

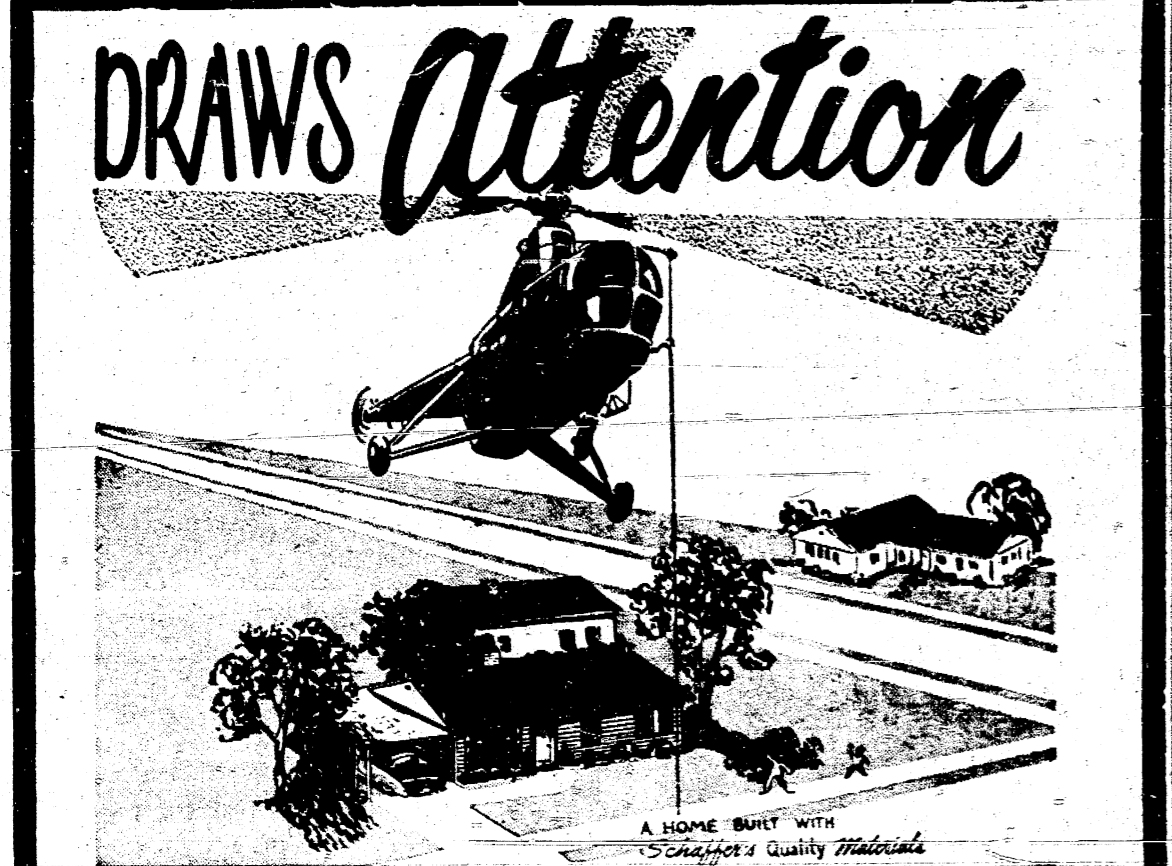
## Your Veteran Says Watch Those Calves

Every once in a while someone asks what to do about a sick calf. We usually recommend some kind of a remedy, of course, because sick animals require treatment. However, certain management practices would keep a great many of these calves from getting sick in the first place. These would pay off in two ways. More calves would be raised and they would be better prospects for herd replacements than those that have been sick at some time or other in early life. Since there are several possible causes of calf trouble,

there are also several preventive measures that will help owners to raise more. Lack of attention at birth causes the early death of many calves that shouldn't have died at all. A calf that is born hind end first may, nearly another to death, if the navel cord is broken before it is free of the afterbirth that shuts off air. Those that are born without trouble may be stepped on by other cows or down in the gutter when the dam hasn't been placed in a box stall. ABSCESSES MAY FORM

Barring such accidents, they may lie around for quite a while because they are unable to get up and get some of that precious first milk that will warm and protect them during the most critical time of their lives. Then chilling and lowered resistance to disease paves the way for sickness. If they get through this stage there is always the possibility of germs getting into the blood stream through the raw navel cord. Once in, they may be carried to different areas of the body to form abscesses and cause generalized blood poisoning that certainly does not help them grow up. Overfeeding is probably the most common cause of trouble in calves that survive beyond the first day. This results in scours

which weakens the animals and makes them more susceptible to other troubles. CONCRETE WALL 'BAD' Conditions in damp places is an invitation to trouble, particularly from colds and pneumonia. Concrete walls are especially bad, for they are likely to be both wet and cold. Lack of ventilation kills countless calves every year, for it permits dampness, overheating, drafts and sudden temperature changes. Sometimes trouble is due to calves being placed next to a floor that is open a great deal or broken windows that permit drafts. A lack of sanitation in feedings is often the cause of digestive troubles. Rinsing feed pails with cold water isn't enough to kill germs. Dirty feed boxes and hay

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## Weather Balloon Lands Here

A weather balloon, measuring 30 feet in diameter and 125 feet from end to end, landed on the Roller Bros. farm a mile east of the village in Duncan road last Wednesday evening.

The balloon was released by the engineering and research division of General Mills, Minneapolis, Minn., which has a contract with the Air Force for the manufacture of weather balloons.

Only about one third of the balloon landed at Manchester while parts of it were reported to have fallen near Erie Michigan.

### Well Managed Cows Profitable

Producing beef calves in Michigan for sale as feeders can be profitable. But the margin between income and costs may be rather narrow.

That's the report made by Earl W. Wright, farm economist at Michigan State University, after a survey of 100 beef-breeding herds in northwestern Michigan.

Wright studied records on 20 Michigan beef farms and found that cows averaged 75 per cow. The average yearly income was about \$5. These figures are based on 1952 prices.

But the costs and incomes vary considerably among the herds in the study. The average annual cost for feed was \$100 per cow, but some herds varied from 200 pounds to 40 pounds per cow.

Wright says that the most profitable herds for beef production are those that have the lowest feed costs and the highest calf prices.

Keep as large herd as possible—less than 40 cows.

Feed cows inexpensive roughage and little corn in winter.

Study markets carefully and sell where and when prices are best.

Get as high quality cows and bulls as possible.

Try to have calves born early—March is a good time.

Do everything possible to save a 100 per cent calf crop.

Weight also save that good pasture and proper insect and disease control can add profits.

### Purebred Chick Generations Stay Strong

Will the second and third generations of purebred chicks do as well as the first generation?

Will the chicks from the birds adapted to a kind of climate in one state do poorly when they're shipped to an area with a somewhat different climate?

Champion of Michigan State University, thinks the answer is probably "no" to both questions. He says many tests to find out.

Testing two strains of single comb White Leghorns for three years in each generation were about equal in performance as far as egg production is concerned.

He measured the children for these "genetic" traits: Average egg at 20 weeks of age, average weight at 20 weeks of age, average egg production for 80 weeks, and the average egg weight and hatchability.

Actually, his statistics showed that the first six-hour period in the second and third periods were no more important than the first six-hour period of each year.

In the fourth period there were a few more males than in any other period.

The results don't prove exactly what the hatcheries are wrong, but they do show that they shouldn't be so confident on the first 10 per cent of the hatch being male chicks.

### Largest State Trooper School Found To Need Expansion

The largest recruit training school ever conducted by the Michigan State Police has necessitated a rearrangement of facilities for lodging, feeding and instructing, but what at first seemed a big problem has been met without difficulty.

The school began with an enrollment of 152. Graduates expected to number well over 100 will be the first of the 200 additional troopers authorized by the special session of the legislature in November.

At previous schools, recruits were housed at headquarters, but to accommodate the biggest class, seven quarters built on the Michigan State University campus have been rented for sleeping quarters. In the earlier post-war days they were occupied for that purpose by unmarried students at the university.

Two more quarters are being used for classrooms. The gymnasium at State Police headquarters, formerly also used as a lecture classroom, is now devoted entirely to lessons in boxing, jiu-jitsu and similar activities.

The school has been split into two sections. While one group is in the classroom in the morning the other is in the gymnasium.

The reverse in the afternoon and for some outside activities will be together.

It is expected to have the entire 200 men on duty by Memorial Day. To accomplish this the usual school period has been divided. This school, and another to follow on April 8, will be limited to two weeks of basic training and the graduates will then go into the field. Next fall, after the busy summer traffic period, they will be recalled in groups of 50 to complete their four weeks of training in the more advanced studies, such as scientific investigation.

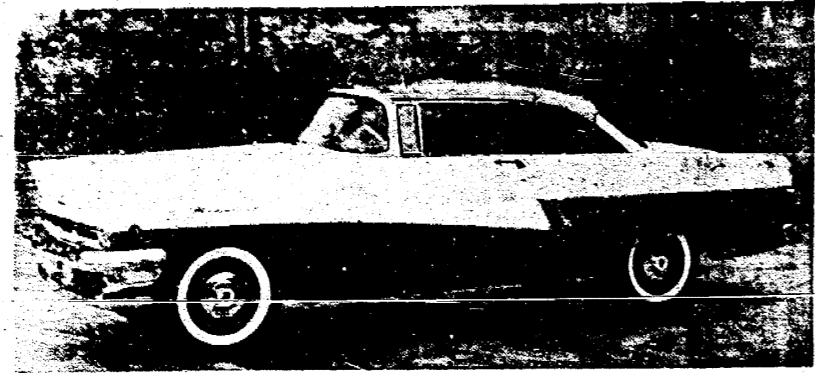

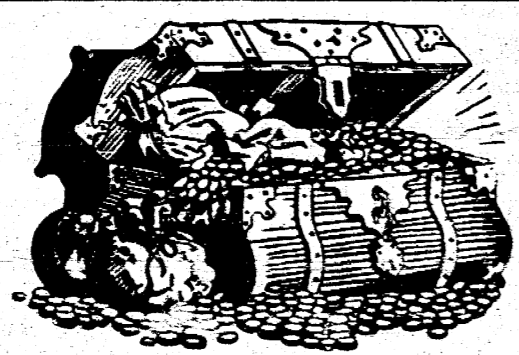
