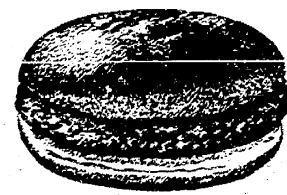

### Accidents May Be Intentional Reports Doctor

People may hurt themselves "accidentally" on purpose to lessen guilt feelings, gain affection, or hurt someone close to them, according to a University of Michigan psychiatrist. Dr. M. M. Frolich of the University's Medical School explains that such accidents are most likely to occur (1) when the individual's psychological "need" to hurt himself reaches a peak or (2) when a particularly opportune situation for self-injury presents itself. "All of this happens of course, without any conscious awareness of the patient and in spite of his conscious efforts," he states. "Impulsive, active individuals who deliberately hurt and don't talk easily about their emotions or inner problems are the ones most apt to hurt themselves 'accidentally' on purpose," the doctor continues. "Without an understanding and evaluation of the personality or mental factors which may play a role in accident causation, no satisfactory program of prevention can be developed," Dr. Frolich concludes. The doctor bases his findings on numerous reports published on accident prevention and his own personal experience in the field.

### Dogs Must Be Confined During Game Nesting

Conservation Officer Donley Boyer issued a reminder that permittees do not run at large from April 15 through July 15 is a misdemeanor. Owners may be held liable if the dogs annoy young rabbits, squirrels or other small game during the nesting season. Conservation Officer Boyer said he has received several complaints the past few days and advises dog owners to keep the dogs tied or otherwise confined during the 3 months beginning last Sunday and ending Oct. 15.

### Inspectors Crack Down On Imitation Ice Cream Flavors

Maybe springtime does things to a man's fancy, but men in at least five Michigan places who make ice cream have found they could have imitation ice cream flavors around and get by with it. They fancied they could, that is, until inspectors of the dairy division of the Michigan Department of Agriculture dropped in unexpectedly and found these imitation products, which are illegal in this state. In some states they are permitted. It all five instances the artificial flavors were seized. Under Michigan law no imitation flavor may be used except imitation vanilla. Fruit ice creams must contain fruit, and nut ice cream must contain nuts. Just a mere suggestion of these like a whiff of violets on an April breeze, went do.

The state law, regarded as one that provides the consumer a product that is superior to that permitted in many states, requires that fruit ice cream must contain five percent fruit by actual weight. Nut ice creams must contain two percent nuts by actual weight. Custard ice creams must contain 1.1 percent egg yolks to comply.

In the five seizures Agricultural department inspectors found quite a collection of illegal artificial flavors. Some were banana, strawberry, which also contains coumarin, it legal in this state in the manufacture of ice cream.

Strawberry flavoring must be a popular one, because three of the five seizures contained some imitation strawberry flavoring. Another seizure was imitation black walnut flavoring.

### Ag Post Exams By Civil Service

### Children Face Many Hazards Cautions Doctor

Upwards of 300 Michigan children die every year in home accidents and ten times that many are crippled for the rest of their lives because of inadequate safety precautions, says Dr. Harry A. Towley, professor of pediatrics at The University of Michigan Medical center.

Young infants are especially apt to become victims of an accident, he warns, unless thorough safeguards are taken by parents. One of the most common sources of severe injury is a short fall from a bed or bassinets where a baby has been placed too close to the edge and rolls off, striking his head on the floor.

Many infants who supposedly die from suffocation actually may have had severe pneumonia, according to Dr. Towley, he suggests that any bedtime difficulty in breathing, by babies, be checked frequently by parents.

Loose razor blades can also cause a bad injury when a two- or three-year-old tries to mimic his dad's shaving habits. Keeping all sharp, heavy, or poisonous objects in a secure place-out of a youngster's reach, becomes increasingly important when he begins to move about the house, Dr. Towley continues.

1 small onion, chopped  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine

1 package (5 ounces) pie crust

## M.E.A. Seeks Change In State School Superintendent's Status

Michigan voters in November may have a chance to have the education of their children out of politics.

The petition being circulated this week and for the next six weeks asks for a constitutional amendment to take the office of the state superintendent of public instruction out of politics and to make it an eight-member non-partisan state board of education.

This would make the selection of the state superintendent and election of the state board of education the province of the voters.

In initiating this reform in the state's educational scene, the 44,000 member Michigan Education Association has the support of nearly all major organizations in Michigan. One of them, the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers is cooperating ever to the extent of circulating petitions.

Support is indicated by the Michigan Farm Bureau, the Education Policies Commission, the Michigan Federation of Labor, Michigan Teachers and Teachers' Association of Michigan, the Michigan Association of School Boards and the American Association of University Women.

The M.E.A. has set May 1 as the deadline for getting 300,000 signatures on petitions, the approximate number required to get the proposal on the November 6, 1956 ballot.

According to Dr. A. J. Phillips, Executive Secretary, Michigan Education Association, there are ten proposed amendments:

- There has been no change in our Constitutional pattern for education since 1908.
- Every superintendent of public instruction through the last three decades has declared the necessity of playing party politics to gain office.
- A state board of education elected at large by the people is keeping with methods of electing its members and local boards of education.
- At present, eighteen states elect a state board of education which appoints the superintendent.

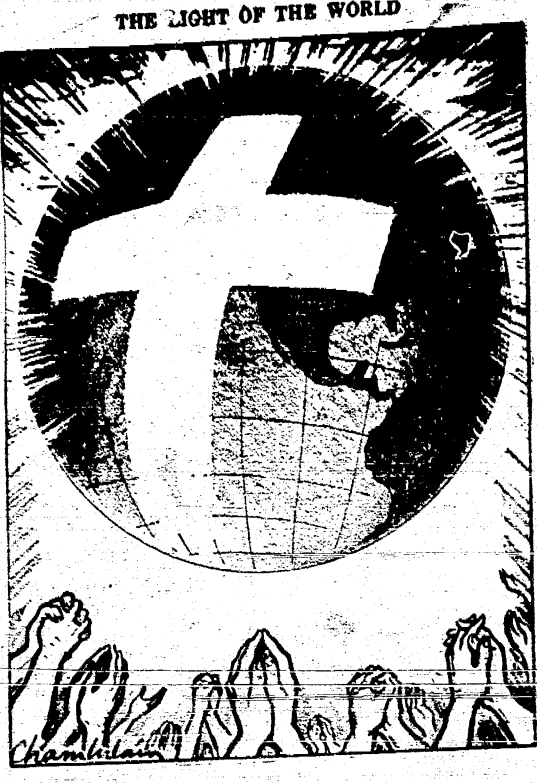

## Supervisors Trim Committee Total From 43 To 28

Washtenaw County Board of Supervisors has trimmed the number of board committees from 43 to 28 and reduced the committee membership from 146 to 104.

A new five-member ways and means committee, which the board did not have, was created in the process. The new committee is a merger of the finance, salary, bonds and insurance, and printing committees, which each had memberships of three.

The five-member county planning and 5-man inter-county planning committees were combined into a single five-man committee. The probate and friend of the court committees formerly contain three members each, were combined with the circuit judge's committee to form a five-man circuit court committee.

Membership on the probate court and juvenile affairs committee was trimmed from seven to five and the dog control committee was added to the sheriff's committee.

The board's agricultural and county fair committees were combined into an agricultural and 4-H activities committee of three members.

Some committees were eliminated entirely by the streamlining. Others were removed from the board and placed under the duties of the county administrator. These include central records, efficiency and business, and business and permanent order committees.

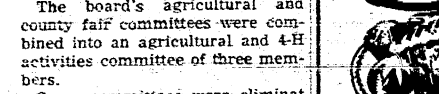
Membership on the committee will be named by the newly elected chairman, Edwin Frederick, an Ann Arbor lawyer. He will be hindered in the task by the fact that Ann Arbor, working under its new charter, will not appoint its seven members until next Monday. Frederick should, according to regulations of the board, appoint the committees within ten days. However, supervisors won't be seated until later in the month or in May.
