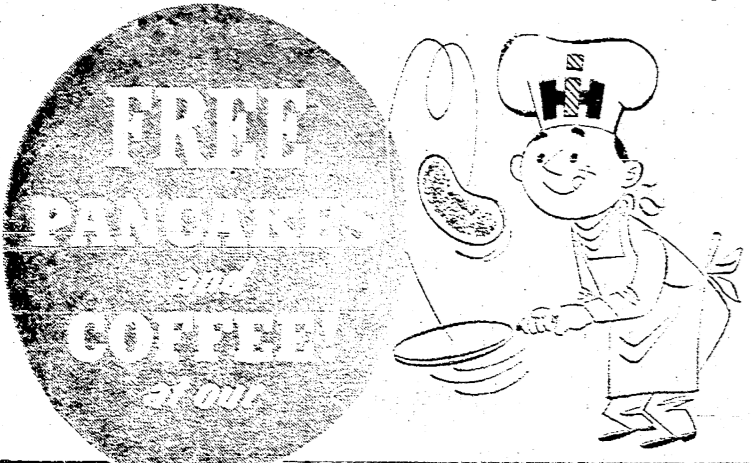

Marine Pvt. R. House Participating In Operation Ski Jump

Pvt. Ronald A. House, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold House of 119 Coman St., Clinton, Mich. is participating in "Operation Ski-Jump" with the 1st Marine Division during the period Jan. 17-23.

"Ski-Jump," a large-scale maneuver utilizing land, sea and air forces of the Marine Corps and Navy, is taking place at Camp Pendleton Calif. and at sea, employing over 50,000 men and more than 100 ships.

The 1st Marine Division, supported by the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, has been storming the beaches of the Camp Pendleton reservation since Jan. 17 and will continue to maneuver ashore until Jan. 23.

Both conventional landing craft and the Marine conception of "vertical envelopment" by the use of transport helicopters are being utilized.

Practically all versions of modern warfare are being put into use: naval bombardment, amphibious landing, close air support, seaplane, borne invasion and mass evacuation and replacement.

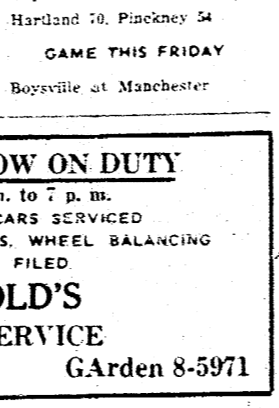
