An article which appeared in the Manchester Enterprise back on June 8, 1948, was brought in to the office this week by Mrs. Gordon Bowers who believed that it would be particularly interesting to our readers with knowledge of Sunday November 11.

"Manchester gave first aid to her war-wounded men, registered for the war."

"One hundred twelve young men stepped forward and manfully offered Tuesday morning and registered their names for war service in 1918. They were the first to do so in Manchester, Michigan."

"The number may seem small in proportion to some villages no larger than Manchester, but when we take into consideration that there is very little manufacturing done here, our list, all of whom want to work, seek employment in the nearby cities, we think the matter is explained. Clinton, Tecumseh, and Chelsea have factories where the young men are employed."

"We did not hear of the registration and several said that they thought they were the only ones in Manchester."

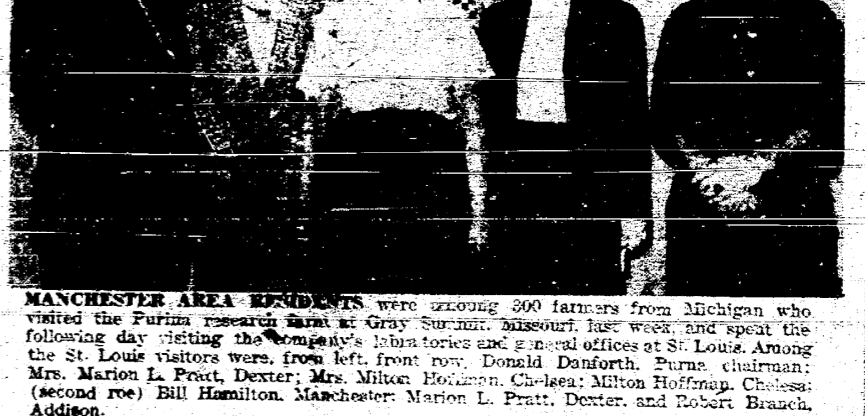

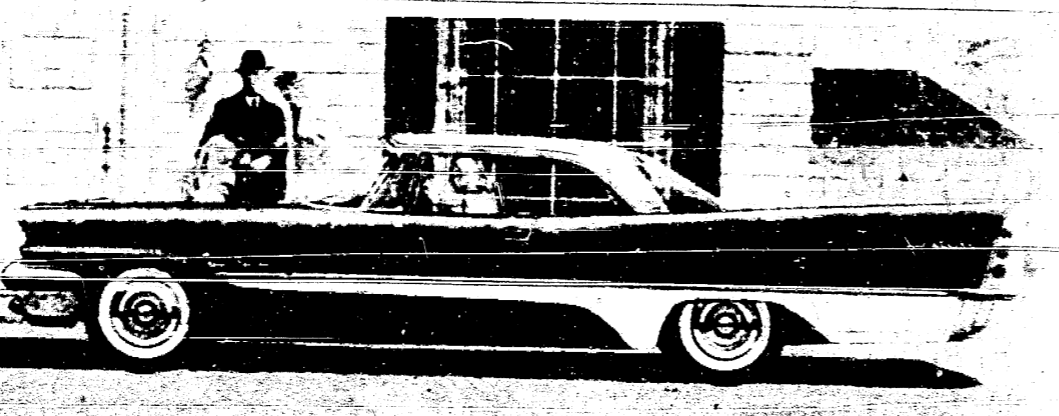
