BE FIRESIGHTED!

TREAT ALL GUNS AS IF THEY WERE LOADED. Keep guns unloaded except when actually using them. Aim ONLY at targets you want to shoot.

WATCH YOUR STEP TO PREVENT FALLS. Keep ladders and steps in good repair, with no loose rungs. Make sure they are easily accessible in case of emergency, and don't pile things on stairways.

SPEAK TO ANIMALS WHEN APPROACHING THEM. Keep them calm by acting with calm self-assurance yourself. Keep bulls in a safe pen.

KNOW AND OBEY ALL TRAFFIC LAWS. Follow safe driving practices. Read and obey all traffic signs.

BE A GOOD HOUSEKEEPER. Have a plan for everything and keep everything in its place.

KEEP MACHINES IN GOOD REPAIR. Keep all guards and safety devices in place. Stop machines before unloading, oiling or adjusting them. Don't wear loose, floppy clothing around machinery.

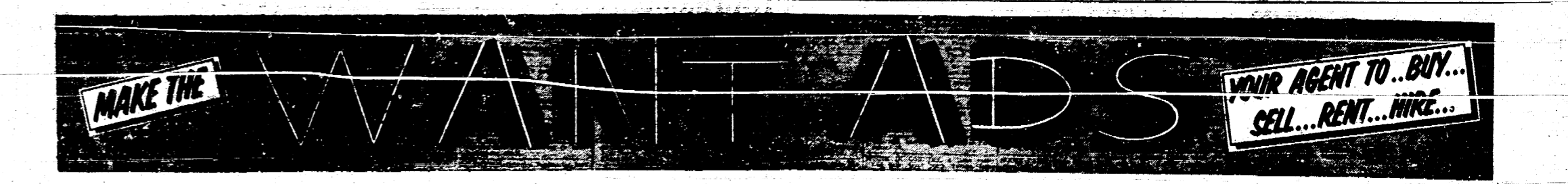

Agriculture Department insect experts report good news on the fight against one of the worst insect pests in the central, western and southern states—the spotted alfalfa aphid.

Damage caused by the aphids this year—measured by the yield of poor-quality hay that the insects caused—has been light. The fight against the alfalfa aphid is difficult. There is no way to quarantine it because it is so light that it can be carried by air currents.

Eradicating infected alfalfa fields is only a halfway measure. There are plenty of other plants that the aphid thrives on.

Some other insects can be used to attack the aphids. The other insects sound fierce, with names like spruce budworm, spruce sawfly and spruce beetle—but they are misnamed.
