

### 8 Heart May Be Fine But Will Veins Allow President To Run

President Eisenhower is 66. The Republicans hope he will run again. He's their chief hope of winning in 1960. But can he run? The word of his doctors as to whether he can run and what they tell him—perhaps in February—depends on the condition of his heart.

But one of the most vital things they cannot tell him about is all the condition of his arteries.

There was nothing wrong with Eisenhower's heart the moment he was hit by the attack. The trouble was in one of the blood vessels in the heart.

It was that thickened. Finally blood through that vessel was shut off. This lack of blood damaged the heart. Eventually a scar formed.

Then this problem arose as it does in most cases. Just how bad was the scar damaged? That would take time to show. How could the damage show? The heart could get enlarged. Varying waves in the electrocardiogram would indicate something wrong too.

The doctors have been making constant checks. So far they've found Eisenhower has been doing

all right. If they found the heart was too damaged to undergo the rig of it was passed. But they don't have less reason to expect a heart that is 65 generally. ## Employment Security Will Cover Michigan Workers

More than four out of every five Michigan workers will be under the protection of the Michigan Employment Security Act in 1936, according to the commission director, Max M. Horton.

An expansion of the Act to cover employers with as few as four persons on their payrolls during any 20 calendar weeks of the year is expected to add more than 200,000 additional workers to the 1,850,000 already covered by the Act.

It will also double the number of employers affected, adding more than 30,000 to the 32,000 already included in the program.

Effective date of the expansion, which was approved last spring by the Michigan State Legislature, is Jan. 1, 1936.

The Michigan Employment Security Commission is sending explanatory letters about Jan. 15 to more than 50,000 of the state's employers who might possibly be included in the program under the new expansion. On the back of the letter is a form which the employer may use in electing to pay the required payroll tax on a quarterly basis.

Otherwise the amounts due for two or three quarters may become payable at one time. However, the tax payment is due on the 15th of the month following the 25th of the quarter in which the employer's payroll records make him subject to the Act, Horton said. Any employer who becomes liable at any time of the year is liable for the entire year under the terms of the Act.

## Social Security For Workers On Farm

District Director of Internal Revenue A. M. McKeown, issued the following statement today to remind farmers that social security taxes apply to cash wages paid to every farm worker in 1936. Space is provided in which the employer should indicate how many cash wages during the year. The taxes (7 percent employer tax and 2 percent employee tax) apply only to cash wages paid to covered farm workers who owe these taxes must file a return on Form 941 and pay the taxes, on or before January 31, 1936. Farm employers should file their returns in time to avoid the penalty which may be charged for late filing.

Any employer of covered farm workers who has not already registered with the district director's office should do so at once. The registration form 854 can be obtained from any internal revenue or social security office. The district director will mail the necessary return forms and instructions to all registered employers.
