Schoolroom Has Its Own Society Says UM Professor

Most objectionable behavior in the classroom is the "I'll get even with you" variety, says Glen R. Rasmussen, lecturer in education in The University of Michigan Extension Service here.

According to Rasmussen, the child is simply reacting back at the schoolroom society for having been given a low rating on the social ladder. Since this behavior is disruptive to smooth classroom functioning, the teacher naturally needs to follow up with some sort of constructive program.

"Sometimes a child is unpopular with his classmates for physical reasons," Rasmussen explains. "He may be unattractive or his clothes may suggest that he is different. Here the teacher may help the child directly with suggestions and try to change the group's ideas of the value of conformity," he suggests.

Rasmussen states that a child is often shunned by his classmates because his aggressive behavior interferes with group activities.

"A child whose home education has convinced him that the world is a hostile place and that the best way to survive is to get in the first punch may be made to see that getting in the first punch is exactly what is making his world hostile."

MSU Find Method To Up Dairy Sales

A Michigan State University dairyman figures that some of Michigan's dairy product surplus can be reduced if grocers will put their ice cream cabinets in a more prominent place.

Dairy Researcher Joseph A. Messer, came to this conclusion after a survey of 73 retail grocers in Michigan.

He found by talking to customers that most of them didn't read to buy ice cream until they came to the store. Then an attractive ice cream display placed in a strategic location could make them more pleased with their ice cream purchases if the cabinets are located near or at the check-out lines. That gives them a chance to get the produce home before it's affected by heat.

Meat-Type Hogs Are 'Good Doers'

Michigan hogmen can produce meat-type hogs just as efficiently as fat-type hogs, but the carcasses will meet market demands.

The report made by Ed Miller, extension animal husbandman at Michigan State University, after summarizing results from 25 pairs of pigs recently tested at the M.S.U. swine evaluation station. These hogs were farrowed in the fall of 1955.

Three pairs of hogs qualified as superior meat-type. The highest rating given by the state, while two pairs were rated as "commercial meat-type." Miller claims the other seven pairs as fat-type.

The five top pairs made 100 pounds of gain on an average of 25 pounds of feed while the fat-type hogs took an average of 30 pounds of feed to make the same gain.

Miller points to another important difference. The meat-type hog yielded 1.66 per cent more of their live weight in the primal cuts and 1.66 per cent more of their live weight in the primal cuts and belly than the fat-type hogs. This higher yield makes these hogs worth \$1.50 per hundredweight more to the packer, Miller says.

The five meat-type pairs needed only an average of 123 days to reach a slaughter weight of 215 pounds. The fat-type hogs took 128 days to reach that weight.

Other important areas where the meat-type hogs outdid the fat-type hogs were: backfat thickness—1.61 inches compared to 1.85 inches for fat-type; and loin eye area where center cut pork chops come from. 4.34 square inches compared to 3.56 square inches for fat-type.

Miller also pointed out that weight of the pigs at 62 days of age has a direct effect on the amount of time needed to reach slaughter weight. Of all pigs on test during the past year, those in the heaviest group at 50 to 59 pounds at 62 days reached market at an average of 129 days. As weights grew lighter, the number of days on feed increased. Pigs weighing from 46 to 59 pounds at 62 days took 128 days to reach market weight while those in the 50 to 59 pound group needed 131 days.

The swine evaluation station is attempting to locate strains of hogs that will produce meat-type carcasses efficiently. Miller says litter mates of the certified meat-type hogs can be expected to produce carcasses having similar qualities.

Breeders having hogs that qualified as "superior meat-type" in the test of 1955 fall litters were Johnson Heckman, Durand, with two pairs of Yorkshires, and Ernest Gutschalk, Saline, with a pair of Poland Chinas.

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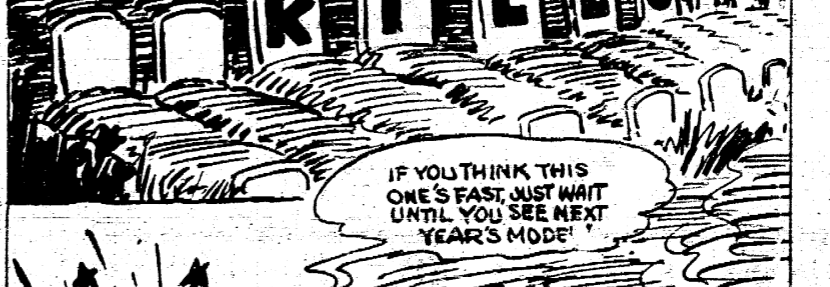
