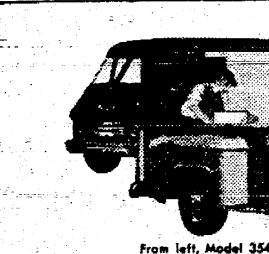

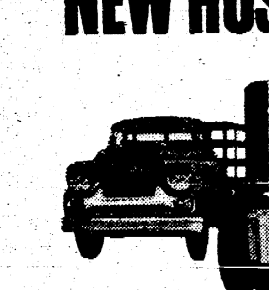

Dutchmen Win Last Game Of Season

The Manchester Dutchmen completed their 1957 gridiron season last Friday by handing the Clinton Redskins a 26 to 6 defeat.

The Redskins started the scoring in the first period after receiving one of the three Dutchmen fumbles of the quarter. Quarterback Willy LaSavage passed to end Pat Porter on a play which was good for 40 yards and the only touch down for the Clinton eleven in the ball game.

The same two boys combined their talents and gained 40 yards to set up TD play. The extra point try was missed.

In the second quarter the Dutchmen marched 48 yards with halfback Jerry Meyer traveling the last 14 yards to pay dirt. Connie Gonyer's extra point kick was perfect, thus giving the Manchester Redskins a score of 7 to 6.

The Dutchmen scored again in the third period after a march of 48 yards on a pass play from Connie Gonyer to Cecil Grier. Gonyer's extra point attempt was blocked.

After Connie Gonyer intercepted a Redskin pass the Dutchmen marched 78 yards to score a pass from Connie Gonyer to end Bob Van Eekelen. The pass was good for 16 yards. A poor pass from Connie Gonyer to Cecil Grier, however, spoiled Manchester's chance of adding the extra point.

With the Redskins passing to remain in the game, Paul Reinhart intercepted a Clinton pass thus starting the drive for Manchester's final TD of the game. Community Chest Reaches 80 Percent Of Goal

Approximately 80 per cent of the \$7,000 goal has been reached by the Manchester Area United Community Fund and Red Cross Drive for 1957-58. For the first time in five years the Drive has not gone over the top in the allotted time. In one previous slump the goal was reached by individual assistance from the Business Men's Division.

Final reports will not be made until December 5, when the Manchester Christmas Club, Dan J. Boutell, Cashier, points out that this is an average of nearly \$130 per member covering all types of clubs from 25 cent per week to \$100 per week and insurance.

The 1958 Christmas Club opens for membership November 25th and the bank extends to all present members and to any new members who might wish to take advantage of this easy and popular way to save for Christmas and all troublesome year-end bills.

The same weekly plan is being offered again this year as has been in the past. Weekly savings of 25 cents brings \$12.50; fifty cents brings \$25; one dollar brings \$50, etc.

M-92 Relocation Part Of 5-Year

Christmas Club Checks Total \$52,000

Relocation of over five miles of State Trunking M-92 between Manchester and Clinton is a part of the \$125 billion State highway construction plan announced recently by State Highway Dept. Commissioner John C. Mackle.

Other phases of the plan relative to Manchester are the grading and widening of the road between Manchester and Clinton, the widening and resurfacing of a total of 2,900 miles of major Michigan city streets, construction of a total of 2,900 miles of gravel roads on Michigan State highways.

Over 80 per cent of the cost will be provided by bonds and federal aid, Mackle stated. The remaining \$330 million will be supplied from State funds.

Priorities have been determined on a basis of need and provision of the road to a maximum amount of traffic with an eye to community development. The project will be completed in five years.

The State Highway Department recently at work planning a second five-year program to be followed when this present five-year plan is finished.

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Consumer Franchise Renewed

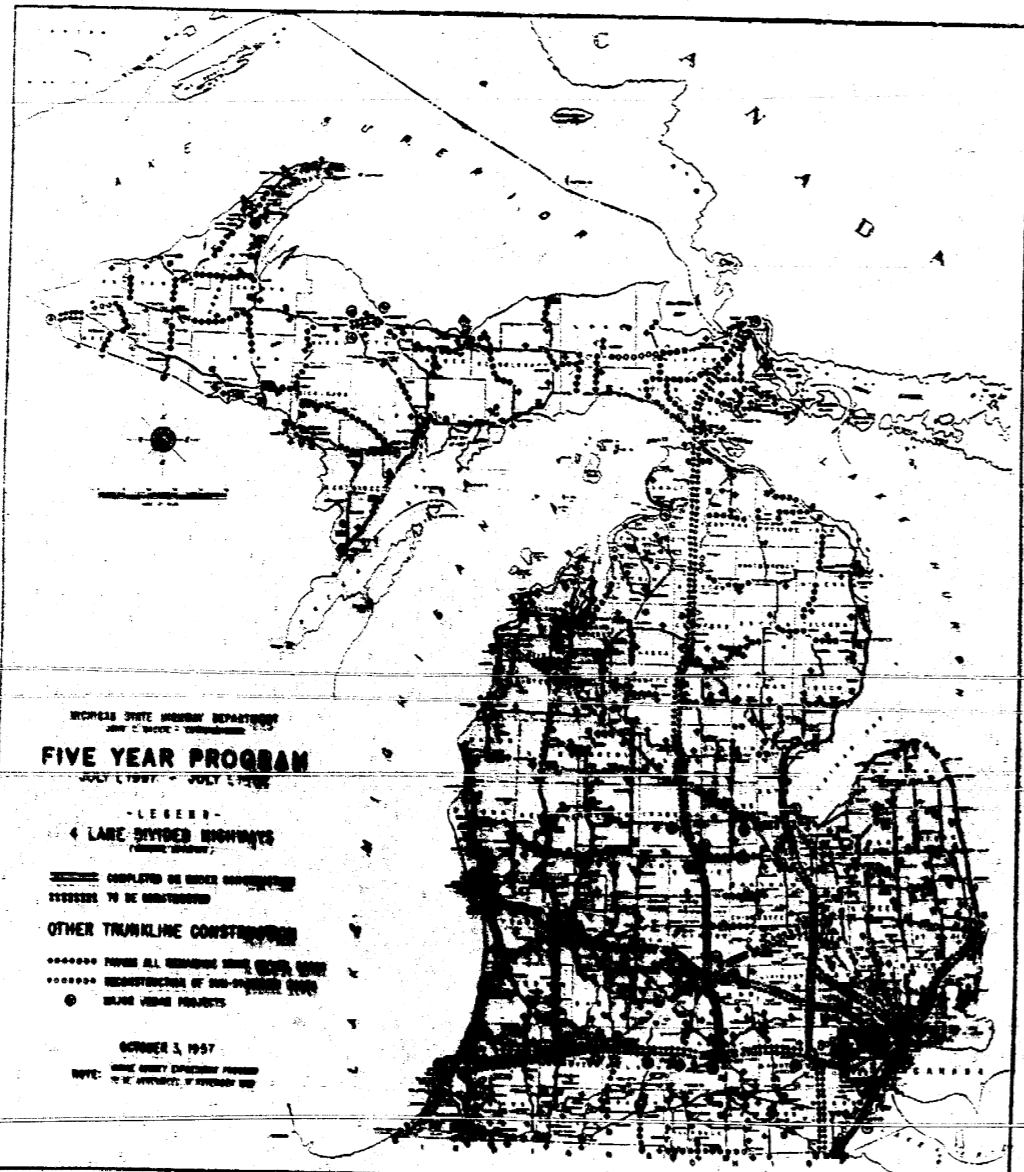
In a special election held Wednesday at the village hall the franchise to Consumers Power Company was renewed to furnish electricity to Manchester township for another 30 years.
