Good October Weather Aids in Near-Record Harvest On Farms

Favorable harvest weather during the October helped account for a slight increase in crop production during the month and assures the nation of a near-record output this year.

Report on crop production comes from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., based on reports from 15,000 farms in 15 states.

Production of all crops on Nov. 1 was estimated at 3,412,183,000 bushels, about 10 per cent above the 1955 level and 11 per cent above the average of the last five years.

Production of major crops was estimated as follows: Corn, 1,200,000,000 bushels, 10 per cent above the 1955 level and 11 per cent above the average of the last five years. 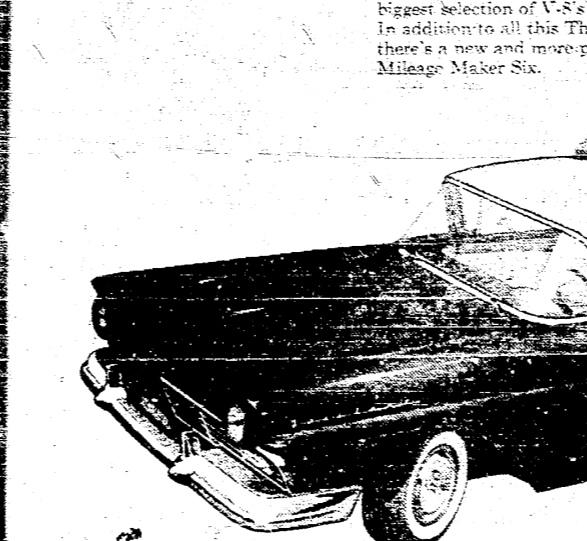

He presented statistics of the season which explain better than any other the team's success. The donor of the trophy has asked to remain anonymous.

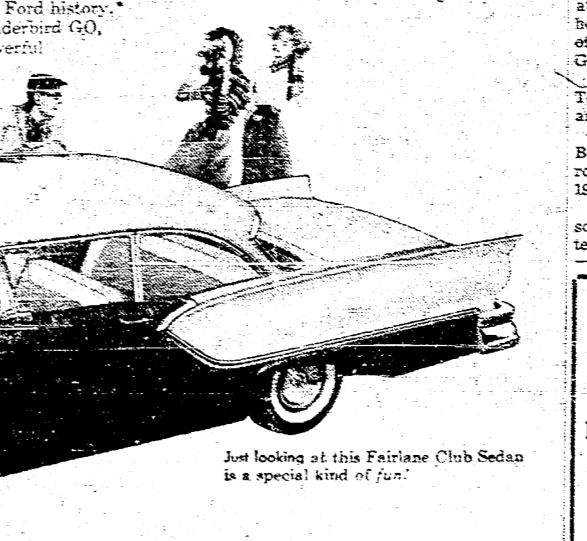

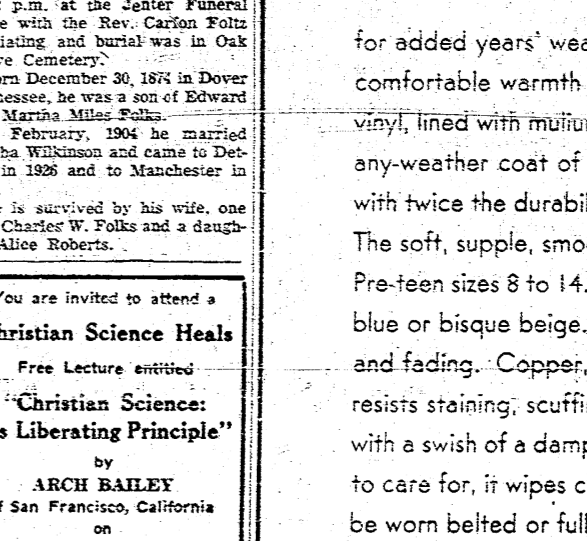

Get Salk Shots Now, Doctor Says

Persons in Washtenaw County should start now taking Salk anti-polio vaccine shots to protect against the 1957 polio outbreak season. Dr. Otto K. Engleke, health officer says.

It takes eight months, according to recommended practice, for a person to receive three Salk vaccine injections, he pointed out. Salk records show that the latest incidence of polio occurs in the summer and fall.

Persons of all ages should obtain the shots, Dr. Engleke said. The vaccine, otherwise, is available to physicians through commercial sources for any person of any age. It is now plentiful.

"We are particularly anxious that all children who received first and second injections at school clinics during the 1954 and 1955 be given their third injection," Dr. Engleke said.

The health department estimates that 15,000 children who are eligible for their third shot only 1,888 have received them.

Children who received their first two shots in the school clinics must go to their family physicians to obtain their third shot. There are no more school clinics.
