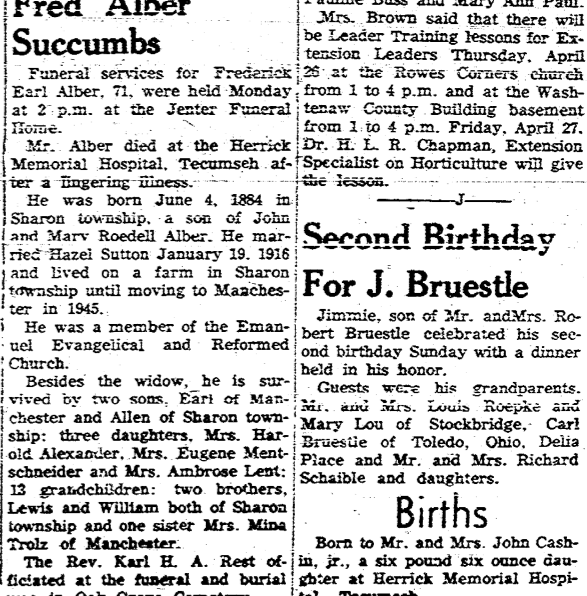

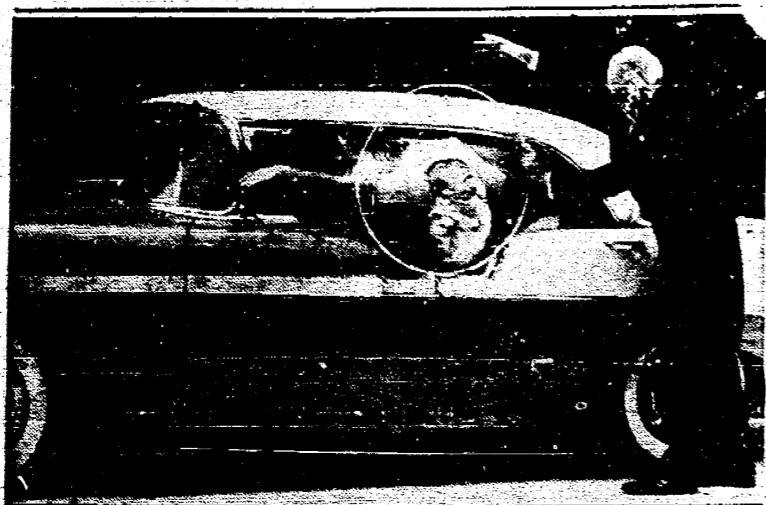

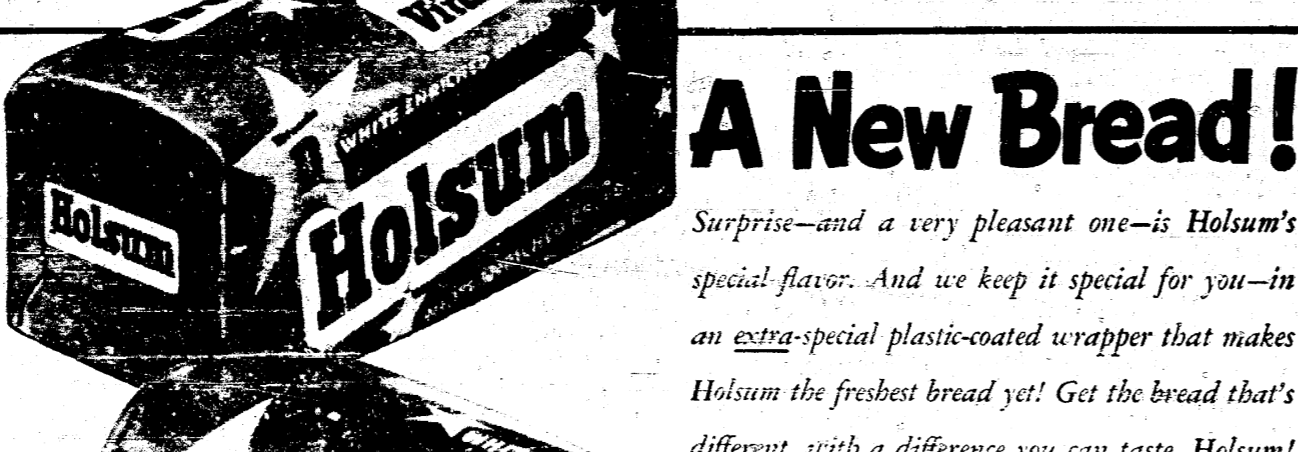

The Washenaw County Road Commission was advised by the Board of Supervisors to meet with a committee of three who employ a grievance procedure from among the commission employes.

Employees of the commission, through their Local 433, complained to the supervisors that the commission has failed to "arrange" a meeting to discuss work policy in the commission yards.

Local 433 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees claims to represent a majority of the commission workers.

Union officials had sent each supervisor a letter which claimed that the commission is "contemplating" changes in the employes' work week, work conditions and wages.

Specifically, the union contends, the commission is "contemplating" a reduction of the average work week from 49 and one half to 45 hours. The local seeks a 10 per cent wage increase to "compensate" for the alleged shorter work week.

Most employes, according to the commission, work nine hours a day, five days a week on alternate weeks.
