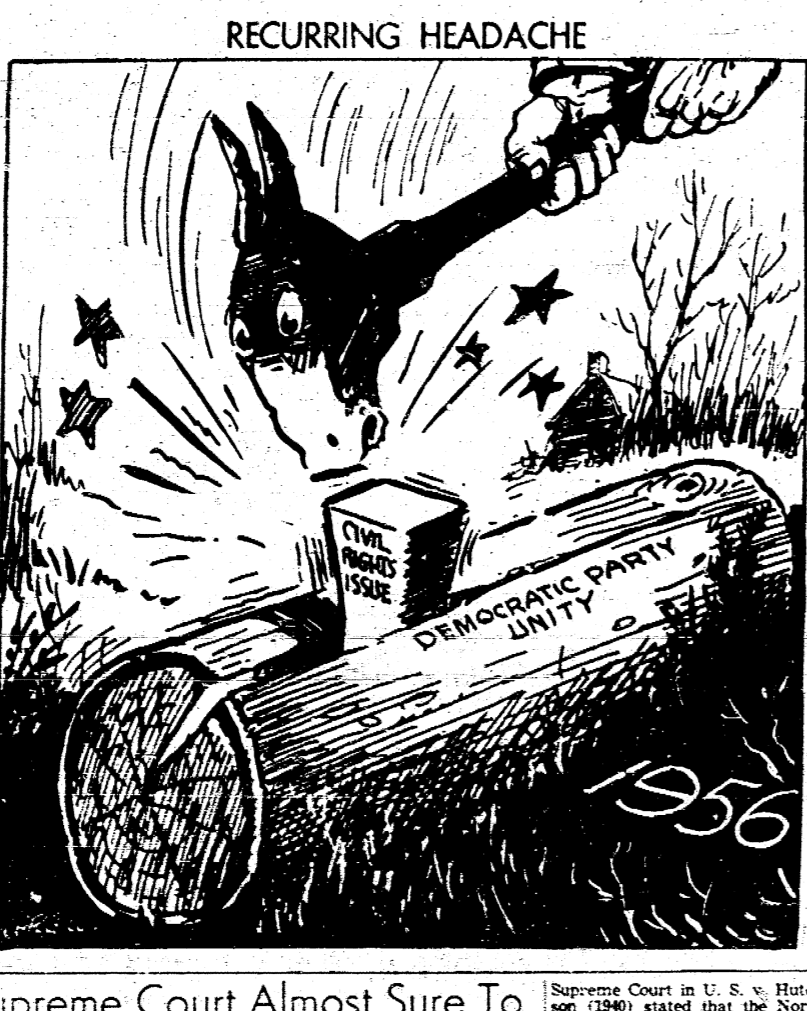

Farm Briefs

Supreme Court Almost Sure To Review Boycott Case Decision

The U. S. Supreme Court almost certainly will be asked to review any decision in the Montgomery, Ala., boycott case. The case is being tried under a 1952 statute that requires boycotts of legal business "without legal excuse or just cause."

The statute, whatever its original purpose had been previously applied only in labor disputes. But an Alabama circuit judge on March 15 upheld the indictments of the Negroes arrested for boycotting Montgomery city bus lines. The judge's decision was based on the constitutionality of the state law on March 22 of the state ruled that the state had established a prima facie case of conspiracy.

Don't Worry If Heart Skips Says U-M Doctor

Don't worry if your heart skips a beat now and then. That's the advice of Dr. Franklin D. Johnston, professor of internal medicine and director of the heart station at The University of Michigan Medical School. He warns that excessive concern over your pulse or heart beat can turn you into a confirmed cardiac neurotic.

Many people with no heart disease have transient skipping or irregularities of the heart, the doctor explains; but individuals with symptoms of this kind should not jump to the conclusion that these sensations are indications of serious heart trouble.

Medically, these irregularities are known as extrasystoles. They are usually not serious, and are often called "skipping" or "thumping" sensations in the region of the heart, or "occasional irregularities" when they feel.

Some people are only aware of occasionally the upper chest or neck, become devoted pulse feelers. Dr. Johnston says that a normal heart rate is 70 to 80 beats a minute. "This practice is a bad habit," he says, "worse than biting finger nails."

If the symptoms prove persistent the individual concerned content and consulting the doctor suggest his physician, who will determine their significance and outline treatment, if any is needed.

Stores Lost During Paper Strike

Detroit stores lost about \$3 million in December business during the newspaper strike, according to the Michigan State University bureau of business research.

Handy Hints

How to Plane Top of Door

Doors that scrape at the top of bottom are a nuisance. Planing down the high spots, of course, is the best cure.

A problem in connection with the planing operation, however, is the likelihood of splintering the wood when shaving across the end grain of the door stile. The job described here will prevent this.

The illustration appeared in *American Builder*, the magazine published for professional builders.

Take two 1 x 4s about four feet long and nail two suitable spacers between the two, leaving a space of about one inch between the door and the block at either end. Make two tapering wedges from a piece of hardwood, making them an inch thick at their widest point.

Place the jig over the end of the upright door and drive the wedges into position as shown. Now the plane may be run across the door in either direction without danger of splintering the wood.

Chick Chats

Someone has said that a good poultryman should raise 90 per cent of the chicks that he starts. To do this, the poultry farmer must have good chicks in the beginning. In planning the buying of chicks for this year, keep in mind that there are no "bargains" in baby chicks. Whether you want a laying type or meat type, or a combination of both, choose the best stock available.

Talk such matters over with the hatcheryman before the order is placed for the chicks. Ask him about the ancestry of the chicks that he sells. Demand and get good breeding in the chicks that you buy. Good breeding stands out in any competition. Good chicks mature faster, grow better, and have higher livability than poor quality chicks. This investment in good quality chicks adds up to meat and egg profits with a minimum of feed costs. After all, a poor chick eats as much feed as the good one, and doesn't produce anything to show for it.

Low quality chicks may be low in cost and may seem like a bargain but they fail to produce the meat and eggs that they should when they're mature. Inferior breeds are often more susceptible to poultry disease and have a higher rate of mortality than well-bred chicks from a high-quality strain.

The farmer who is raising chickens takes the first step in becoming a successful poultryman when he buys quality chicks for his farm flock. At chick-buying time, the groundwork for raising birds that grow faster, produce more eggs, and yield better profits is laid.

This is also a good time to talk with the hatcheryman about poultry supplies that will be needed this year. Ask him about new medications, new types of feed, recent research work by feed companies, state colleges, and commercial firms. All of these people are

consumption of poultry and poultry products reached an all-time high last year, reports J. M. MacMoore, Extension poultryman at Michigan State University. And prospects for another record year are good, he added.
