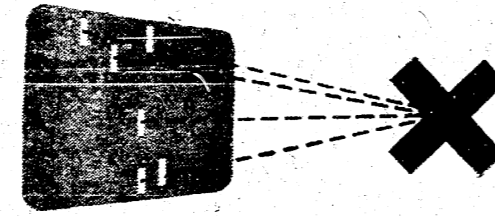

**Senator Potter Reports**

A full head of Washington steam is building up for tax cuts and a speed-up in public works. My recent urgings that the Budget Bureau unlock more money for work on the Great Lakes connecting channels are receiving attention. The Bureau has informed me that it is drafting budget amendments to accelerate funds for this type of activity and that the channel work may be included.

I spent several days last week contacting top officials in an effort to spur action on automobile excise tax reduction. Right now the unfair levy stands at 10 percent and you pay \$250 federal tax on a \$2,500 automobile. For four years I have fought the auto excise. Now, with over 5 million workers throughout the U. S. jobless, getting rid of the tax is a good way of putting money into circulation and pepping up the economy.

I told President Eisenhower, Treasury Secretary Anderson and the Senate leaders that abolishing or reducing the auto excise tax would be a potent weapon in reversing the present downturn. It would slash car prices, boost sales and open up jobs. The Michigan Congressional delegation is solidly behind this effort and we have enlisted some powerful support.

Any plans to alter the excise tax on autos should be retroactive to March 1 and that is the basis on which we're considering it in Congress. It would protect car buyers who want to purchase now. At the moment it appears as if we have a chance of cutting the tax to 5 percent rather than wiping it off the books entirely. Even that would save the consumer close to \$600 million in 1958. The Treasury's revenue loss would be more than made up by new income taxes from the increased business and jobs following tax removal.

New housing starts should zoom under a bill which passed the Senate last week, for which I voted. I also supported the increase of interest rates for veterans from 4-1/2 percent to 4-3/4 percent. This should ease the veteran's difficulties in getting mortgage money to house his family. Until now he has been hampered by an unrealistic interest rate.

By formal resolution, adopted 83 to 1, the Senate urged President Eisenhower last week to loosen the federal moneybags on public works. Merely by speeding up appropriations on projects already approved, billions of dollars would pour into contracts and pay checks, sending a healthy surge through the economy. After inching through the tedious process of obtaining Congressional approval, which sometimes takes years, most of these projects are now in the budget awaiting the green light for funds. Fast action would unwork a long list of civil works by the Corps of Engineers, National Park Service, Departments of the Interior and Agriculture.

As far back as 1776, St. Patrick's Day received special attention on this side of the Atlantic. In that year, while camped at Cambridge, Massachusetts, General George Washington issued an order making "St. Patrick's" the Revolutionary Army's pass word and appointing General John Sullivan as officer of the day. And that's no barney!
