Stockholders' Meeting

Detroit Edison will hold a special informational meeting for stockholders of this area Tuesday, November 19, it was announced today by Walker L. Gator, president of the company.

The meeting will be held at the Henry and Edsel Ford Auditorium in Detroit's new Civic Center and will open at two o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Present, besides Edison stockholders from throughout this area, will be officers and members of the board of directors of the company.

The president will report in matters of special interest to stockholders, including the company's participation in atomic power development. There will be a discussion period in which Edison officials will answer questions on company operations.

Planned for the convenience of people in the service area who own Detroit Edison shares, the meeting is the sixth of its kind held annually by the company. Nearly 70 per cent of Detroit Edison's 51,700 shareholders live in Michigan, and most of these live in the company's 600-square-mile service area in the southeastern part of the state.

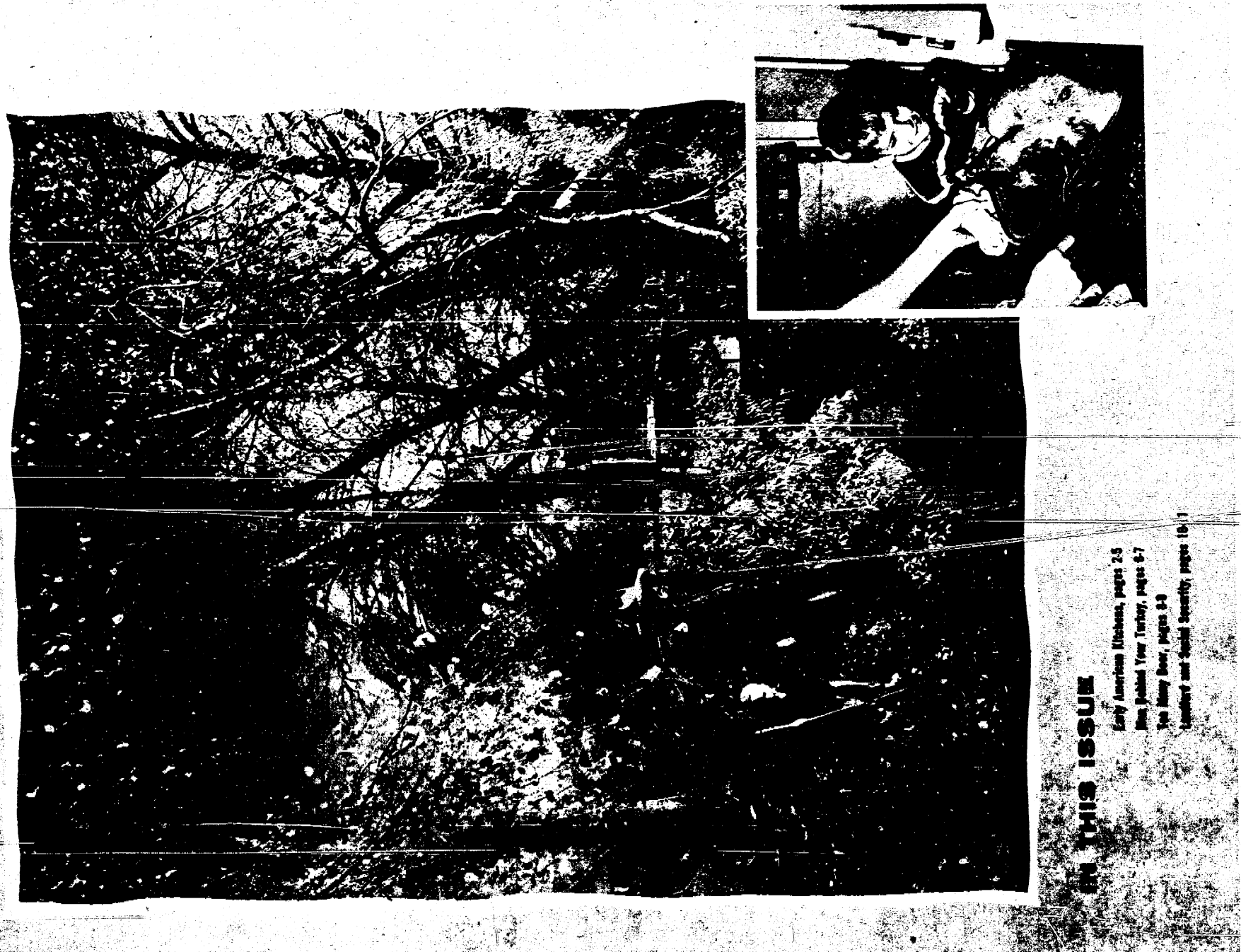

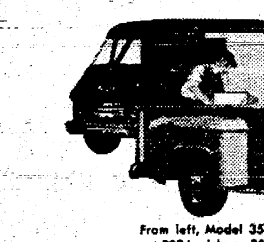

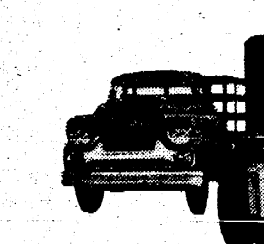
