









# Fractions, Democracy Alive Here

Many of us can remember back when a fraction was "fraction". We learned rules by rote, and "no nonsense about it" or so we were told.

Unfortunately, to some of us the abusive fraction made no sense. It was something we memorized to please our teacher or pull an A in arithmetic. I later, with growing everyday experience did a dim light start to dawn. A fraction at last began to assume some tangible meaning.

"How can we teach fractions so that they are concrete and meaningful to children?" was the primary question asked when teachers of the Saline Elementary School met in a two-day half-hour session recently.

Dr. Glenn Ludlow, U. of M. professor was present to stimulate ideas and suggest techniques. New books were displayed. Teachers from texts and workbooks were available for study. While many helpful ideas were introduced, the amazing variety of examples in current use, brought together by the teachers themselves, was most gratifying.

Cake pans, with pointed wooden "pieces" of cake representing quarters, eighths were played, bound to impress hungry boys with the practical significance of fractions.

Some teachers brought paper plates, cut in fractional portions, to demonstrate the same thing. Tarpaper cut out of cardboard child-sized high with an ingenious sliding red mercury, made graphic the meaning of temperature for potential weathermen.

Counting charts and measuring gages, combined eye-hand-mind learning for youngsters just coming to grips with the magic of numbers.

Dr. Ludlow pointed out that ours is a decimal system with place values, and suggested what many wise teachers already knew: that children are not fooled when they are placed in ability groups—even when the groups are named Robins, Blue Birds or Alligators. Rather they are often repelled at the discrepancy.

He complimented the teaching staff on the variety of visual aids and said he felt it worth his while to meet with teachers in the field to learn their problems first hand and to see how "imagination" was meeting the challenge of meaningful arithmetic presentation.

The successful workshop was just a beginning. Other subjects will be considered in the future. Teachers will share their ideas. An authority in each field will be invited to present to bring additional food for thought.

To several of the teaching staff, working so closely with one another this year is a new concept not by choice, but because their previous experience hasnot included or necessitated it. Democracy is more than a word in the Saline Elementary School. It is the scheme of things. For some teachers the new emphasis has meant shifting gears a little at first, but as the year progressed, the teaching body has adjusted to many of the changes imposed when twenty-seven teachers and 728 youngsters convened under one roof.

Just as a student council handles the planned problems of the student body with a minimum of authoritarian interference from the principal, so the teachers, through their own administrative council, discuss and reach decisions for themselves.

The Administrative Council is composed of one teacher from each grade level selected by all who teach the grade. Mrs. Marian Barclay, Principal makes the eighth member of the group. All teacher problems are aired, discussed and decided before this council.

Problems arising within the classroom or between parents and the school are handled, as is traditional, through the principal's office.

Decisions which the teachers make in their administrative body are concerned with: recess supervision; handling corridor behavior; noon hour procedures; curriculum coordination and detail; safety patrol; and all similar school-wide functions.

Under this plan administrative policy becomes a democratic venture, more easily understood by all teachers because they share in formulating it. An initial year, under reorganization, and in a new school, always means adjustment of one kind or another. The democratic way may mean a bit more slowly, but its effect is solid and lasting.

A fraction starts to "live" for children and girls in terms of pieces and thermometers. Democracy, sometimes loosely understood, but always the ultimate aim in all education, takes on real meaning when teachers and students alike work together to solve their problems.

**Middle East Assignment to Be Tough For UN Secretary**

U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld's proposed visit to the Middle East will be the toughest assignment of his career. The job, he has done well before, as for instance on his job of talking to the Chinese Communists about releasing American prisoners.

East is a kettle of various stews. The United Nations is trying to prevent an outbreak of war between the Arabs and Israel. Some diplomats feel that there is a chance that war will erupt within 90 days.

This feeling is based on an assumption that the Israelis will hit the Arabs rather than watch indefinitely from the Golan Heights. But Hammarskjöld, if he gets the proper audience with the Israelis and Egyptians, will be handling one segment of a very complicated situation.

There are intense rivalries in the Middle East among the Arabs. These conflicts are nationalistic and dynastic, and they are very bitter ones.

For instance, Egypt is trying to get Iraq out of the Baghdad pact. This drive partly stems from Egyptian wishes to lead the Arab world. There also is an Egyptian feeling that the anti-communist Baghdad pact eventually will benefit Israel.

Soviet Arabia's old-worldly leaders, who got their royalties from American-operated wells, are backing Egypt in this struggle with Iraq. So is Syria. Both nations traditionally oppose the Iraqi leadership, but they also are determined to kick British influence out of the Middle East.

Nationalism is intense in the Arab world. There also are these ingredients in the pot—colonialism, feudalism, fascism and communism.

The Arab-Israeli dispute in itself seems insoluble without resort to force. But the danger of a war in that case opens up greater dangers. The British naturally never would submit to any situation that exposed the oil fields that supply Britain and all of western Europe. British support would become a bare bluff that all oil were denied her.

One fact stands out in the whole picture, that is, the Arab world is on the march, awakened and firm on the goal of getting a better economic break.

By playing both sides of the biggest Arab nations, stand up and get out from east and west in the Middle East. They know this, and therefore one can expect a lot of wowing by American, British and Soviet interests.

**Females Always Cost More—Even If It's A Dog!**

Owners of unlicensed dogs are being warned by Washtenaw County Treasurer W. V. Ferner to obtain licenses promptly or face the possibility of prosecution.

Mr. Ferner is mailing notices directly to all persons known to own unlicensed dogs advising the necessary steps to take.

Michigan State law provides that if a dog is not licensed by June 15 of each year, every unlicensed dog is declared a public nuisance and the owner of such unlicensed dog is subject to prosecution.

The fee for male or unsexed dogs is \$3 for a female \$4.

Licenses may be obtained by mailing the vaccination certificate and license fee to Mr. Verner at Ann Arbor. When making application by mail it is necessary to provide the following information: kind of dog, markings, sex and age.

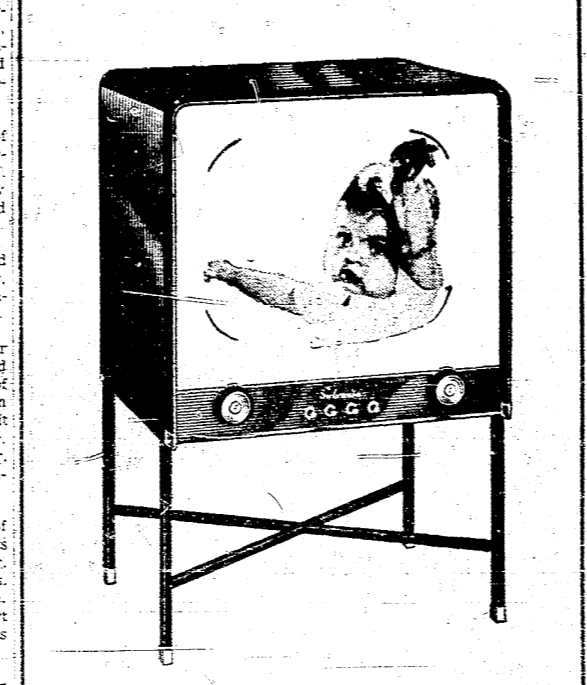
