## Michigan State Police Recruiting Troopers

Start the new year right in a well paid career by joining the Michigan State Police. There are also very substantial increases with each promotion in rank. The advice given young men by Sergeant Fred O'Donnell, commanding officer of the Clinton post, is to become members of the State Police, but they must have their applications on file by Wednesday, January 30. The sergeant said, "We strongly urge that they look into this opening, because it is a fine career with security and a future. The pay is excellent. In the trooper rank alone it ranges up to about \$7,000 a year and, as everyone knows, there will be a new pay raise which has already been approved by the state civil service commission and applies to everyone." Pay increases with length of service. Entrance requirements include a minimum height of five feet, nine inches and a high school education or its equivalent. "This is really an opportunity well worth examining," the sergeant said. "Those interested are advised to call at any State Police post or write to the state civil service commission in Lansing. But they should act promptly. Trooper gets a further boost by being automatically promoted one full step in classification. There are also very substantial increases with each promotion in rank. ## Dr. David Dickinson Will Tell Polio Story To County Workers

More than 100 Washenaw County March of Dimes campaigners have been invited to a kick-off dinner for the January 8, at the Royal Order of Moose, 600 S. Maple, Ann Arbor, all mayors in the county have been invited to attend, together with representatives of business, labor and medical profession.

Featured speaker will be Dr. David Dickinson, medical director of the polio respirator center at University Hospital.

Donated by the Lodge, the dinner will mark the formal opening of the county-wide campaign to raise \$40,000 for polio prevention, research and rehabilitation. The drive runs through January 31.

Dr. Dickinson will use case histories of respirator center patients to show how individuals once wholly dependent on the iron lung now be restored in many instances to happy, productive lives. Talk will be illustrated with slides.

The respirator center was established at University Hospital in 1931. It is one of 15 such centers throughout the nation supported by the March of Dimes, a branch of the University Hospital unit has enabled nearly 150 polio patients, once bedridden in hospital, to return to their homes and enjoy a more normal life.

Studies conducted by the center show that the medical expert of persons who have returned after treatment at the center have been reduced from more than 25 per day to an average of about 25 per day. Because of the portance and success of this program, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has budgeted \$5 million for rehabilitation of 24 million for respirator center nationally in 1937.

Two facts are apparent in Michigan's health picture: The disease rate is declining and the accident toll is increasing.

Not content with continuing victories over disease, Michigan doctors in 1957 to tackle the toughest cause of all injury and death—traffic accidents.
