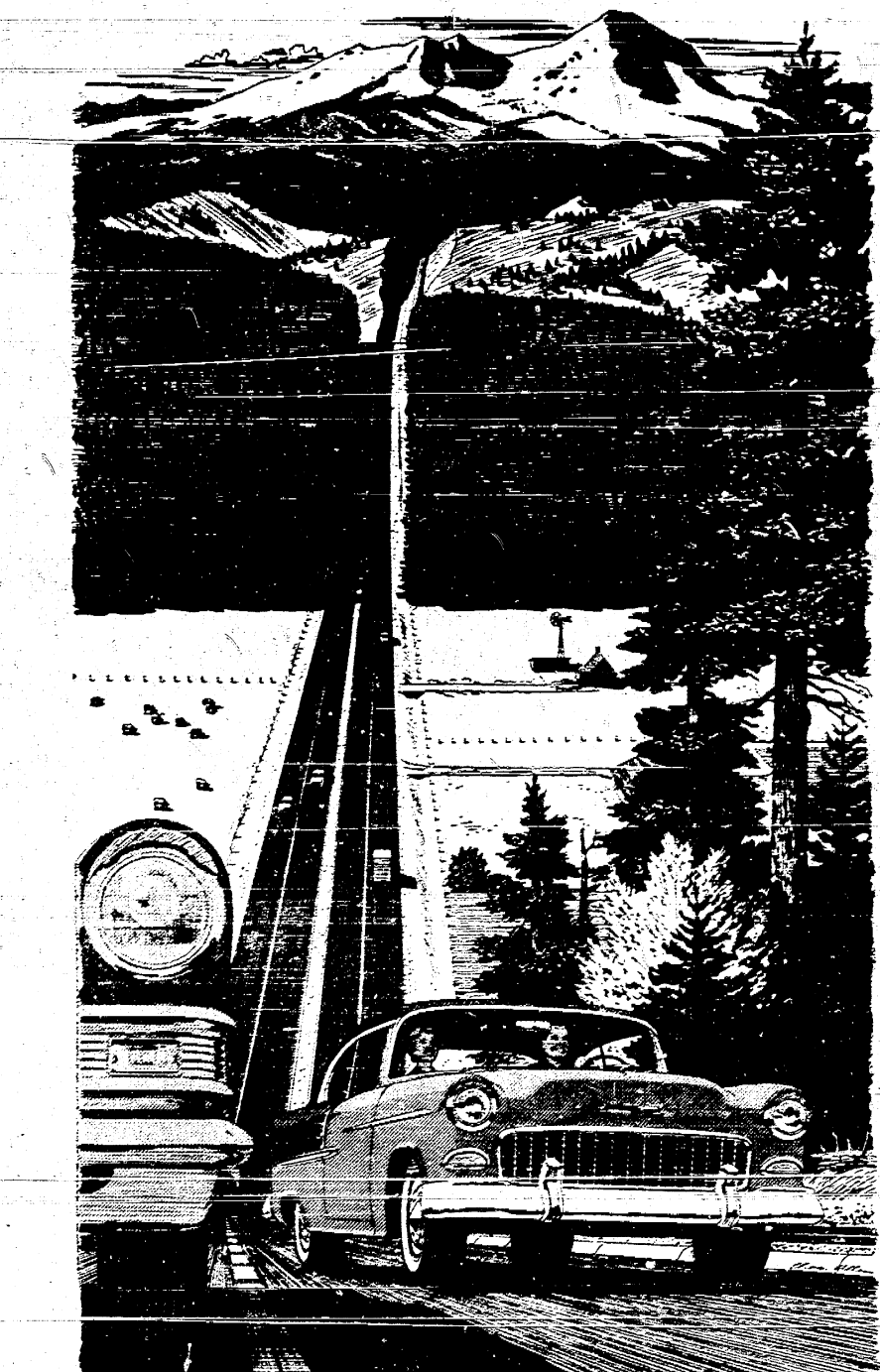

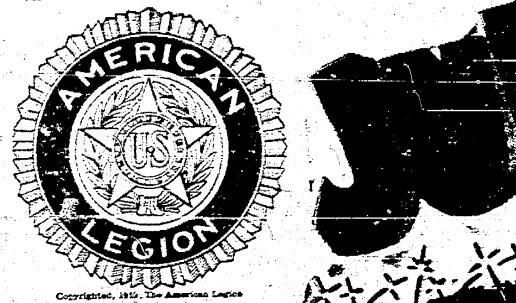

Irish Hills Parish To Mark Completion of New Rectory

Two events will be celebrated at an open house being planned July 2 at St. Joseph's Catholic church in the Irish Hills. One is the completion of a new \$120,000 rectory and the other is the first anniversary of the separation of the mission from the Clinton parish.
 The new home of the pastor, the Rev. Fr. Henry T. Hengoboldt, and his housekeeper, Mrs. Susan Covacelli, was started last August, two months after the parish was pronounced as a mission from the Clinton parish and started out on its own. Prior to that time the priest lived in Clinton and traveled daily the 10 miles on US 112 to reach the area.
 The church celebrated the 100th anniversary of the founding by early settlers of Irish descent last summer. The original stone church still stands, although it has been repaired and remodeled three times.
 The new rectory is a two level building of the most modern type, is connected to the church through a new access and to exterior is of native field stone, the same as used 100 years ago for the church. There are two paneled offices, a living-dining room, three bedrooms with separate baths, study and kitchen on the first floor.
 The living dining room which can seat 100 guests is a highlight of the new building.

 She was talking about the farm she split the farm in thirds when she was joined by two of his brothers from Church Town, County Cork, Ireland.
 The hundred-thirty acre strip he kept for himself is now owned by his grandson, William. During the 111 years there has never been an auction on the farm and at no time has it been owned by anyone except the Kirks.

Beetle Traps, Not Bomb Casings

If you see a small yellow contraption with bomb-like fins suspended on a metal rod about four feet off the ground don't become alarmed.

What you are looking at will be only one of 10,000 Japanese beetle traps now being placed in various locations of the state by representatives of the Michigan Department of Agriculture's bureau of plant industry.

Detroiters particularly are likely to see them because about 6,000 traps are being put out in that area. About 4,000 will be located from Grand Rapids south and east to the state's southern boundaries.

A large number will be put out in Berrien county, where last year at Coloma for the first time the insects were discovered in a rural area of Michigan.

The Japanese beetle is one of the most harmful of insects. It will feed on as many as 275 kinds of trees, shrubs and plants. Found only in the summer months, it is almost a half inch long and is shiny brown and green with six white dots on each side at the edge of the wing coverings.

Eradication of the pest, according to C. A. Boyer, chief of the Department's plant industry bureau, is not expected until the Japanese beetle is attracted to the traps by the odor of a preparation made of a distance of a quarter mile.

Actually the purpose is to tell tenders of the Michigan Department of Agriculture the presence of Japanese beetles in the area. Where beetles are trapped, workers treat the soil within a radius of 300 feet with such insecticides as DDT, Chloro-

cyanide, and DDT. Time permits the grub which feed underground on roots for 10 months before emerging for the coming year's activities.

Michigan's aggressive program, the most complete program ever conducted in the state, will prevent areas in the state from being placed under Federal quarantine, which is an extremely costly and inconvenient thing for persons shipping nursery stock or other agricultural products. Fifteen states along the eastern seaboard are now under quarantine.

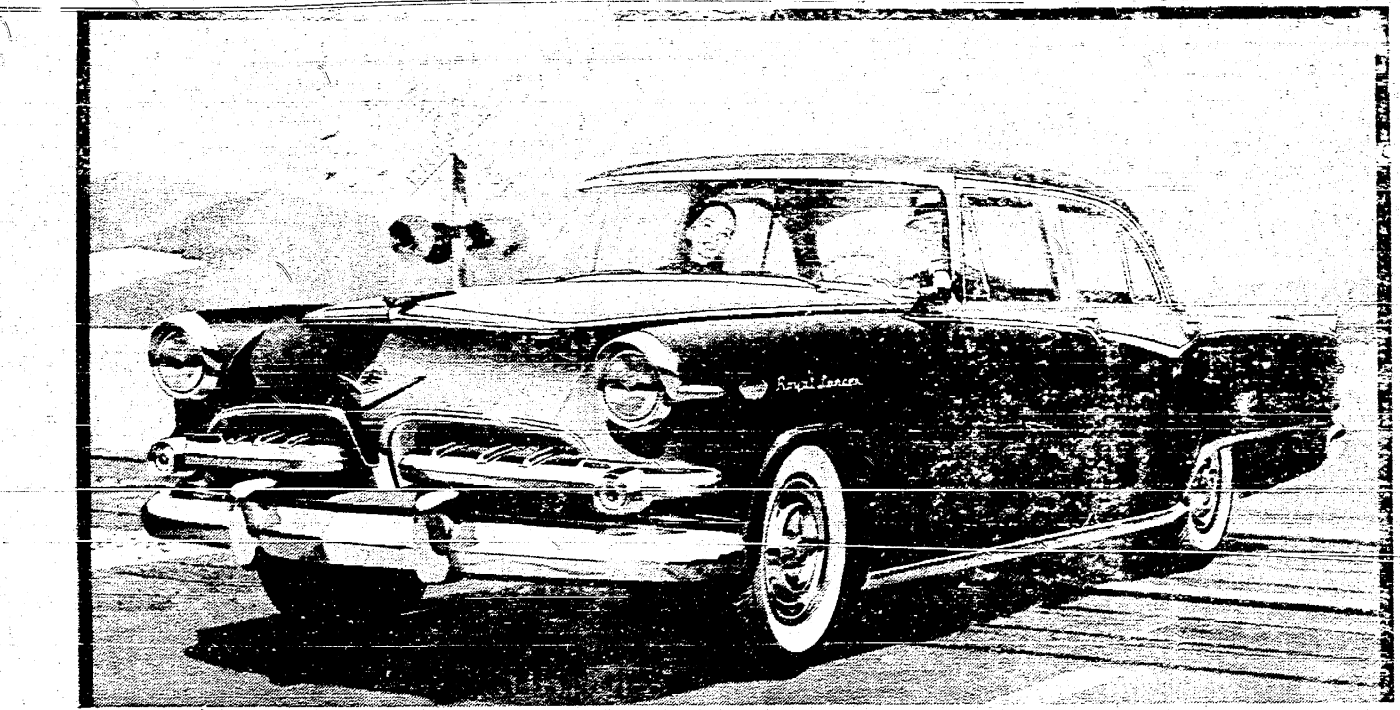

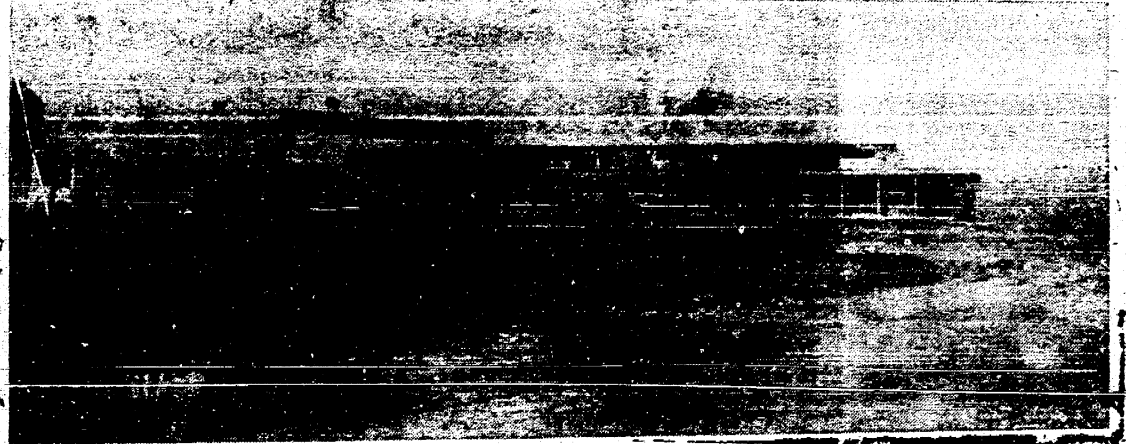
