William Rothfuss Services Held Friday Jan. 17

WILLIAM E. ROTHFUSS, 59, president of Decorators Wall Paper Co., St. Louis, Mo., passed away at St. John's Hospital in St. Louis early Wednesday morning, January 15. He had been ill for several months, following an operation last July.

He is survived by his wife, Marian, of 6239 Rosebury, St. Louis; his mother, Mrs. Charles H. Rothfuss, of Brooklynside, Mass.; three brothers, Arthur, Donald and Guilford, of Brooklynside, and three sisters, Mildred, Mrs. Delmar LeVoll of Waskum, Texas, Rosalind (Mrs. Jack Nixon) of South Haven, Mich., and Florence (Mrs. Kenneth Triggler) of Champaign, Ill. He was preceded in death by his father and four sisters, Arlene and Helen, who passed away in infancy, Ethelyn and Winifred (Mrs. Leon Peterson).

He was born March 26, 1898, at Holloway, Michigan, the second son of Lavina E. Rothfuss and the late Charles H. Rothfuss, who kept a general store in that village. In 1908, at the age of 8, he moved with his parents to a farm at Wampers Lake, near Brooklyn, where the family home is still maintained. He was educated in the grade schools at Holloway and Wampers Lake, and at Brooklynside High School, from which he was graduated in 1915. The same year, at the age of 17, he taught school in the Irish Hill district, and followed with another year at the Hollister district, both near Brooklyn.

In 1918 he enlisted in the Army, and served in the S. A. C. (Student's Army Training Corps) until the end of World War I. Following his honorable discharge from the service he engaged in farming for a short time, and then went to work for the Overland Company in Toledo, Ohio.

His career in the wholesale wallpaper business started in 1920 when he began work with the Decorators Wall Paper Co. in their original store on Summit Street in Toledo. Shortly thereafter he became manager of the store.

During the depression years, the firm embarked upon an expansion program which eventually saw branches established in 23 principal cities throughout the Midwest. The managerial and executive ability of Mr. Rothfuss was an important factor in this expansion and he became the field supervisor of the far-flung operations. During these years his duties required his moving from Toledo, Ohio, to La Grange, Ill., before moving to St. Louis in 1945, where the central office of the firm was located.

In 1945, in partnership with Howard Ault and Elsie Klein of St. Louis, he secured a controlling interest in the firm, and later was elected to its presidency. Under his continued guidance, the company has grown to be the largest independent wholesale wallpaper firm in the nation.

Mr. Rothfuss has been active in the work of the Episcopal Church in St. Louis. He served on the vestry of the Church of the Ascension (Cates at Goodfellow Ave.) and held the positions of Senior Warden and chairman of the finance committee. He was chairman of the board of Thompson House, a Missouri retreat established and maintained by the church.

He became a member of the Masonic Order in 1925, and maintained his original membership in Lodge 169, at Brooklyn, through out his life. For the past ten years he has been a member of the Elks, his affiliation being with E. P. O. Lodge No. 9 in St. Louis.

Funeral services will be held Friday in St. Louis at 10 a.m. with burial Saturday at Highland Cemetery in Brooklyn. A short memorial service will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. at All Saints' Church in Brooklyn.

In lieu of flowers it is requested that contributions be made to endowment or memorial funds either at the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, or at All Saints' in Brooklyn.
