I am 22 years old, five feet seven inches tall and am very much interested in sports, music, books and writing. I am also interested in exchanging African goods for American ones.

African goods are: carved things, dagger knives, leopard skin bags, 12 yds. of neckties, savings ground nut, native combs, crocodile skin bags, ivory, thorn and horn carvings, tortoise shell, and other things such as jackets, slacks, sweaters, watches, court shoes, pants, T-shirts, ankle and oiled socks, ties, shirts, leather belts, suits, books, shaving materials, etc.

I promise to reply to all letters written to me by air-mail. Thanking the editor for the space allowed me and may God bless you and all your efforts with brilliant success.

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Anticipates Increase in '58 Budget

William T. Scheel, chairman of the Washtenaw County Board of Supervisors, said that the anticipated 1958 budget will require an estimated 3.7 mills.

This figure was slightly lower than a figure Scheel was quoted as giving earlier this month after a meeting with the County Board of Education to explain the county's budget.

Scheel said that two-thirds of the budget includes items "that cannot be reduced." He said this year's budget of \$21,817 will be about \$200,000 higher than in 1958.

There will be no "usable" balance in the county general fund at the end of the year, Scheel said. He further stated that the county will have to obtain all of its operating money from taxes next year or go into debt.

Scheel said this year's revenue is \$21,817, the available 15 mills and the county 4.8 of the available millage.

Scheel said his committee plans to meet in mid-February at all school district superintendents' and their business managers or other representatives to discuss the county's financial situation.

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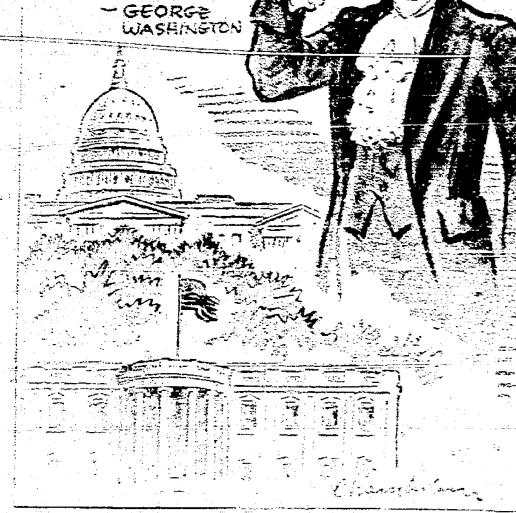

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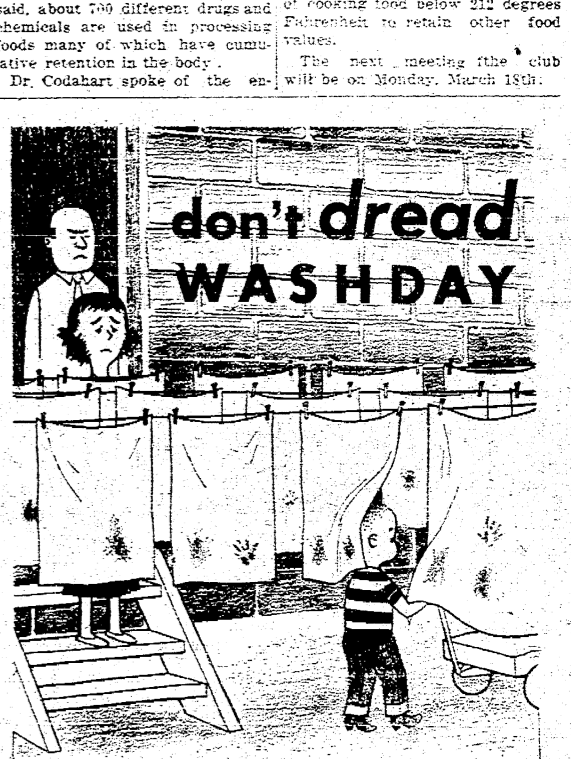

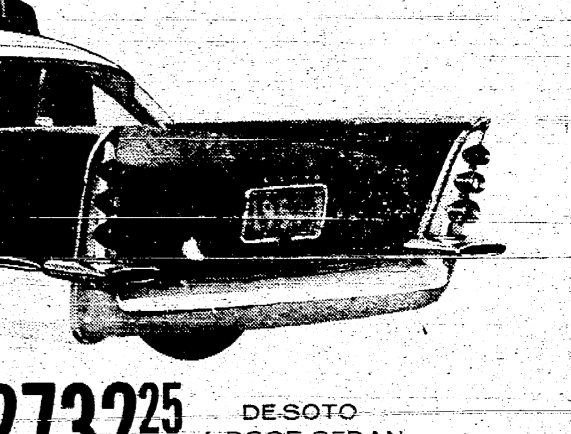
