Poland's New Agricultural Policy Emphasizes The Free Private Farm Development

Poland's new agricultural policies, announced by Warsaw, emphasize the free development of individual farms.

This has not always been so in the Communist State. According to Donald E. Johnson, Agricultural Service, a unit of the department of agriculture, private farms in Poland constitute 1.5 per cent of the total. Collective farms represent 8.8 per cent and state farms 12.5 per cent.

Poland's government is now in the process of lifting all restrictions on ownership, trading, and purchase and sale of land, in order to make the privately owned farms more profitable. The government is to be given the opportunity to acquire state land to increase their farms. Unproductive land held by the state is to be modified. In time, it can be sold to private owners for no less than eight years.
