**Race Even More Profound Than Religion-Of Mankind**

I don't need to write this piece. I have a good excuse. I cannot go down to Alabama to study the situation first hand. And even if I could how much can one know about a complex race problem unless he actually lives with it? Race is even more profound than religion in the spirits of men.

I lived for more than 13 years as a member of the dominant racial minority, generally known as a "foreigner," a "Chinee" as it was among the Chinese. Were it a matter of preference, they would have sent me without me. Certainly they resented the biological mixture when it occurred; customs, traditions, responses were different and with the best of intentions they had to be careful not to give offense.

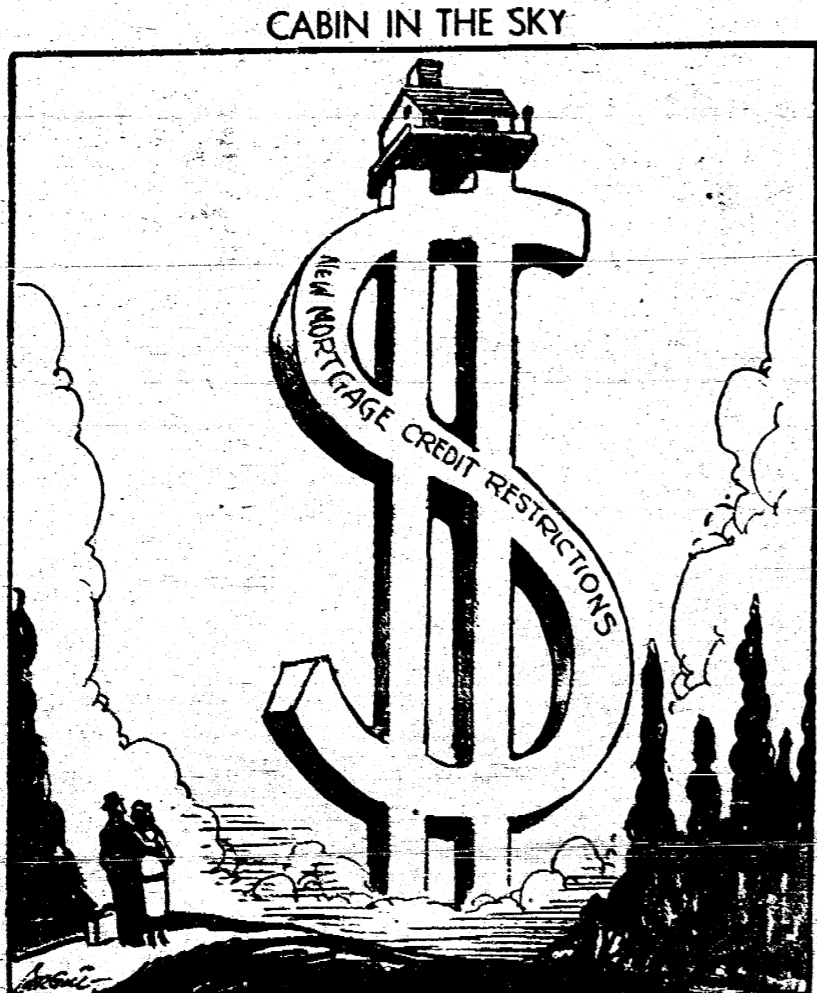
The point about race prejudice is that it is ubiquitous. That does not make it right or just, but a fact. And many facts are ugly and unwanted. And in many cases there are no realistic solutions. The ugly fact continues despite the universal agreement that it is ugly. This much is certain that there is no evidence in the whole of human history that any race or even nation has been favored by any deity to have another race of nation.

Education has done much in the United States to lessen racial prejudice, but not enough to eliminate the problem. For instance, a few in New York can be on the most intimate terms with certain men; they may be his close business associates and they may see each other every day and dine in each other's homes, but it is impossible for that true friend to be a member of the club to which, let us say, all of his intimate friends belong. They will advise him not to permit his name to be presented.

There is always someone who will exercise the right of blackball on a racial issue. His own sense of superiority restrains him to do it. He faces no particular problem; he expresses an inherited and inherent prejudice.

While in practical terms this is meaningless, it represents the same form of racial antagonism which has caused all the trouble in Alabama where I am told by those who should know, gradually making significant progress. Gradualism means that a Negroes and whites of good will sit down to find solutions for such problems as they can solve; they postpone other problems to subsequent meetings.

**Mean Old Man To Sunny Boy**  
Change In Russian Policy

Stalin's one-time junior partner have shifted from a mean-ol-man to a sunny boy. They waited for the head of the firm to die so they could put new ideas into the business to please customers.

Stalin's change is the same word as communism. But Stalin's professors in the Kremlin clearly explained this week there is a profound difference between him and them on how to bring about world communism.

Nikita Khrushchev, Communist Party boss, did not bring the new Kremlin leaders. He addressed a warning of the party faithful but knew his words would be carried around the world.

Stalin's heirs as they've shown since Stalin's death and as Khrushchev showed in his speech exhibit a vitality, imagination and patience which seemed far beyond the old man.

Examples: They tried to patch up their quarrel with Marshal Tito; they courted Asia, a trip which was a big success for them; they promised help to backward countries; they've begun to drive a wedge between the West and the Middle East, an area which, although close to Russia, the West almost dreamily seemed to think was out of bounds for the Communists; and they have the United States still trying to figure out how to say no to their offer of a 20-year treaty of friendship.

This is the new Russian policy as laid down by Khrushchev.

They've thrown aside the idea that fearful overthrow is necessary everywhere. They have time. They'll be patient. Backward countries they try to win over by friendly acts and help. In democratic countries which are weak or divided they try to take over by winning a majority in the Parliament, even if they have to do so by building a " united front" with any non-Communists who'll

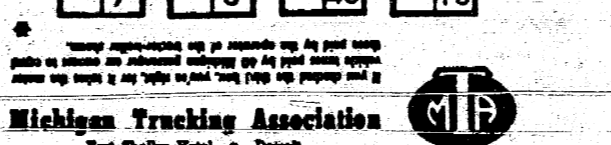

**Zion Church Adopts Rewritten Constitution**

**Manchesters Grads Wed In Church**

The Zion Lutheran Church a Rogers' Corners adopted a rewritten constitution at its annual meeting in February. Revision of the church's constitution followed action taken at the 1951 annual meeting when the church council was asked to "suggest amendments or rewrite the constitution and present it at the annual meeting of 1953 for appropriate action."

Principal changes provided in the newly adopted constitution are the enlarged church council; election of officers of the council by the council members themselves; establishment of three committees composed of certain council members and other appointed church members; establishment of tenure of office of council members and abolition of the system of church trustees was with the public report of the amount of each member's financial contribution to the building fund.

The rewritten constitution substitutes, in place of the public financial report, quarterly reports to be made privately and by mail, to each contributing member, by the person serving on the new created office of recording financial secretary.

The church council, under the new constitution, will be composed of the pastor and ten elected members to be designated as follows: three trustees who are to be elected by the council at its organizational meeting; quarterly reports to be made by the council at its organizational meeting; three trustees; three deacons who will be the vice-president, recording secretary, recording secretary and treasurer; and the Sunday School superintendent.

Members of the church council with the exception of the Sunday school superintendent will be elected for three year terms and will be eligible to serve two consecutive terms, while the Sunday school superintendent will be elected annually and may serve three consecutive terms. All Council members become eligible for re-election after the lapse of three years following the conclusion of their terms of office.

Committees formed under the new constitution are: evangelism, committee, consisting of the pastor, Sunday school superintendent and three elders; Christian education committee, to be composed of the same as the evangelism committee and finance committee, on which are to serve the pastor and three trustees (the present trustee and general financial secretary).

Each of the three committees may include other qualified members of the congregation appointed by the committee and each committee is assigned specific duties by provision of the constitution.

Instead of the former church "treasury envelope" system, voluntary offering system is being introduced, the envelope providing space for the name of the donor, expenses, benevolences and for building fund or other special expenses.

The original constitution of Zion Lutheran church was adopted in 1887. Revision was made in Feb. 192 and on Nov. 1, 1950.

Through the years since that the church's financial affairs have been conducted by five elected men and the pastor.

Church council members who are continuing to serve until an election under the new constitution is held are: Arthur Hart, Eric Engstrom, Haist, Alton Horning, Walter Loeffler and Norman Wenk. Within the past few years the congregation has renovated the church and decorated it, built a new parish hall and new parsonage.

Rev. Robert C. Kaiser has been pastor of the church since June of last year, succeeding Rev. M. W. Brueckner, now retired.

**Silence Weather Stripping**  
THERE'S nothing quite so annoying as a whistling or vibrating door weather strip when a door is closed. This nuisance can be stopped effectively by inserting a thin strip of felt or rubber between the edge of the door and the frame of the door.

Fit the strip and make sure the door will close snugly against the weather stripping without binding. This can be done by gluing the felt or rubber into place as fast as it will.

**Proper Diet for the Healthy Teenager**

**Truck Weight Restrictions**  
The Washtenaw County Road Commission deems it necessary to preserve the roads under the jurisdiction of this Board and by virtue of the applicable sections of the Michigan Vehicle Code being Act 500, Public Acts of 1949, as amended, we impose spring-time axle load restrictions effective 6:00 o'clock A.M. Monday, February 20, 1956. The allowable truck loading are as follows:

**Maximum Allowable Gross Axle Loadings**

Spacing Between Axles	Concrete	Black-Top & Gravel
9 feet or over	15,500 pounds	11,700 pounds
More than 3 1/2 feet but less than 9 feet	9,750 pounds	8,450 pounds
When less than 3 1/2 feet the combined weight shall not exceed	15,500 pounds	11,700 pounds

Maximum load on any wheel shall not exceed: 555 pounds 450 pounds (pounds per inch of tire width)

**Maximum Truck Speed**  
No truck, tractor or tractor with trailer, nor any combination of such vehicles with a gross loaded or unloaded in excess of 5,000 pounds shall exceed a speed of 35 miles per hour during the period when reduced loadings are being enforced.

### Manchester Wins Crown In Cage Loop

Manchester High's Dutchmen had completed the scheduled portion of their school's basketball year and were looking ahead to District Tournament competition two weeks hence.

Coach Max Lee's Manchesterites defeated Leagee, 65-46, to set up an unshared League of the Lakes cage crown and finish the regular season with a sparkling 15-1 win-loss record. It was the first unshared title for Manchester since 1952. Other Manchester High teams had held shares of the League of Lakes championship in 1947 and 1953.

On Friday night's other League game, Dexter defeated Hartland, 61-43. The District scheduled contest between South Lyon and Boylston, was postponed until next Thursday because of last night's poor driving conditions.

Manchester broke into the clear against Pinckney by outscoring the Pirates, 80-4, in the first period and then holding the home team to 12 points through the twelve to pace the Dutchmen whose best high scorer, Bill Fournier, made five of six field goals and sent Dick Higgins '44 to Pinckney.

Manchester's Little Dutchmen came out on a 15-1 season record by downing the Little Pirates, 51-36.

Big Mike O'Malley paced a 22 point fourth period rally as Dexter broke away from Hartland after the teams reached the three-quarter mark locked at 38-34. O'Malley counted 12 of his 13 points in the final period. Deane Clark added a dozen for the Drad while best scoring reserves, Wend Hartland's Don Christensen, who missed 15, Non-King added a dozen.

In preliminary action, Dexter's Little Dutchmen gained a 33-22 overtime decision on the help of Ed Stacey's extra-period field goal.

### Highway Commissions 4 Lane Road Program

Governor G. Mennen Williams this week released a map showing the Highway Commission's promised four-lane road program for 1965 and 1967, and declared he was dismayed by the huge gaps and deficiencies it revealed.

The Governor said his office prepared the map from information furnished by Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler, after Ziegler had repeatedly failed to produce it in the form the Governor requested.

The accompanying map shows the proposed program of highway construction by 1967 in broken lines. The Governor said, "I hope these programs will be completed to open in 1967 in broken lines."

This map shows a big program of promises made possible by the arterial highway act of 1952. The Governor said, "I hope these promises will be completed in 1967 in broken lines."

Although it is a disappointment that the highway program is being delayed, the Governor said, "I am disappointed by the showing '65 by 1958 we will not have a single four-lane road going from one important place to another—except for the Toledo-Detroit expressway which has been under construction for four years now."

This map emphasizes the need for increasing the State's road bonding authority, as I have proposed to the Legislature. In view of the deficiencies revealed by the Governor's cited seven major deficiencies in the four-lane road program:

"The Governor has recommended to the Legislature that bonding authority be increased from \$200 million to about \$400 million. The increase would be approximately sufficient to build an additional 400 miles of multi-lane highway."

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### Blue Cross Issues Statement To Clarify Controversy

On Thursday, February 21, the Commissioner of Insurance, Pospisil Joseph A. Navarre, publicly expressed approval of a proposed law which would make a deductible provision compulsory in all Michigan Blue Cross hospital care contracts. At the same time he charged Blue Cross with bad faith, insincerity and failure to meet its responsibilities.

The proposed law would insert in every Blue Cross hospital care contract a requirement that the Blue Cross subscriber pay the entire cost of the first day of hospitalization and 15 percent of the cost of hospitalization after the first day. The provision would be optional with the subscriber of the group. It would be imposed by law on every contract of the State of Michigan, holding Blue Cross hospital care contracts.

Blue Cross is not opposed to a deductible feature in its hospital care contracts. It has, in fact, made a deductible or "co-payment" contract available for the past year, on a voluntary and optional basis. The provision would be a legal requirement that such provisions be inserted in all hospital care contracts regardless of the wishes of the members. Many people prefer the full comprehensive service which Blue Cross has traditionally provided.

Blue Cross does not believe its members should be denied, by law, a comprehensive hospital contract if they prefer it.

Blue Cross considers the charges of bad faith and insincerity to be wholly unfounded. Blue Cross has continuously worked to improve its hospital care contracts, its operating expenses and to combat, as far as possible, the effect of inflation on hospital care costs. Studies of the causes of increases in the hospital care have been conducted by Blue Cross both in Michigan and Nationally. The advice of the best medical profession and leading engineers in many fields has been sought. Much progress has been made. Much more progress is necessary, but Blue Cross continues its efforts to reduce hospital care costs.

The Blue Cross Board of Trustees is a representative group of 38 men and women serving with distinction in the public interest. They are a high type of public spirited citizen, discharging their responsibilities honestly and to the best of their ability. The Commissioner's charges, if accurately reported, are not only unjustified but are a reflection on the character and integrity of the Blue Cross Trustees.

The problems of Blue Cross, and of the cost of hospital care, are real, and deserve careful consideration and public scrutiny. The achievements of Blue Cross are equally real, and equally worthy of public attention. We believe that the Study Commission to be appointed by the Governor will place in true focus the contribution which Blue Cross has made to the health of the people of the State of Michigan.
