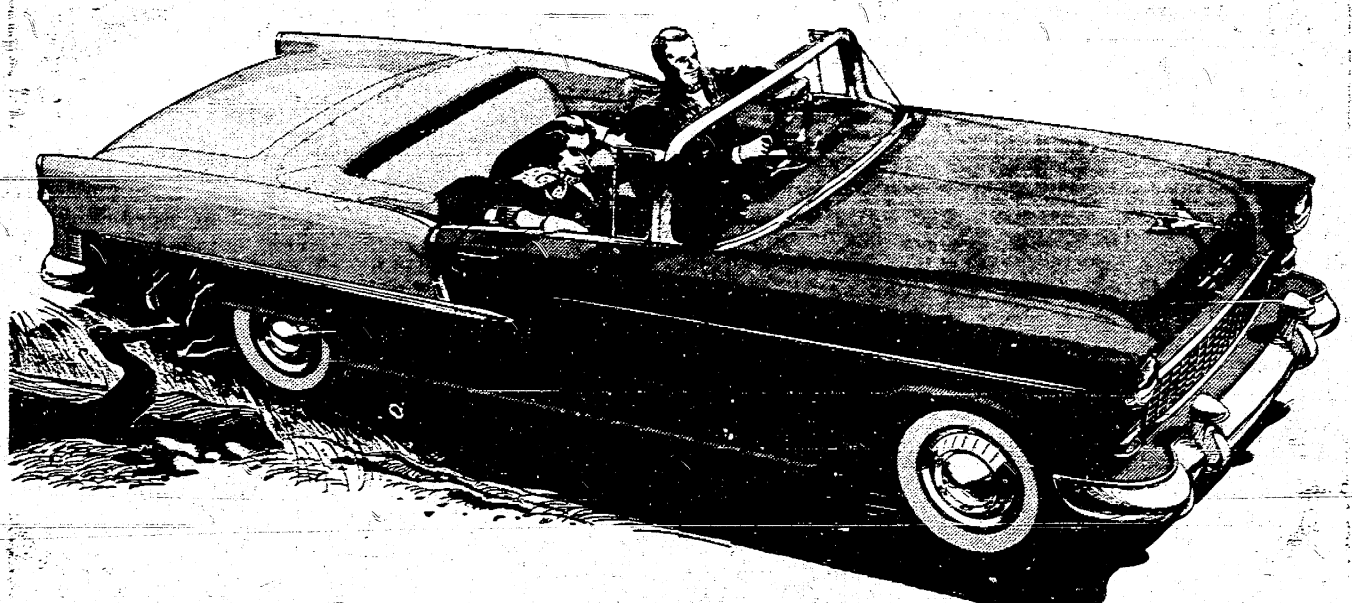

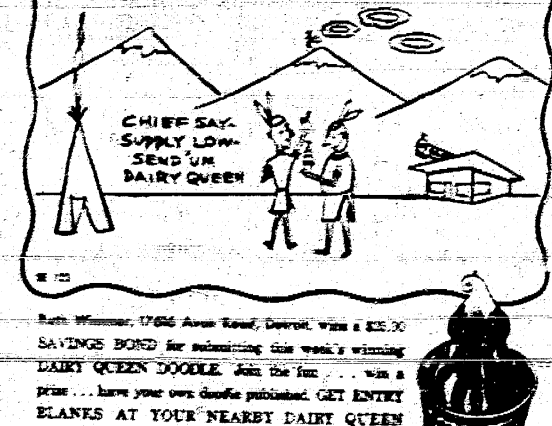

Board to Decide On Pleasant Lake Drain Work

A Board of Determination meeting has been scheduled May 12 to pass on a petition to clean, deepen, and widen the drain known as the Pleasant Lake extension. County Drain Commissioner John M. Flood has announced.

The drain, which is about ten miles long, starts at Pleasant Lake, crosses parts of Freedom, Sharon, and Sylvan townships and ends in a millpond in section 29, Lima township. It serves as an outlet for 28 sections draining about one-twentieth of the county, Flood said.

The petition circulated by Fred Kennedy in the summer of 1952 and filed with the Drain Commissioner April 14, 1953, was signed by Louis Kuhl, Douglas Kennedy, William Gooding Co., Allen Albert, Howard Walker, and others.

Members of the Board of Determination are: Chairman, Charles Parr, Manchester township; Earl Frederick, Lodi township; and Carl Mack, Webster township. All are experienced in handling problems of rural drainage. Flood pointed out last previous county work on the drain was done in 1929.

Life of seed Depends on Soil Which Covers It

When seeds are sown directly to garden soil they face many hazards. If not sown by professional growers, sowing directly tends to fail to "get a catch." But home gardeners can protect their seeds, with precautions which would be prohibitive on large acreage, and they are well advised to do it.

The first step which a growing seed must win is the struggle to reach the soil. This is no small matter in a heavy soil which tends to form a crust which a seedling may not be able to penetrate. The top inch of soil for this reason to the seed the most important in the garden.

It will pay home gardeners well to prepare a special soil with which to cover the seed. Save your best loam, sandy loam and mix in all the compost you can and lacking compost use peat moss. Then after the seed is sown, cover with this special soil which will not form a crust and will allow both water and air to penetrate for the seedling.

Other hazards lie in the path of a seed sown in the garden. Soil must be firm above the seeds, to form close contact, and prevent air spaces from separating the soil and seed. This is dependent on the soil which seeds can be treated with best of large and irregular shape. But firming

does not mean pounding. Press down with the toe blade, or use the side of a rake; and afterwards draw the rake lightly over the row to break up the crust and prevent the soil from being too hard, especially if it is followed by sunshine. Until the soil has softened the soil surface over it should be moist and loose.

When the ground dries out excessively in the spring, sprinkle the rows in which seeds have been sown to prevent them from being dormant for lack of moisture. This is the only time when the garden should be sprinkled, rather than soaked.

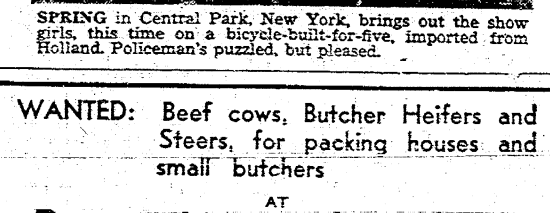

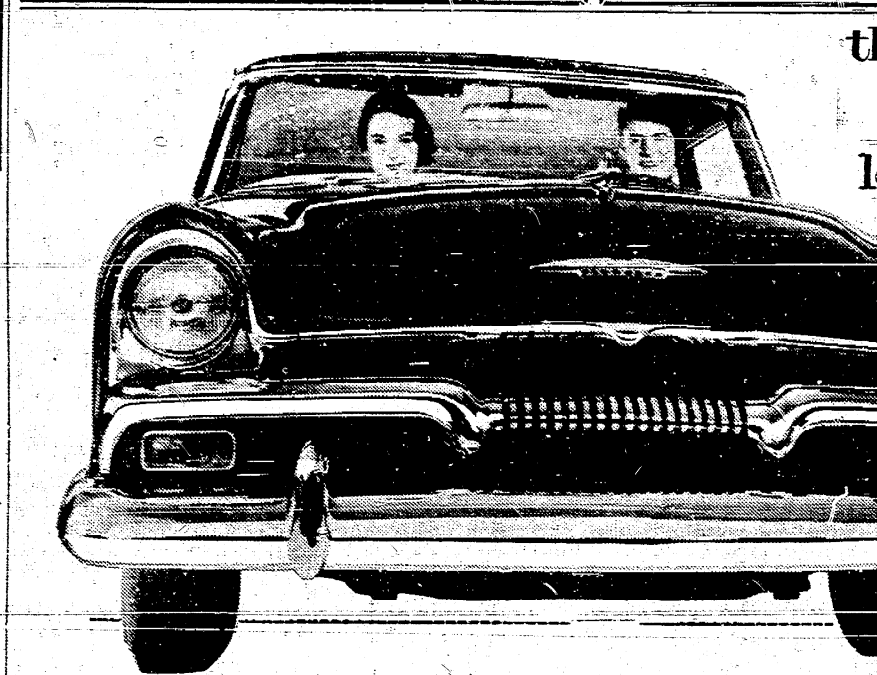
