New Police Officer On 24 Hr. Call Phone GA 8-2011

Manchester's new village marshal, Robert H. Hanley, 38, began his new duties February 4. His telephone number is GA 8-2011 and the officers said he is on 24 hour call.

The officers said he cannot stress too much importance of careful driving in the village and points out the corner of East Main Street and Riverside as "definitely a corner which will catch because of heavy traffic." He asks the cooperation of the drivers and pedestrians at this intersection.

His first call was to investigate three men who were canvassing in the southern part of the village last Friday night. The officers, J. Chazy and Bob Kelly of Detroit told him they were working out of the Detroit office representing Promotional Enterprises of Irvington, D. C. checking a TV survey in this area. The officer said the three left town at 11:50 p.m. with their manager who had been working in another area.

In giving a brief background of himself, the law enforcement officer said he was born in Lawrenceburg, Tennessee but finished high school at Northern high school, Kansas City, Missouri where he worked for the Kansas Truck Lines until he was drafted for service. From March 1941 to April 1946 he was in service in the Old Horse Cavalry (one of the last horse mounted divisions). He attended Officer Candidate School at Ft. Riley, Kansas, and was commissioned in October, 1942 and assigned to the 15th Cavalry mechanized and was sent to Europe where he was with the 1st Cavalry Division until November 1945 and served in the Marshalling area near Brest.

After going to Officer's Training School he served on Border Patrol along the Mexican border. In Europe he was assigned to the First Army to break out through France and at the close of the war was on the Elbe River. He was held as a prisoner of war until November 1945 and departed from the army from Fort Knox. He remained in the service and was called back in 1951 and sent to Korea where he served for 14 months.

Always interested in horses he went into the horse business of training. Tennessee Walking horses from 1946 to 48 and then went to work for the police department. He was appointed chief deputy for Claude McAfee and Arthur Smallwood where he worked until 1953 when McAfee went out of office as sheriff. Mr. Hanley then returned to the horse business where he continued training and raising Tennessee Walking Horses.

Mr. and Mrs. Hanley have moved to 1205 Fuller street. Their home is at 405 Territorial Street. The Hanleys were married in July, 1953.

Dr. Cunningham Sportsmen To Talk At School E. Brown

Dr. Glenn Cunningham, famous track star of the 1930's is returning to Michigan for another series of public appearances sponsored by the Michigan Temperance Foundation. As a part of a program which will take him to 38 schools and 5 churches in 10 Michigan counties, he will be appearing at the Manchester High School on Friday, February 21 at 2:30 p.m. His topic is "Clean Living and the Race of Life."

Glenn Cunningham is known to millions of Americans as the greatest American miler of our time, but his life story is almost legendary—how he overcame the odds of his legal and body in a boyhood fire and started running to gain back his strength and health. His deep determination to succeed carried him on to Kansas University where he established some records which are still unbroken. His 4:04 indoor mile record stood for more than a decade and his 8:40 1/2 mile record had run the mile under 4:30 more times than all other runners combined.

Dr. Cunningham earned a B.S. Degree from the University of Kansas (where he graduated with top class honors), an M.S. from Iowa University and a Ph.D. from New York University. He has a national reputation in the field of physical education. He served in the Navy in World War II as Physical Training Officer in San Diego and at Great Lakes Naval Training Base.

In 1938 he was chosen by 600,000 Americans to receive the Sullivan Award as outstanding amateur athlete of the year. He was captain of the American track team touring Europe and the Orient in 1933 and in 1936 his fellow athletes named him the most popular member of the U. S. Olympic Team.

When he and his eight children are not entertaining underprivileged boys and girls at their Cedar Point home in Kansas, Glenn spends his time speaking at high school assemblies throughout the country. In an average year he addresses more than half a million people.

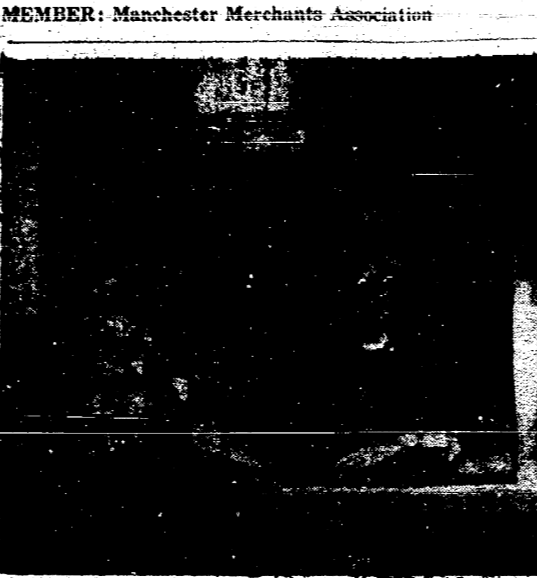

Wayne A. Richardson of Detroit, owner of the car, told reporters that he was driving with a friend when they discovered flames coming from underneath the auto. No cause of the fire was listed.

83 Persons Killed On Highway In January: 121 Last Year

Michigan started out the new year with another substantial saving in lives lost in traffic accidents. A State Police report shows that in January 83 persons were killed as compared to 121 in the same month a year ago. A reduction of 30.6 per cent in deaths is reported and the death toll is expected to be added to with the receipt of delayed reports, the month will nevertheless wind up with a five per cent saving on the overall tally.

The 1958 goal has been set at a saving of 15 per cent above the death total of 1,319 in 1957, or 1,121.

The January death toll was the lowest for that month since 1952, when 51 were killed. It was the twentieth month of the last 22 in which there have been reductions in deaths compared with the same month the preceding year.

It was pointed out, however, that it will be increasingly difficult to maintain the gains set in January, as snow conditions will have to be made against months in which there were marked reductions a year ago. In February, for example, 39 persons lost their lives, which was 27 below the previous five-year average of 133.

In addition, the 1957 death toll is nearly 500 lives under the total of 2,016 who died in 1955, which makes new goals harder to attain.

Michigan's death toll for 1957 now stands at 13 per cent under a year ago, whereas the national saving is three per cent. The national death toll is estimated at 38,500.

State Hospital Holsteins Show Superior Record

Brattleboro, Vermont—The Holstein-Friesian Association of America has announced the completion of an outstanding official production record by a registered Holstein cow owned by Ipsilanti State Hospital, Ipsilanti—Milledune, Mich.

The cow, named Ypsilanti Pleasant Design Pandora 3563100, produced a total of 14,478 lbs. of milk and 551 lbs. of butterfat as a 4-year-old.

Michigan State University working in close cooperation with the national Holstein organization, supervised the weighing and testing of production as a part of the Herd Improvement Registry program.

This official testing program, commonly referred to as HIR, provides continuing lactation and lifetime production records on every cow in participating registered Holstein herds.

Participation is currently at record levels with more than 83,000 cows in more than 2,200 herds enrolled.

Lt. Cannon, son of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Cannon of Manchester, is married to the former Shirley Baker of Tecumseh, Michigan. The Cannons have a 15 month old son, David.
