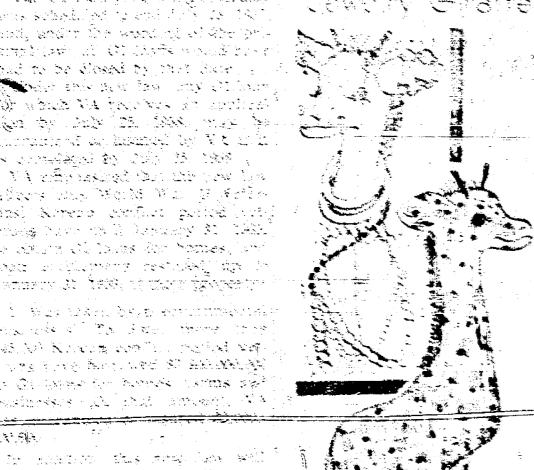

The father, a skilled craftsman, hopes to find work in America. The mother and children are adjusting to their new life in the United States.

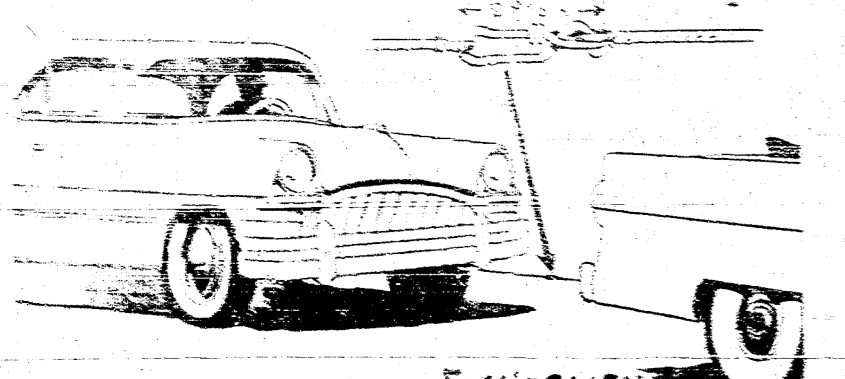
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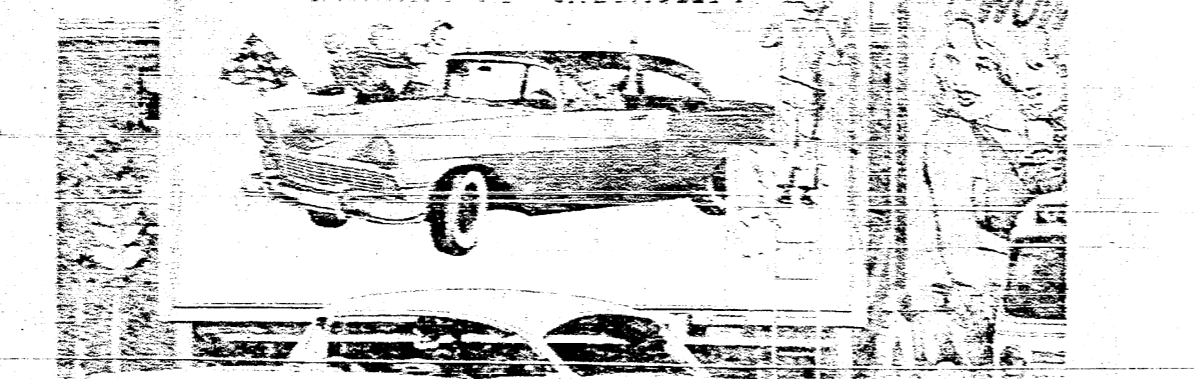

“STAY ON YOUR FEET”
OLDER PEOPLE URGED
“A man on his feet is worth two on their heels,” declared Dr. E. L. Bortz, past president of the American Medical Association. He was addressing a recent conference on aging at the University of Michigan.

“This was a reliable, fairly typical nursing home. It had been an ornate mansion, Mr. Thompson and a dozen other patients lay in what used to be the music room. The carved and gilded walls had been covered with sanitary white paint and instead of gay music there was only the labored breathing of patients and the occasional click of heels as a nurse made her rounds.

Today that miracle is happening for many unappreciated older people. Thanks to geriatric rehabilitation, older people who suffer a stroke, hip fracture, or other serious injury have a good chance of getting back on their feet or at least into a wheelchair. Regular massage and light exercises, administered by trained personnel, are the magic ingredients in this therapy.

This new therapy has practical as well as humane values. Students who moved from class to class to learn their lesson, can now learn to care for their personal needs. A fraction of the care and attention required by bed-ridden patients who have become helpless through muscular atrophy is required by those who are able to stand.

Even nursing homes, once notorious for letting patients vegetate until they passed on, are awakening to the importance of mild exercise in the care of the elderly. “I’ll never forget my first visit to a nursing home some twenty years ago. I went there to call on an elderly gentleman, a friend of my grandfather’s whose case seemed utterly hopeless. Today, happily, he is still living and his future is optimistic.”

Ager Thompson was his name. His voice so weak I could scarcely hear he told me he was 89 years old and had been flat on his back for two years.

July Farm Price Drop Not Serious: Ag. Dept.

Farmers usually get the highest prices for their wheat during the last three or four months of the marketing season, and the lowest prices in the summer months.

In 1956 the last 18 marketing months, prices for wheat were the lowest in the summer months since 1922. Prices in July were \$2.46 a bushel, down from \$2.55 in June.

Summing up the wheat price situation, the economist said that with the 1956 crop estimated at less than likely disappearance prices for the 1956-57 marketing year may average slightly higher relative to the loan rate than in 1955-56.

Farm Briefs

The Agriculture Department says nearly three million 600 thousand tons of U.S. agricultural commodities were sold in foreign markets under title 1 of Public Law 480.

This law provides for sale of surplus commodities to friendly foreign countries for their currencies, thereby helping meet commodity and dollar shortage problems and increase the export of U.S. farm supplies.

The department said at least 30,389 tons were shipped abroad during the first seven months of this year.

The adult membership of the American Red Cross has grown from 3,000 in 1905, to 22,200,000 in 1955.

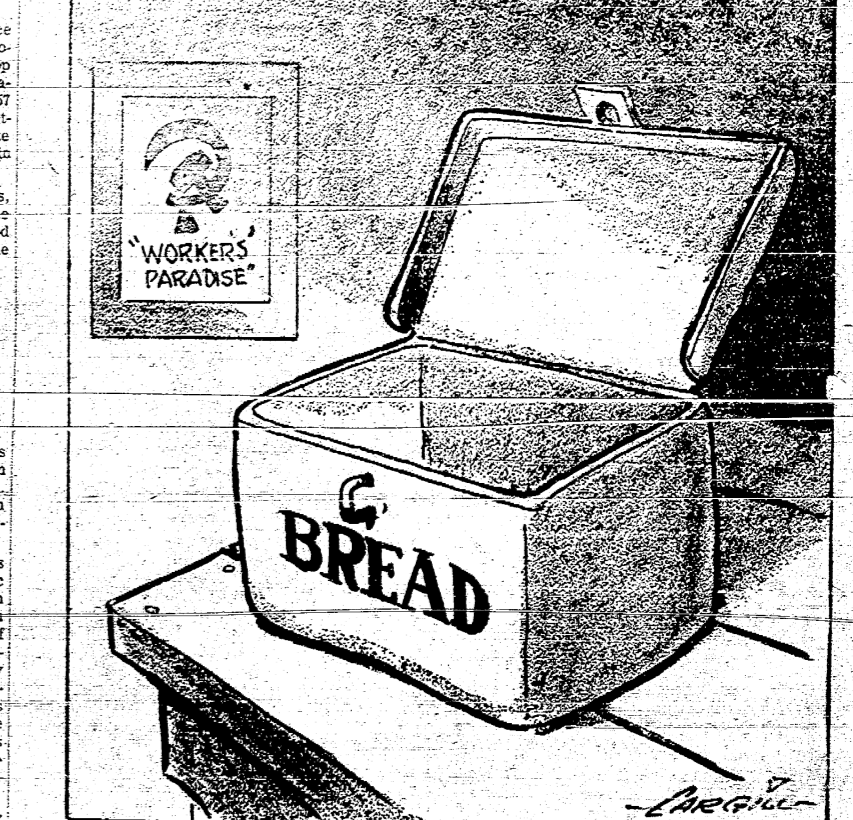

Governor Williams REPORTS TO THE PEOPLE

It would be hard to find a worse example of saboteurs of Michigan's interests than the recent State Senate hearings on business taxes.

These hearings were not an inquiry into Michigan tax laws. They were used for a political purpose — to prove that business is leveling Michigan because of adverse government policies.

The hearings resulted in nationwide publicity to the effect that Michigan is a bad place to run a business.

That is not only bad advertising for Michigan — it is also a gross distortion of facts.

INDUSTRIAL GROWTH The rank is that Michigan has gained more jobs and income than any other state in the nation since January, 1934.

Other facts which were not reported in the Senate hearing are:

1. Between 1933 and 1935 Michigan employers have reported to the Employment Security Commission a payroll growth of 204,000 employees.

2. During 1935 the average tax paid by Michigan employers for unemployment compensation was one percent. During the same year the average for the nation as a whole was 1.24 percent.

3. The percentage of Michigan revenues obtained from business taxes in 1935 was the lowest in the year, was 12.7 percent. The percentage for the nation as a whole was 14.0 percent. For New York State 2.3 percent, and Pennsylvania 2.3 percent.

Michigan is the fastest growing industrial state. According to the Bureau of Commerce Michigan's population has increased more since 1940 - 38 percent than any other state where manufacturing accounts for a third or more of the population. Although Michigan is sixth in population, it is first in total personal income.

DIVERSIFICATION The people who engineered the responsible Senate hearings last week would serve the state better if they brought out some of the

above facts — instead of giving current unemployment problems to the Michigan legislature as a mere excuse.

One of the basic answers to unemployment problems is to diversify industry by bringing into Michigan new types of businesses.

But the effort is hampered and sabotaged when some of our own leaders picture Michigan as a place where business would do well if only it were not for the Michigan State Senate.

Frankly responsible business leaders should raise their voice against this kind of propaganda, which may gain a few votes, but does the interest of everyone in Michigan.

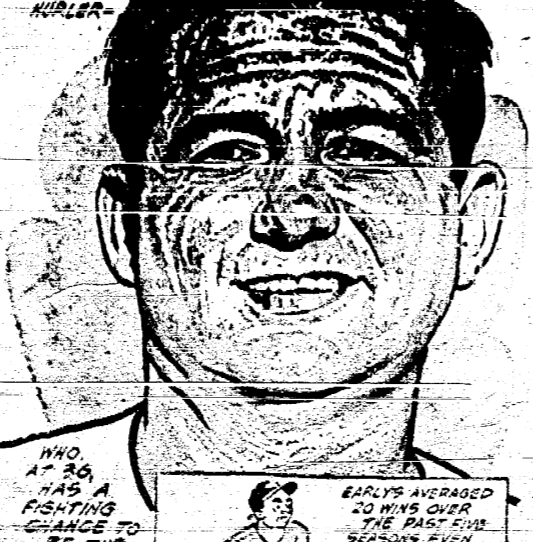

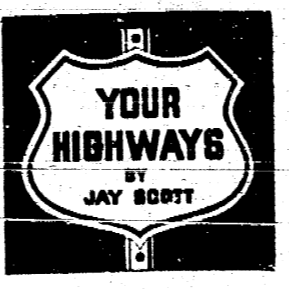

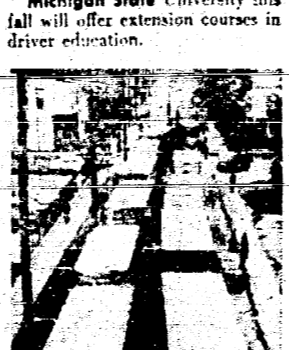
