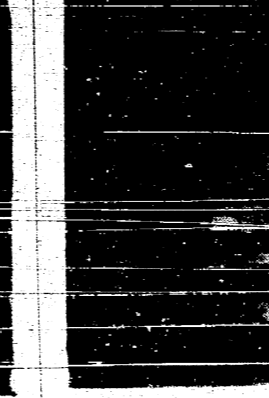

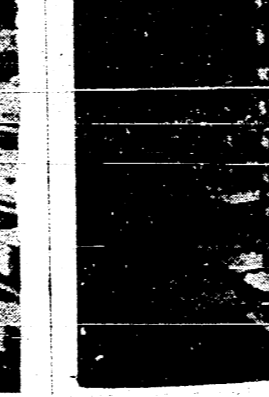

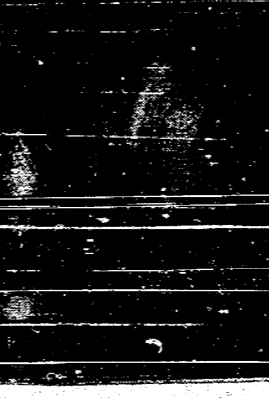
Each tray holds approximately 160 eggs. It takes 28,000 eggs to tray holds the 21,000 fertile ones.

**Liberalized Fishing Laws**

Liberalized fishing regulations on 51 Michigan lakes have been announced by Conservation Department Director Gerald E. Eddy. These are shallow lakes that periodically experience a heavy first kill due to accumulation of ice in winter when a heavy blanket of snow covers the ice or during warm weather months when water temperatures are too high.

Special regulations for these lakes allow hook and line fisherman to take fish of any kind or size throughout the year. Daily creel limits and possession restrictions still apply, however.

The heavy fish kills generally are shallow and lack outlets or are very fertile, these lakes produce an excessive growth of aquatic plants.

**State Police Report On 7 Activities**

Michigan State Police closed its report on 7 activities with a report that the state had achieved its goal of having 22 per cent of the state's population insured by 1957. The report also noted that 1,845 persons were killed, a reduction of 20 per cent below the 1956 figure of 2,317. There were 99,500 accidents and 129,500 accident victims of 2.7 and 2.8 per cent respectively.

The record accomplished despite and in spite of travel, which was estimated at 20 billion miles, or 2.5 per cent over 1956. Motor vehicle registrations totaled 3,272,000, a gain of 2.5 per cent over 1956. The number of drivers increased to 3,725,000, 215,350 or six per cent higher.

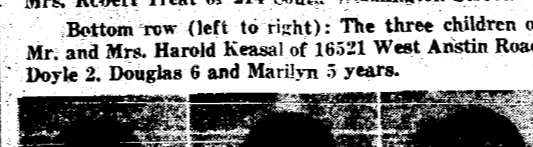

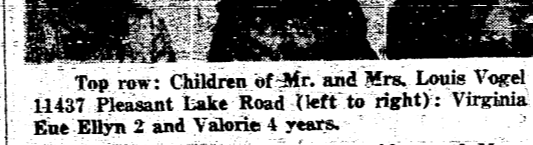
