Health Department Plans Hearing Tests

Hearing tests of school children in kindergarten through 8th grade in Washington County, exclusive of Ann Arbor will be conducted during the 1956-57 school year by the Washington County Health Department, according to Dr. Otto K. Engleke, Health officer.

Testing will begin shortly after schools open and will continue through the school year until all children in the county have been tested. Dates for individual schools will be administered only to those children who are referred on the basis of demonstrated hearing deficiencies in their earlier tests.

As a final examination procedure, the children who show a hearing loss in this diagnostic test will be referred to an otolaryngologist conducted by several local practicing otolaryngologists. Their findings will then be referred to a doctor designated by the child's family, and will be used in the eventual treatment and care of the child.

Screening programs of this type have disclosed from a per cent to 8 per cent of the children involved in such testing have some hearing loss. "If the county average is as high as this, we may have as many as 200 children with hearing losses," said Dr. Engleke.

He stressed that all parents, cooperate by seeing that their children attend the clinic on the days that it is scheduled for their school. Schedules for each school will be sent home through the schools and will be published as they are set up for this area.
