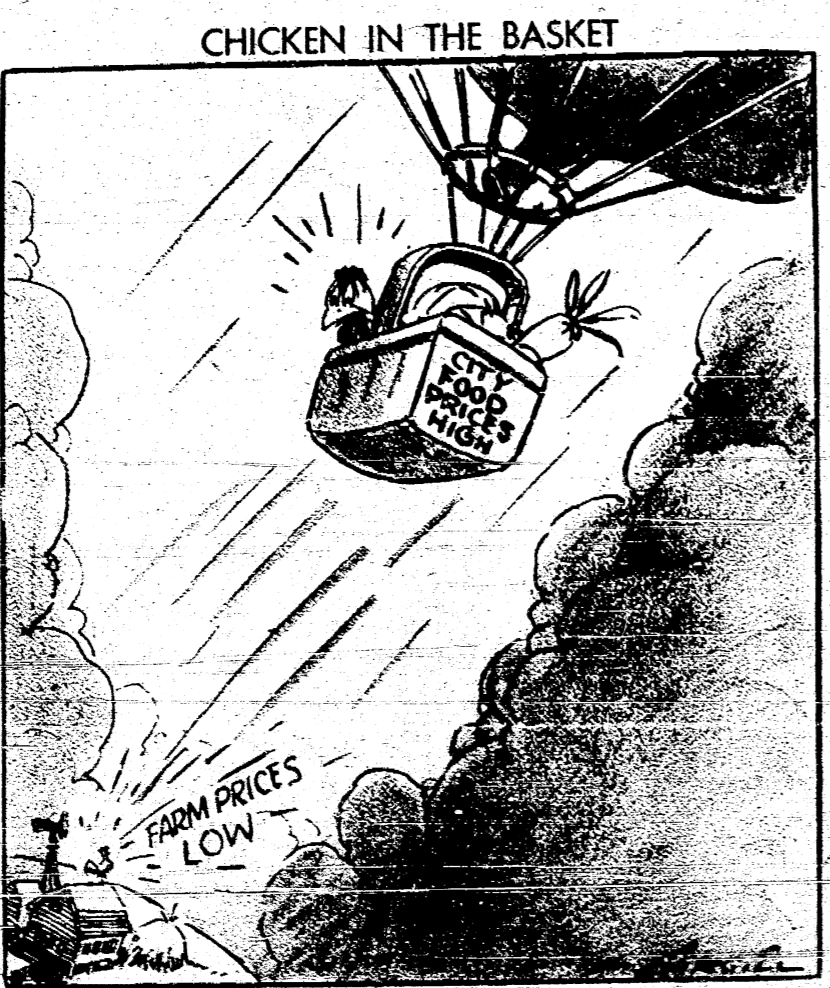

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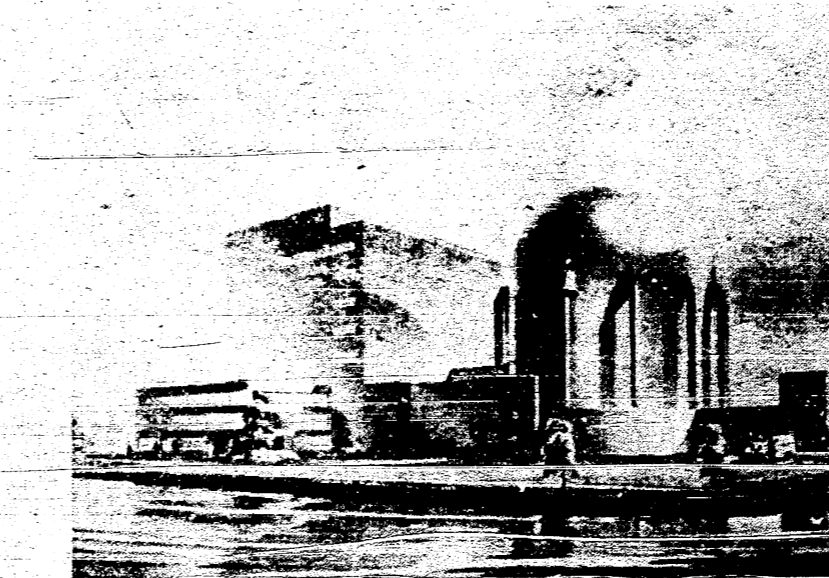
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**Detroit Edison, Others Are Interested**



POWER REACTOR DEVELOPMENT COMPANY has applied to the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission for license to build an atomic-electric power plant like this. Proposed location is on the Lake Erie shore north of Monroe, Mich. The company is a joint venture of Detroit Edison, Consumers Power, Chrysler, Burroughs, Fruehauf Trailer, and Holiday Carburator. Twenty companies outside of Michigan also have indicated their intention to participate in the project.

**Area Farmers Can Still Get Sugar Beet Acreage**

There is still acreage available for sugar beets in Monroe County according to R. J. Lauer, County Agricultural agent. Farmers have not yet signed up for all the acreage allotted to this area.

Lauer has just contacted Earl Heath, Manager of the A.S.C. office in Monroe. John Luft, Fieldman for the Buckeye Sugar Company, and H. Z. Heidman of the Northern Sugar Company. They state that farmers wishing to grow beets not later than Wednesday, of the three parties about sugar beets not later than Wednesday, February 1.

Acreage allotments are set on a company basis and assigned to different areas. Farmers interested in growing beets should see one of these men.

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**Over The Top**

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**\$1.25 Per Bushel Estimated Top**

Chances are small that the price of the 1955 corn crop will go above \$1.25 a bushel in Michigan, according to Karl T. Wright, farm economist at Michigan State University.

Wright said that record supplies of corn, large government holdings and little prospect for more exports will hold the price of corn to \$1.25.

For wheat, Wright indicated that \$1.85 a bushel would be about the high for this year. The decline, however, may not be as much as last year. Large government holdings of old crop wheat, a smaller 1955 crop and the price support program have strengthened wheat prices.

The farm economist also said that the price of the 1955 pea crop would probably not rise much above the support level. Large stocks on hand, both government and "free", will hold the price down.
