

Twenty Seven County Children Now Registered

Twenty-seven Washburn County children have now registered for the new Crippled Children's Camp sponsored by the County Eastern Seal Society at the University of Michigan Fresh Air Camp.

From August 18th to 20th the camp will open its doors to nine crippled children from Ann Arbor, five from Ypsilanti, three each from Dexter, Manchester and Willow Run Village, two from Saline and one each from Milan and Pittsford.

This will be the first camping experience for many of these children, according to Mrs. Vladimir Bibbitt, president of the Washburn County Eastern Seal Society and Children and Adults. She pointed out that children who have been afflicted with poliomyelitis, polio, muscular dystrophy and brain damage will be attending the camp. The camp staff is especially prepared to work with these children, and a physician will be available at all times.

The Society is underwriting the costs of the camp with funds obtained in its annual Easter Seal Sale to ease the financial burden on the families of the children, and to make sure that no child is turned away due to inability to pay.

Countywide Survey Planned This Month

A countywide survey to look into the rehabilitation needs of all persons who have had polio will be conducted this month by the Washburn County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, according to Mrs. Carl Rehberg, of Ann Arbor, chapter chairman.

The local survey is part of a nationwide project by the National Foundation to compile a roster of polio cases of all ages and degrees of disability, regardless of date of onset. The canvass here is to be completed by Sept. 1.

The local survey will take a considerable period of time. Information sought for each patient includes whether he is employed or attends school, if he can climb stairs and dress himself, whether he receives regular treatment and if he uses respiratory aid.

Mrs. Rehberg says that all persons who have ever had polio send their names and addresses directly to Mrs. Robert Langford, Washburn County Chapter, Nat'l Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, 1313 East Ann St., Ann Arbor.

Townships' Tax Appeal To Be Answered Soon

The State Tax Commission will decide within 15 days whether to allocate three Washtenaw county townships a small share of the available 15-mill property tax.

A hearing was held at the County Building on contentions of Manchester, Ypsilanti and Salem townships that they are entitled to at least 1 mill of taxing authority.

They were denied millage over their request by the County Tax Allocation Board. All other townships also received no millage.

Manchester seeks half a mill compared to Ypsilanti's asking for 1 mill and Salem from 1 to 3 mills.

Salmon township, located in the northeast corner of the county appeared to have the best chance of receiving the requested millage allocation, because an attorney for the township produced letters that stated two large school districts in the township would relinquish part of their allocation they received this year.

Ypsilanti township, which received a 4 of a mill last year by appealing to the State Tax Commission, may not receive an allocation this year.

An attorney general's opinion has ruled against use of the differential rate." R. Gerald Barr, tax commissioner at the hearing said. "The opinion, in fact, was requested by your prosecutor, Edmund F. DeVine."

The opinion was sought last September when an inter-county election was held in Manchester to attempt to use different tax rates in the part of the school.

Manchester township submitted a budget of \$13,270 and estimated that its income would be \$12,436. Half a mill of taxing authority in the township would bring in an additional \$2,865.
