Legion To Visit Emanuel Sunday

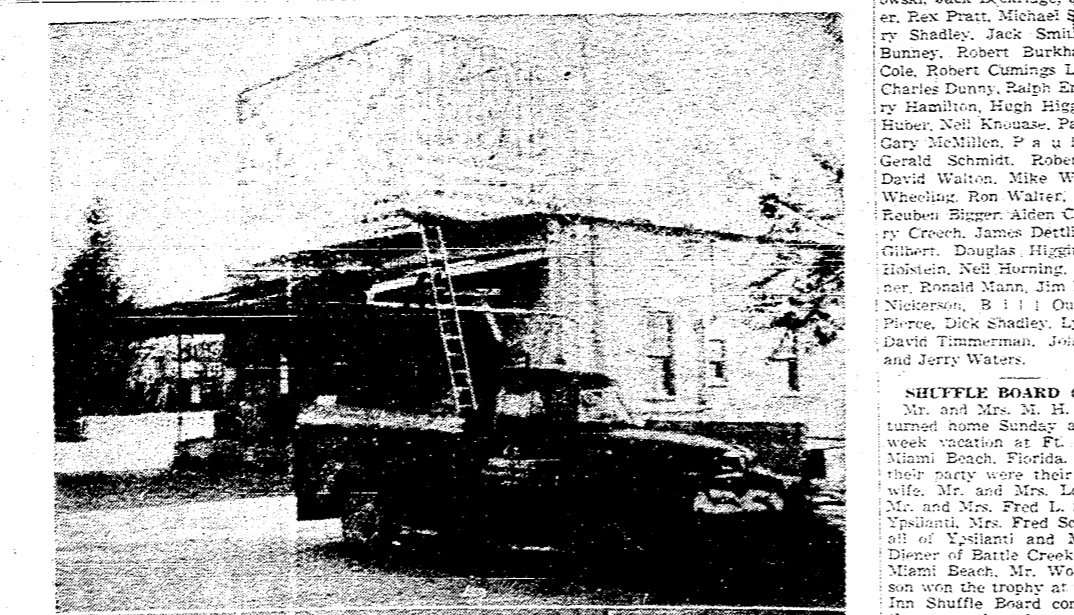

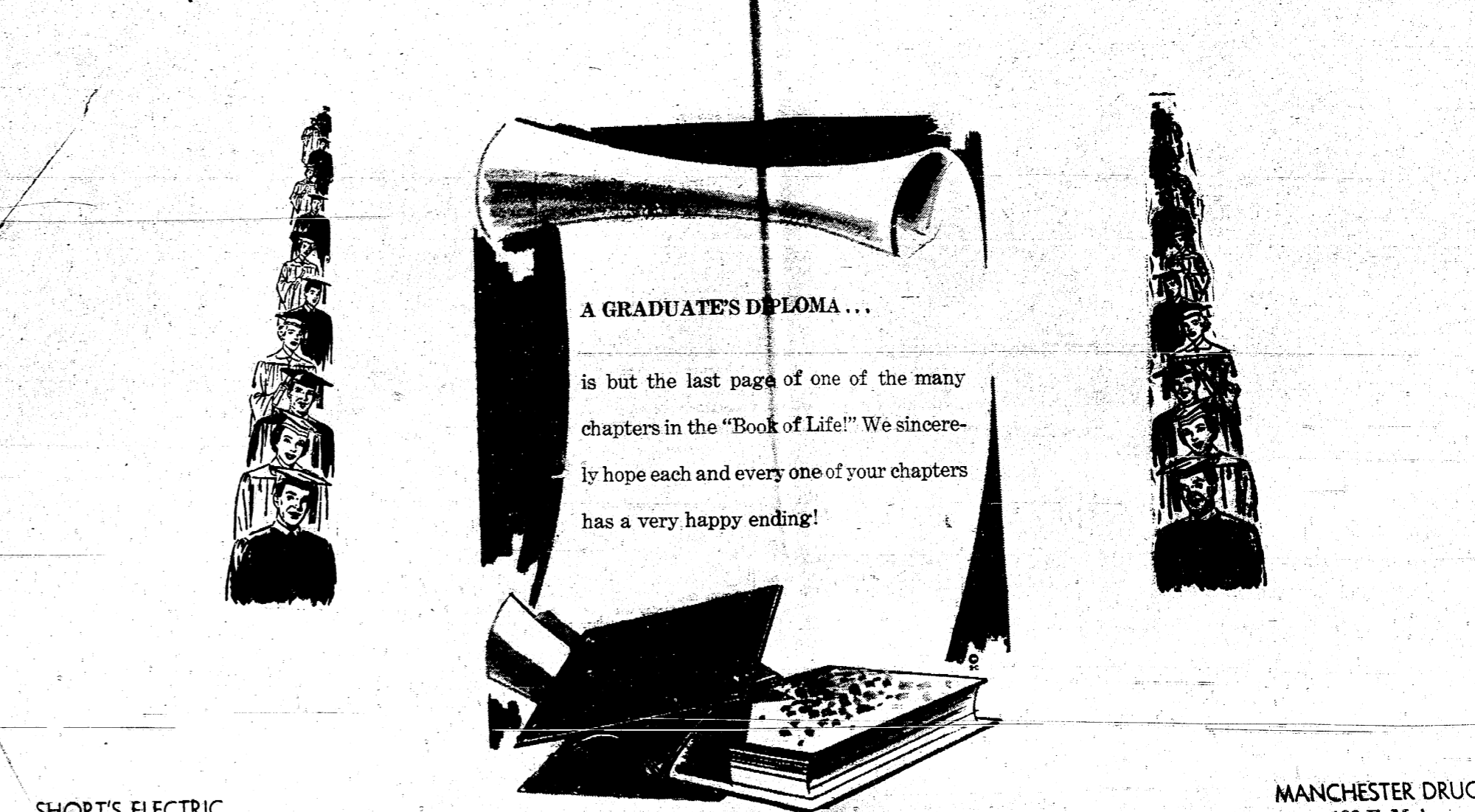
