



The Ashes You Save May Be Your Own

The mercury's hovering around the zero mark here should serve as a reminder that this is the time of year when a highly inspection tour of your home may prevent a disaster.

The news accounts of the early-morning fire which caused great personal and property loss to merchants and tenants in Saline's business section, should make homeowners conscious that "It Could Happen to You."

Experts who have studied the causes and results of home fires have all given the following as safety precautions which can save many homes and families from fire losses.

Appoint a family fire inspector to check the following safety spots: See that no cigarettes are smoldering in trays; check to see if the fireplace screen is closed; make sure that stoves and portable heaters are turned off and checked to see that the furnace is operating properly.

A dress-rehearsal family fire-drill would be advisable so that each one in the house would know what to do in an emergency. Discharge the proper and safe procedure to be taken if a fire broke out in various locations in the home.

If there are small children assign a special person to look out for each child in an emergency. Make sure there are two exits from sleeping rooms, and that at least one storm window is unhooked to insure a quick exit.

A rope ladder or for older persons, a rope knotted at intervals, should be on the second floor, to provide easy exit without delay in trying to get to the ground for some makeshift method of escape.

Many night-fire victims die each year because of panic, terror and bewilderment resulting from a sleep-bogged mind.

It is never foolish to be prepared for possible danger and tragedy. Check your home for possible danger areas. Ask any fireman. He'll be glad to advise you. He knows the danger.





WHAT PRICE SAFETY?

Hi, Neighbor!

A lot can be said in favor of the old-fashioned method of discussing community affairs around the late-lamented cracker barrel in a general store, where the pros and cons of all controversial questions could be thrashed out loudly and amiably, and all interested parties could freely express themselves, and regardless of the outcome, everyone had the satisfaction of having had his say. The cracker barrel is a thing of the past, but the method or friendly discussion is still the best means of fairly presenting any question of community interest to the public.

We don't have a cracker barrel, but we do have a question that we think should be considered by the residents of this community.

We've been stressing the importance of the necessity of the complete protection of three shots of Salk vaccine for all youngsters and adults up through the age of 40 years. A large percentage of the public, as yet, has not received these shots. A large supply of the vaccine is now waiting to be used immediately, to afford complete safety before the start of the polio season. The Salk vaccine cannot be stored for long lengths of time. It should be used now.

What is causing the so-called "apathy" of the public? Is the cost prohibitive to families where there are four, five or more members who should be protected?

The government last week issued figures showing that the cost of living for the past month reached an all-time high. With the cost of living taking such a large percentage of family income now, is this added cost of "living safely" too much of a strain on the average family budget? Is the cost of the treatment too high for those who have supported the March of Dimes during the many years when scientists, doctors and chemists sought a preventative for the dread disease of polio? Is it necessary for parents to make a choice of the immediate need of food, clothing and shelter and the possible need of Salk vaccine protection?

We don't know the answers to these questions, but we do know that many needing protection haven't received the Salk vaccine treatment. We know that the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has asked all Marching Mothers to stress the need of this protection, and that Dr. Salk, who perfected the vaccine, has urged immediate action by those not already protected or fully protected before the polio season. These treatments to insure the most perfect protection should begin by March 1, so that all three shots could be given prior to the polio season.

Almost every citizen in this community has aided in this drive, either through giving through their children in schools, placing coins in canisters or attending benefits, or having their contributions ready for the Marching Mothers. Every citizen should be protected so that every cent collected for the March of Dimes could be utilized for patients who were struck by polio before the Salk vaccine was perfected.

However, it is quite possible that the cost of the care, treatment and rehabilitation of one new patient struck by polio because the Salk vaccine treatments were neglected, would use up as much, or more, than the entire amount collected for the March of Dimes through the efforts of so many here.
