

VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE NO. 47

An Ordinance to regulate the construction and use of public sewerage systems and to provide for the collection, treatment and disposal of sewage.

Section 1. DEFINITIONS.

(a) The term "Combined Sewer" shall mean a sewer receiving both storm and sanitary sewage.

(b) The term "Sanitary Sewer" shall mean a sewer which carries sewage and other liquid waste from buildings and other structures and is not intended to receive storm water.

(c) The term "Storm Sewer" or "Storm Drain" shall mean a sewer which carries storm and surface waters and drainage but which does not receive or collect industrial waste.

(d) The term "Main Sewer" shall mean that portion of sewerage system in the streets and alleys or in rights of way across private property which carries sewage from connecting sewers to the sewer treatment plant, including both existing main sewers and those built in the future.

(e) The term "Connecting Sewer" shall mean the sewer pipes running from the main sewers to the residences or properties of the owners of such sewers.

(f) The term "Sewage System" shall mean the sewerage treatment plant, together with the main sanitary or combined sewer lines and the buildings and fixtures connected therewith.

Section 2. CONNECTION WITH SEWERAGE SYSTEM REQUIRED.

(a) The owners of all houses, buildings or properties used for human occupancy, employment, recreation or similar purposes, situated within the Village of Manchester, shall connect with the sewerage system of the Village of Manchester in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

(b) The application for such connection shall be made by the owner of the premises, and shall include a plan showing the location and depth of the sewer line to be connected, the name of the owner of the premises, the name and address of the person to whom the sewer line is to be connected, and a copy thereof to the Village Council.

(c) The Village Council shall determine whether or not the proposed connection is in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, and if so, shall issue an order to the owner of the premises to connect with the sewerage system of the Village of Manchester.

(d) The owner of the premises shall connect with the sewerage system of the Village of Manchester within 30 days of the date of the public hearing or within 60 days of the date of the public hearing if the Village Council shall determine that an inspection of the sewerage system is necessary.

What's Your Safety Quotient?



For safe driving, make it a family rule that children are not permitted to distract the driver.

Remember, while you're driving at any safety level, disapproved injuries in accidents occur, they do not prevent collisions from taking place. It is also important to keep windshield wipers in good operating condition at all times and glass areas clean of snow, sleet, and dirt.

Observe the 14 rules prepared by the National Safety Council, and your safety will put you at the head of the class:

1. Never leave children alone in the car, regardless of whether or not the motor is left running.
2. Have youngsters ride in back seat whenever possible.
3. Allow no eating of lollipops or ice cream on sticks in moving car.
4. Permit no rough-housing, friendly or otherwise.
5. Have family rule that children are not permitted to distract driver (remember, always pull over to the curb and stop as if it becomes necessary to admonish children).
6. All riders must be seated while auto is moving.
7. Hands, heads and possessions must remain inside the car at all times.
8. All doors locked when vehicle is in motion.
9. No sharp-edged, hard or heavy safety permitted which might become lethal flying missile in case of sudden stop.
10. No objects stored at any time on window deck behind rear seat.
11. Infants firmly strapped in car bed or halter type safety seat belt at all times.
12. Driver should be physically fit. Don't drive when tired or high-strung. Car should be mechanically safe also.
13. Children in back should not be sitting in dangle. Crank side view to provide necessary ventilation, prevent exposure leading to colds or infections.
14. Always remember to be alert to the actions of drivers of other cars. They may not be as careful about their driving habits as you are.

BETTER SCHOOLS — AND YOU

What should a school building cost? The divorce courts have found that the simple thing which causes most family fights are breaks in most things that cause most family fights and more community rifts is money too.

The biggest phase of the money argument about schools is cost. Higher than they have to be. Match a higher school bill to match what family fights are breaking over whether we're throwing our money away on elaborate school buildings or holding down the cost of the school by building a simple, efficient school building.

If you want to drive yourself crazy, start comparing square foot cost of schools. There's where you can find a real difference. The biggest stumbling block when we try to compare school building costs. A building in Texas, which requires very little artificial heat, costs far less than a similar one in New England, where winters are longer and harder. Cost of labor is another factor. Labor costs less in Mississippi than it does in New York. Whether the locality has the materials at hand makes a difference too. It may have to ship in every brick and every piece of lumber, the cost is bound to be higher. Labor costs are a nightmare to school architects and school boards. They are a nightmare to you when you start figuring the exact size of every brick and every piece of lumber. The school architects have made some mistakes but the laws are on their side and architects have a right to be. Some laws call for ceilings that are many feet


